<b>in bloom</b>	A unit of length equal to one twelfth of a foot.
<b>in flower</b>	A unit of length equal to one twelfth of a foot.
<b>in full bloom</b>	A state in midwestern United States.
<b>open</b>	Not subject to concealment; made public. <i>The concert was held in the <b>open</b> air.</i>
<b>out</b>	An act of putting a player out. <i>You only get 3 <b>outs</b> per inning.</i>
<b><u>peak</u></b>	A V shape. <i>The view from the <b>peak</b> was magnificent.</i>
<b>prime</b>	A prime number. <i>The <b>prime</b> of the world.</i>

<b>blossoming</b>	Develop or come to a promising stage.
<b>bud</b>	Of a plant or animal form a bud. <i>New blood vessels <b>bud</b> out from the vascular bed.</i>

<b>come to fruition</b>	Be found or available.
<b>develop</b>	Cause to grow and differentiate in ways conforming to its natural development. <i>She came to get the film <b>developed</b>.</i>
<b>evolve</b>	Gain through experience. <i>The company has <b>evolved</b> into a major chemical manufacturer.</i>
<b>flower</b>	Induce a plant to produce flowers. <i>Michaelmas daisies can <b>flower</b> as late as October.</i>
<b>grow</b>	Become attached by or as if by the process of growth. <i><b>Grown</b> men don't act so stupidly.</i>
<b>mature</b>	Develop and reach maturity; undergo maturation. <i>The trees take at least thirty years to <b>mature</b>.</i>
<b>open</b>	Make the opening move. <i>This <b>opens</b> up new possibilities.</i>
<b>open out</b>	Have an opening or passage or outlet.
<b>out</b>	Reveal something about somebody's identity or lifestyle. <i>They had <b>outed</b> Asquith quite easily.</i>
<b>progress</b>	Cause a task or undertaking to make progress. <i>As the century <b>progressed</b> the quality of telescopes improved.</i>
<u><b>sprout</b></u>	Put forth and grow sprouts or shoots. <i>Plush new hotels are <b>sprouting</b> up everywhere.</i>
<u><b>unfold</b></u>	Extend or stretch out to a greater or the full length. <i>There was a fascinating scene <b>unfolding</b> before me.</i>

<b>anther</b>	The part of a stamen that contains the pollen.
<b>aster</b>	Any of various chiefly fall-blooming herbs of the genus <i>Aster</i> with showy daisylike flowers.
<b>azalea</b>	A deciduous flowering shrub with clusters of brightly coloured, sometimes fragrant flowers. Azaleas are typically smaller than other rhododendrons and there are numerous cultivars.
<b><u>bloom</u></b>	A full, bright sound in a recording. <i>The remastering has lost some of the <b>bloom</b> of the strings.</i>
<b><u>burgeon</u></b>	Grow and flourish. <i>The city's suburbs have <b>burgeoned</b> sprawling out from the centre.</i>



<b>conservatory</b>	A greenhouse in which plants are arranged in a pleasing manner. <i>Keep plant cuttings in a frost free <b>conservatory</b> or greenhouse.</i>
<b>daffodil</b>	A bulbous European plant which typically bears bright yellow flowers with a long trumpet-shaped centre (corona).
<b>daisy</b>	Used in names of other plants of the daisy family e g Michaelmas daisy Shasta daisy.
<b>dandelion</b>	Any of several herbs of the genus <i>Taraxacum</i> having long tap roots and deeply notched leaves and bright yellow flowers followed by fluffy seed balls.
<b>efflorescence</b>	Rapid growth or development. <i><b>Efflorescences</b> found on the sheltered undersides of shale ledges.</i>
<b>efflorescent</b>	Bursting into flower.
<b>florist</b>	A shop where flowers and ornamental plants are sold. <i>The <b>florist</b> made up an attractive bouquet.</i>
<b>flourish</b>	(of a living organism) grow or develop in a healthy or vigorous way, especially as the result of a particularly congenial environment. <i>The caricaturist and wit who <b>flourished</b> in the early years of this century.</i>
<b>flower</b>	The state or period in which a plant's flowers have developed and opened. <i>Michaelmas daisies can <b>flower</b> as late as October.</i>
<b>flowering</b>	Capable of producing flowers, especially in contrast to a similar plant with the flowers inconspicuous or absent. <i>The <b>flowering</b> of antebellum culture.</i>
<b>herbaceous</b>	Denoting or relating to herbs (in the botanical sense).
<b>hothouse</b>	A greenhouse in which plants are arranged in a pleasing manner. <i><b>Hothouse</b> plants.</i>
<b>lily</b>	Used in names of other plants with flowers or leaves similar to those of the lily e g arum lily.
<b>lotus</b>	White Egyptian lotus water lily of Egypt to southeastern Africa held sacred by the Egyptians. <i>A myth of creation states that Buddha was born of a thousand petalled gold <b>lotus</b>.</i>
<b>narcissus</b>	A bulbous Eurasian plant of a genus that includes the daffodil, especially (in gardening) one with flowers that have white or pale outer petals and a shallow orange or yellow cup in the centre.
<b>nosegay</b>	A small bunch of flowers, typically one that is sweet-scented. <i>A <b>nosegay</b> worn at the waist or bodice.</i>
<b>orchid</b>	The flowering stem of a cultivated orchid.

<b>pedicel</b>	A small stalk bearing a single flower of an inflorescence; an ultimate division of a common peduncle.
<b>petal</b>	Each of the segments of the corolla of a flower, which are modified leaves and are typically coloured.
<b>pimpernel</b>	Any of several plants of the genus <i>Anagallis</i> .
<b>pollinator</b>	An insect that carries pollen from one flower to another. <i>Bees are effective <b>pollinators</b> of fruit and vegetables.</i>
<b>precocity</b>	Intelligence achieved far ahead of normal developmental schedules.
<b>spring</b>	The ability to spring back strongly elasticity. <i>The mattress has lost its <b>spring</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>thrive</u></a>	Make steady progress; be at the high point in one's career or reach a high point in historical significance or importance. <i>The new baby <b>thrived</b>.</i>
<b>tulip</b>	Any of numerous perennial bulbous herbs having linear or broadly lanceolate leaves and usually a single showy flower.
