line Each of usually five horizontal lines forming a stave in musical notation.

line of descent A conductor for transmitting electrical or optical signals or electric power.



lineage Direct descent from an ancestor; ancestry or pedigree.

The point or place where something begins, arises, or is derived.

The kinship relation of an offspring to the parents.

parentage

A boy of Jamaican parentage.
