### Definitions of "Blur" as a noun

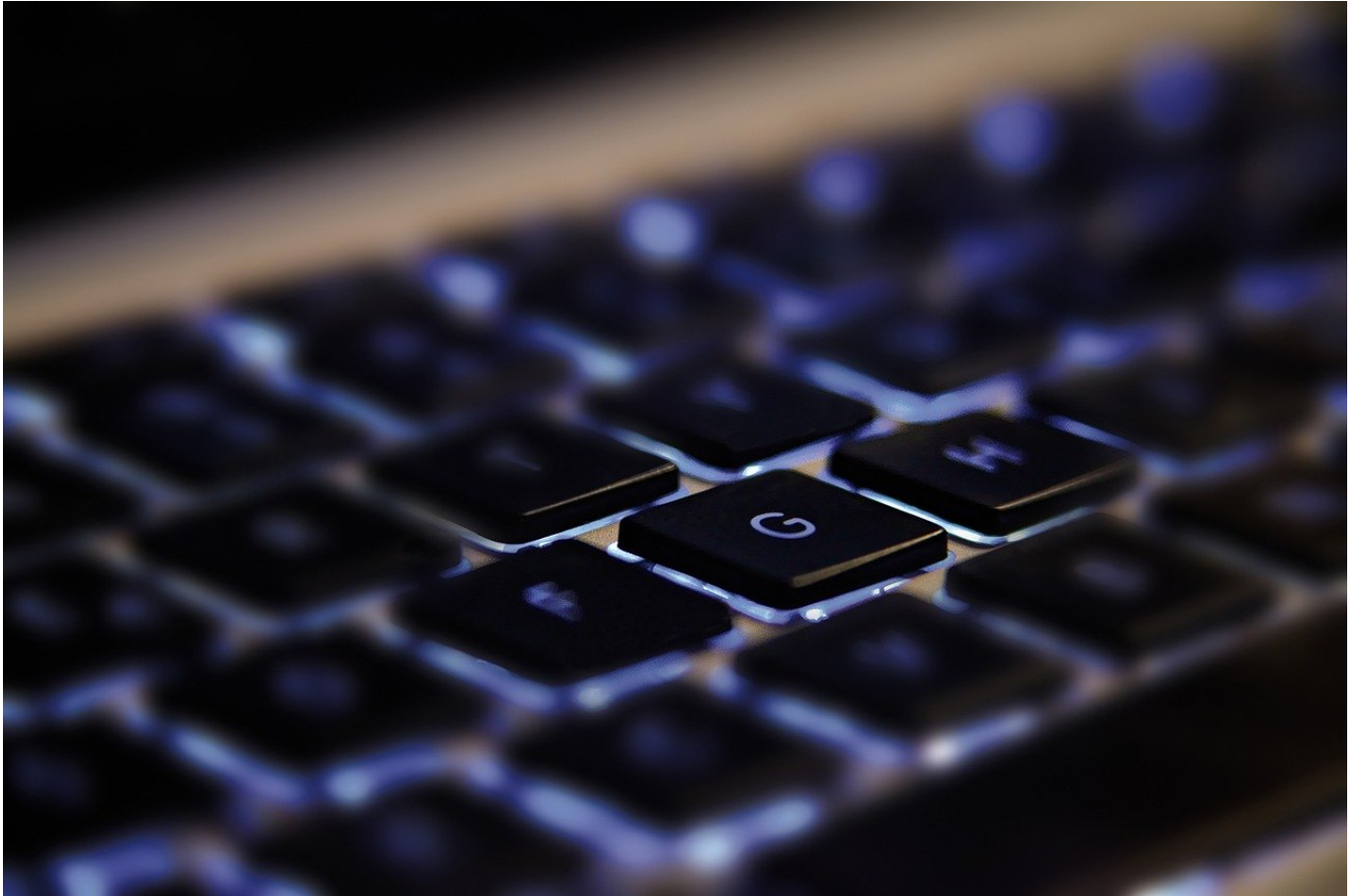
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “blur” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A hazy or indistinct representation.*
- *Something remembered or perceived indistinctly, typically because it happened very fast.*
- *A thing that cannot be seen or heard clearly.*



