| <b>coronal</b>       | A coronal consonant.<br><i><b>Coronal</b> holes are a source of geomagnetic activity.</i>   |
| <b>daffodil</b>      | Any of numerous varieties of Narcissus plants having showy often yellow flowers with a trumpet-shaped central crown.  |
