<b>breeding</b>	The production of animals or plants by inbreeding or hybridization. <i>The flooding of the rivers is a trigger for <b>breeding</b> to start.</i>
<b>consanguinity</b>	(anthropology) related by blood. <i>The marriage was annulled on grounds of <b>consanguinity</b>.</i>
<b>derivation</b>	The set of stages that link a sentence in a natural language to its underlying logical form. <i>Music of Turkish <b>derivation</b>.</i>
<b><u>descent</u></b>	A movement downward. <i>His <b>descents</b> on the manager of any shop he took a fancy to visit.</i>
<b><u>dynasty</u></b>	A succession of people from the same family who play a prominent role in business, politics, or another field. <i>The Guinness <b>dynasty</b>.</i>
<b><u>extraction</u></b>	The ethnic origin of someone's family. <i>Mineral <b>extraction</b>.</i>
<b>family</b>	A loose affiliation of gangsters in charge of organized criminal activities. <i>The <b>family</b> lived in a large house with a lot of land.</i>
<b>fop</b>	A man who is much concerned with his dress and appearance.
<b>genealogy</b>	The study and tracing of lines of descent. <i>The <b>genealogies</b> of the kings of Mercia.</i>
<b>glamour boy</b>	A male human offspring.
<b>gore</b>	Vice President of the United States under Bill Clinton (born in 1948). <i>The film omitted the blood and <b>gore</b> in order to avoid controversy.</i>
<b><u>heritage</u></b>	A special or individual possession; an allotted portion. <i>60 miles of <b>heritage</b> coastline.</i>
<b>house</b>	The people living in a house a household. <i>My wife and I are moving to a new <b>house</b>.</i>
<b>kin</b>	Animals or plants that are related to a particular species or kind. <i>Dolphins whales and their <b>kin</b>.</i>
<b>kindred</b>	Relationship by blood. <i>Ties of <b>kindred</b>.</i>
<b>kinship</b>	Blood relationship. <i>Anthropology's <b>kinship</b> with the humanities.</i>

<b>lifeblood</b>	The blood considered as the seat of vitality. <i>Water is the <b>lifeblood</b> of India.</i>
<b>line</b>	A dose of a powdered narcotic drug especially cocaine laid out in a line ready to be taken. <i>A major shipping <b>line</b>.</i>
<b>line of descent</b>	A conceptual separation or distinction.
<b>lineage</b>	A social group tracing its descent from a single ancestor. <i>The chimpanzee and gorilla <b>lineages</b>.</i>
<b>man about town</b>	Any living or extinct member of the family Hominidae characterized by superior intelligence, articulate speech, and erect carriage.
<b>member of one's family</b>	An organization that is a member of another organization (especially a state that belongs to a group of nations).
<b>origin</b>	The point of intersection of coordinate axes; where the values of the coordinates are all zero. <i>The terminology has its <b>origins</b> in America.</i>
<b>parentage</b>	The identity and origins of one's parents. <i>A boy of Jamaican <b>parentage</b>.</i>
<b>pedigree</b>	The recorded ancestry or lineage of a person or family. <i>The debate about <b>pedigree</b> and family fortunes.</i>
<b>profligate</b>	A dissolute man in fashionable society. <i>He is a drunkard and a <b>profligate</b>.</i>
<b>race</b>	A series of races for horses or dogs held at a fixed time on a set course. <i>Some biologists doubt that there are important genetic differences between <b>races</b> of human beings.</i>
<b>rake</b>	An implement similar to a rake used for other purposes e.g. by a croupier drawing in money at a gaming table. <i>Giving the lawn a <b>rake</b>.</i>
<b>rakehell</b>	A fashionable or wealthy man of immoral or promiscuous habits. <i>Her dissolute <b>rakehell</b> of a son Sir Felix.</i>
<b>relation</b>	An abstraction belonging to or characteristic of two entities or parts together. <i>International <b>relations</b>.</i>
<b>rip</b>	A fraud or swindle a rip off. <i>There was a <b>rip</b> in his pants.</i>

**roots**

The part of a tooth that is embedded in the jaw and serves as support.

*He went back to Sweden to search for his **roots**.*

**roue**

A dissolute man in fashionable society.

**stemma**

A diagram showing the relationship between a text and its various manuscript versions.

