<a href="#">ancestry</a>	Inherited properties shared with others of your bloodline. <i>He was proud of his Irish <b>ancestry</b>.</i>
<a href="#">background</a>	Scenery hung at back of stage. <b>Background</b> information.
<a href="#">birth</a>	The process of giving birth. <i>The <b>birth</b> of Socialist Realism.</i>

<b>blood</b>	Violence involving bloodshed. <i>A mixed <b>blood</b>.</i>
<b>blood line</b>	The fluid (red in vertebrates) that is pumped through the body by the heart and contains plasma, blood cells, and platelets.
<b>breed</b>	A sort or kind of person or thing. <i>He experimented on a particular <b>breed</b> of white rats.</i>
<b>breeding</b>	The production of animals or plants by inbreeding or hybridization. <i>The flooding of the rivers is a trigger for <b>breeding</b> to start.</i>
<b>consanguinity</b>	The fact of being descended from the same ancestor. <i>The marriage was annulled on grounds of <b>consanguinity</b>.</i>
<b>derivation</b>	The source or origin from which something derives (i.e. comes or issues). <i>The <b>derivation</b> of scientific laws from observation.</i>
<b>descent</b>	The transmission of qualities, property, or privileges by inheritance. <i>A <b>descent</b> on the Channel ports.</i>
<b>dynasty</b>	A sequence of powerful leaders in the same family. <i>The Tang <b>dynasty</b>.</i>
<b>extraction</b>	The ethnic origin of someone's family. <i>The dentist gave her a local anesthetic prior to the <b>extraction</b>.</i>
<b>family</b>	A group of curves or surfaces obtained by varying the value of a constant in the equation generating them. <i>His <b>family</b> has lived in Massachusetts since the Mayflower.</i>
<b>family tree</b>	A social unit living together.
<b>genealogy</b>	Successive generations of kin. <i>The <b>genealogies</b> of the kings of Mercia.</i>
<b>heritage</b>	Property that is or may be inherited; an inheritance. <i>Cotswold sheep are considered a <b>heritage</b> breed in Canada.</i>
<b>history</b>	A record or narrative description of past events. <i><b>History</b> takes the long view.</i>
<b>house</b>	The management of a gambling house or casino. <i>A <b>house</b> of 45 boarders.</i>
<b>kinship</b>	(anthropology) relatedness or connection by blood or marriage or adoption. <i>They felt a <b>kinship</b> with architects.</i>
<b>line</b>	Each of usually five horizontal lines forming a stave in musical notation. <i>Let me show you my etchings is a rather worn <b>line</b>.</i>
<b>line of descent</b>	A conductor for transmitting electrical or optical signals or electric power.

<b>lineage</b>	Direct descent from an ancestor; ancestry or pedigree. <i>Great families and their <b>lineages</b>.</i>
<b>origin</b>	The point or place where something begins, arises, or is derived. <i>The rumor had its <b>origin</b> in idle gossip.</i>
<b>parentage</b>	The kinship relation of an offspring to the parents. <i>A boy of Jamaican <b>parentage</b>.</i>
<b>paternity</b>	(especially in legal contexts) the state of being someone's father. <i>He refused to admit <b>paternity</b> of the child.</i>
<b>pedigree</b>	The history or provenance of a person or thing, especially as conferring distinction. <i>The scheme has a long <b>pedigree</b>.</i>
<b>race</b>	A series of races for horses or dogs held at a fixed time on a set course. <i>Some biologists doubt that there are important genetic differences between <b>races</b> of human beings.</i>
<b>roots</b>	The usually underground organ that lacks buds or leaves or nodes; absorbs water and mineral salts; usually it anchors the plant to the ground. <i>He went back to Sweden to search for his <b>roots</b>.</i>
<b>stemma</b>	An eye having a single lens.
<b>stock</b>	A portion of a company's stock as held by an individual or group as an investment. <i>The sale of dairy <b>stock</b>.</i>
<b>strain</b>	A state of tension or exhaustion resulting from severe demands on one's strength or resources. <i>His responsibilities were a constant <b>strain</b>.</i>
