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## Associations of "Bloomed" (30 Words)

<b>anther</b>	The part of a stamen that contains the pollen.
<b>aster</b>	A plant of a large genus that includes the Michaelmas daisy, typically having purple or pink rayed flowers.
<b>azalea</b>	A deciduous flowering shrub with clusters of brightly coloured, sometimes fragrant flowers. Azaleas are typically smaller than other rhododendrons and there are numerous cultivars.
<b>blossom</b>	The period of greatest prosperity or productivity. <i>Tiny white <b>blossoms</b>.</i>
<b>burgeon</b>	Put forth young shoots; bud. <i>The <b>burgeoning</b> population.</i>
<b>conservatory</b>	The faculty and students of a school specializing in one of the fine arts. <i>Keep plant cuttings in a frost free <b>conservatory</b> or greenhouse.</i>
<b>coronal</b>	A coronal consonant. <i><b>Coronal</b> holes are a source of geomagnetic activity.</i>
<b>daffodil</b>	A bulbous European plant which typically bears bright yellow flowers with a long trumpet-shaped centre (corona).
<b>daisy</b>	Used in names of other plants of the daisy family e g Michaelmas daisy Shasta daisy.
<b>efflorescence</b>	Rapid growth or development. <i>Cover the brickwork to minimize <b>efflorescence</b>.</i>
<b>efflorescent</b>	Bursting into flower.
<b>florist</b>	A shop where flowers and ornamental plants are sold. <i>The <b>florist</b> made up an attractive bouquet.</i>
<b>flourish</b>	Grow vigorously. <i>The caricaturist and wit who <b>flourished</b> in the early years of this century.</i>
<b>flower</b>	Produce or yield flowers. <i>A bunch of <b>flowers</b>.</i>

<b>flowering</b>	The time and process of budding and unfolding of blossoms. <i>The <b>flowering</b> of Viennese intellectual life.</i>
<b>herbaceous</b>	Denoting or relating to herbs (in the botanical sense).
<b>lily</b>	Used in names of other plants with flowers or leaves similar to those of the lily e.g arum lily. White Egyptian lotus water lily of Egypt to southeastern Africa held sacred by the Egyptians.
<b>lotus</b>	<i>A myth of creation states that Buddha was born of a thousand petalled gold <b>lotus</b>.</i>
<b>narcissus</b>	A beautiful young man who fell in love with his own reflection.
<b>nosegay</b>	An arrangement of flowers that is usually given as a present. <i>A <b>nosegay</b> worn at the waist or bodice.</i>
<b>pedicel</b>	A small stalk bearing a single flower of an inflorescence; an ultimate division of a common peduncle.
<b>petal</b>	Each of the segments of the corolla of a flower, which are modified leaves and are typically coloured.
<b>pollen</b>	A fine powdery substance typically yellow consisting of microscopic grains discharged from the male part of a flower or from a male cone Each grain contains a male gamete that can fertilize the female ovule to which pollen is transported by the wind insects or other animals.
<b>pollinator</b>	An insect or other agent that conveys pollen to a plant and so allows fertilization. <i>Bees are effective <b>pollinators</b> of fruit and vegetables.</i>
<b>precocity</b>	Intelligence achieved far ahead of normal developmental schedules.
<b>prosper</b>	Flourish physically; grow strong and healthy. <i>His business <b>prospered</b>.</i>
<b>spring</b>	Move rapidly or suddenly from a constrained position by or as if by the action of a spring. <i>With a sudden <b>spring</b> he leapt on to the table.</i>
<b>thrive</b>	Make steady progress; be at the high point in one's career or reach a high point in historical significance or importance. <i>The new baby <b>thrived</b>.</i>
<b>tulip</b>	Any of numerous perennial bulbous herbs having linear or broadly lanceolate leaves and usually a single showy flower.
<b>wreath</b>	A carved representation of a wreath. <i>A gold <b>wreath</b>.</i>