**stock**

Farm animals such as cattle pigs and sheep bred and kept for their meat or milk livestock.

*Blue chip **stocks**.*

**strain**

(biology) a group of organisms within a species that differ in trivial ways from similar groups.

*The telltale signs of nervous **strain**.*

<b>aorta</b>	The main artery of the body, supplying oxygenated blood to the circulatory system. In humans it passes over the heart from the left ventricle and runs down in front of the backbone.
<b>arterial</b>	Of or involving or contained in the arteries. <i>One of the main <b>arterial</b> routes from York.</i>
<b><a href="#">artery</a></b>	A blood vessel that carries blood from the heart to the body. <i>George Street main <b>artery</b> of Edinburgh s Golden Mile.</i>
<b>bloodstream</b>	The blood flowing through the circulatory system.
<b>capillary</b>	A tube of small internal diameter holds liquid by capillary action. <i><b>Capillary</b> blood.</i>
<b>cardiovascular</b>	Of or pertaining to or involving the heart and blood vessels. <i>Increased risk of death from <b>cardiovascular</b> disease.</i>
<b>clog</b>	Dance a clog dance. <i>The market is being <b>clogged</b> by these operations.</i>
<b>clot</b>	Form or cause to form clots. <i>Watch where you re going you <b>clot</b>.</i>
<b>coagulate</b>	Cause (a fluid) to change to a solid or semi-solid state. <i>Blood had <b>coagulated</b> round the edges of the gash.</i>
<b>coronary</b>	Obstruction of blood flow in a coronary artery by a blood clot thrombus.
<b>diabetes</b>	A polygenic disease characterized by abnormally high glucose levels in the blood; any of several metabolic disorders marked by excessive urination and persistent thirst.
<b>embolism</b>	An insertion into a calendar. <i>Causes of cerebral <b>embolism</b>.</i>
<b>erythrocyte</b>	A red blood cell, which (in humans) is typically a biconcave disc without a nucleus. Erythrocytes contain the pigment haemoglobin, which imparts the red colour to blood, and transport oxygen and carbon dioxide to and from the tissues.
<b>glucose</b>	A syrup containing glucose and other sugars made by hydrolysis of starch and used in the food industry.
<b>hemoglobin</b>	A hemoprotein composed of globin and heme that gives red blood cells their characteristic color; function primarily to transport oxygen from the lungs to the body tissues. <i>Fish have simpler <b>hemoglobin</b> than mammals.</i>
<b>hypertension</b>	Abnormally high blood pressure.

<b>inject</b>	Take by injection. <i>We <b>injected</b> the glucose into the patient s vein.</i>
<b>insulin</b>	A hormone produced in the pancreas by the islets of Langerhans which regulates the amount of glucose in the blood The lack of insulin causes a form of diabetes.
<b>intercellular</b>	Located or occurring between cells. <i><b>Intercellular</b> spaces.</i>
<b>jugular</b>	(of fish's pelvic fins) located in front of the pectoral fins. <i>He always goes for the <b>jugular</b>.</i>
<b>lipid</b>	An oily organic compound insoluble in water but soluble in organic solvents; essential structural component of living cells (along with proteins and carbohydrates).
<b>lymphatic</b>	Of or relating to or produced by lymph. <i>The fluid is drained by the <b>lymphatics</b> and returned to the circulation.</i>
<b>oxygenation</b>	The process of providing or combining or treating with oxygen. <i>The <b>oxygenation</b> of the blood.</i>
<b>plasma</b>	Physical chemistry a fourth state of matter distinct from solid or liquid or gas and present in stars and fusion reactors a gas becomes a plasma when it is heated until the atoms lose all their electrons leaving a highly electrified collection of nuclei and free electrons. <i>Particles in space exist in the form of a <b>plasma</b>.</i>
<b>portal</b>	A short vein that carries blood into the liver. <i>A <b>portal</b> typically has search engines and free email and chat rooms etc.</i>
<b>primogenitor</b>	An ancestor in the direct line.
<b>pulmonary</b>	Relating to the lungs. <i><b>Pulmonary</b> disease.</i>
<b>sepsis</b>	The presence of pus-forming bacteria or their toxins in the blood or tissues.
<b>vein</b>	Make a veinlike pattern. <i>Gold bearing quartz <b>veins</b>.</i>
<b>venous</b>	Relating to a vein or the veins.
