Definitions of "Bloodline" as a noun

- Ancestry of a purebred animal.
- A set of ancestors or line of descent of an important person.
- The descendants of one individual.

ancestry	Inherited properties shared with others of your bloodline. <i>He was proud of his Irish ancestry.</i>
<u>background</u>	Scenery hung at back of stage. Background information.
<u>birth</u>	The process of giving birth. The birth of Socialist Realism.



<u>blood</u>	Violence involving bloodshed. <i>A mixed blood.</i>
blood line	The fluid (red in vertebrates) that is pumped through the body by the heart and contains plasma, blood cells, and platelets.
breed	A sort or kind of person or thing. <i>He experimented on a particular</i> breed <i>of white rats.</i>
breeding	The production of animals or plants by inbreeding or hybridization. The flooding of the rivers is a trigger for breeding to start.
consanguinity	The fact of being descended from the same ancestor. The marriage was annulled on grounds of consanguinity .
derivation	The source or origin from which something derives (i.e. comes or issues. <i>The derivation of scientific laws from observation.</i>
<u>descent</u>	The transmission of qualities, property, or privileges by inheritance. A descent on the Channel ports.
<u>dynasty</u>	A sequence of powerful leaders in the same family. <i>The Tang dynasty</i> .
<u>extraction</u>	The ethnic origin of someone's family. <i>The dentist gave her a local anesthetic prior to the extraction.</i>
family	A group of curves or surfaces obtained by varying the value of a constant in the equation generating them. <i>His family</i> has lived in Massachusetts since the Mayflower.
family tree	A social unit living together.
genealogy	Successive generations of kin. The genealogies of the kings of Mercia.
<u>heritage</u>	Property that is or may be inherited; an inheritance. Cotswold sheep are considered a heritage breed in Canada.
history	A record or narrative description of past events. <i>History</i> takes the long view.
house	The management of a gambling house or casino. A house of 45 boarders.
kinship	(anthropology) relatedness or connection by blood or marriage or adoption. <i>They felt a kinship with architects.</i>
line	Each of usually five horizontal lines forming a stave in musical notation. Let me show you my etchings is a rather worn line .
line of descent	A conductor for transmitting electrical or optical signals or electric power.



<u>lineage</u>	Direct descent from an ancestor; ancestry or pedigree. Great families and their lineage s.
<u>origin</u>	The point or place where something begins, arises, or is derived. <i>The rumor had its origin in idle gossip.</i>
parentage	The kinship relation of an offspring to the parents. A boy of Jamaican parentage .
paternity	(especially in legal contexts) the state of being someone's father. <i>He refused to admit paternity of the child.</i>
<u>pedigree</u>	The history or provenance of a person or thing, especially as conferring distinction. <i>The scheme has a long pedigree</i> .
race	A series of races for horses or dogs held at a fixed time on a set course. Some biologists doubt that there are important genetic differences between race s of human beings.
<u>roots</u>	The usually underground organ that lacks buds or leaves or nodes; absorbs water and mineral salts; usually it anchors the plant to the ground. <i>He went back to Sweden to search for his roots.</i>
stemma	An eye having a single lens.
<u>stock</u>	A portion of a company s stock as held by an individual or group as an investment. <i>The sale of dairy stock.</i>
strain	A state of tension or exhaustion resulting from severe demands on one's strength or resources. <i>His responsibilities were a constant strain</i> .