### Synonyms of "Blur" as a noun (6 Words)

- cloud** A cause of worry or gloom or trouble.  
*The sky was almost free of **cloud**.*
- fuzz** A frizzy mass of hair or fibre.  
*She saw Jess surrounded by a **fuzz** of sunlight.*
- haze** A very fine cloud of something such as vapour or smoke in the air.  
*An alcoholic **haze**.*
- mist** A thin fog with condensation near the ground.  
*A **mist** rose out of the river.*
- smear** An insecure foothold.  
*There was an oil **smear** on his jacket.*
- smudge** A blurred or smeared mark on the surface of something.  
*He had a **smudge** on his cheek.*

## Blur as a Verb

### Definitions of "Blur" as a verb

- *To make less distinct or clear.*
- *Make a smudge on; soil by smudging.*
- *Become glassy; lose clear vision.*
- *Become vague or indistinct.*
- *Make or become unclear or less distinct.*
- *Make unclear, indistinct, or blurred.*
- *Make dim or indistinct.*



## Synonyms of "Blur" as a verb (29 Words)

<b>become dim</b>	Enhance the appearance of.
<b>become less sharp</b>	Come into existence.
<b>blear</b>	Make dim; blur. <i>He <b>bleared</b> his eyes with books.</i>
<b>confuse</b>	Make unclear, indistinct, or blurred. <i>These questions <b>confuse</b> even the experts.</i>
<b>deaden</b>	Lessen the momentum or velocity of. <i>Laughter might <b>deaden</b> us to the moral issue.</i>
<b>decrease</b>	Decrease in size extent or range. <i>He <b>decreased</b> his staff.</i>
<b><u>dim</u></b>	Make dim or lusterless. <i>His eyes <b>dimmed</b>.</i>

<b>diminish</b>	Make or become less. <i>The new law is expected to <b>diminish</b> the government's chances.</i>
<b>dull</b>	Make or become dull or less intense. <i>Too much cutting <b>dulls</b> the knife's edge.</i>
<b>faint</b>	Grow weak or feeble; decline. <i>The fires were <b>fainting</b> there.</i>
<b>film over</b>	Make a film or photograph of something.
<b>glaze over</b>	Coat with a glaze.
<b>lessen</b>	Decrease in size, extent, or range. <i>The warmth of the afternoon <b>lessened</b>.</i>
<b>make indistinct</b>	Develop into.
<b>make less distinct</b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages.
<b>make unclear</b>	Charge with a function; charge to be.
<b>make vague</b>	Change from one form into another.
<b>mute</b>	Muffle the sound of a musical instrument especially by the use of a mute. <i>When <b>muted</b> and blown hard the trombone produces a very nasal and metallic sound.</i>
<b>numb</b>	Make numb or insensitive. <i>Vodka might <b>numb</b> the pain in my hand.</i>
<b>obnubilate</b>	Make unclear, indistinct, or blurred. <i>Never to be short of illusions to <b>obnubilate</b> himself such was his dream.</i>
<b>obscure</b>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>The big elm tree <b>obscures</b> our view of the valley.</i>
<b>reduce</b>	Reduce in scope while retaining essential elements. <i>The cook <b>reduced</b> the sauce by boiling it for a long time.</i>
<b>slur</b>	Of words or speech be slurred. <i>Essential attributes are being <b>slurred</b> over or ignored.</i>
<b>smear</b>	Cover a surface by smearing a substance over it. <i>Her lipstick was <b>smear</b>ed.</i>
<b>smudge</b>	Make a smudge on soil by smudging. <i>She dabbed her eyes careful not to <b>smudge</b> her make up.</i>
<b>smutch</b>	Make a smudge on; soil by smudging.

<b>soften</b>	Make or become soft or softer. <i>A major injection of private cash could <b>soften</b> the blow for the taxpayer.</i>
<b>tone down</b>	Change to a color image.
<b>unfocus</b>	Cause to lose concentration or attention. <i>I found it helpful to slightly <b>unfocus</b> my eyes.</i>



### Usage Examples of "Blur" as a verb

- *The distinction between the two theories blurred.*
- *His novels blur the boundaries between criticism and fiction.*
- *In front of him the page blurred.*
- *The haze blurs the hills.*
- *The fog blurs my vision.*
- *Tears blurred her vision.*





## Associations of "Blur" (30 Words)

<b>ambiguous</b>	Open to two or more interpretations; or of uncertain nature or significance; or (often) intended to mislead. <i>An <b>ambiguous</b> situation with no frame of reference.</i>
<b>ambivalent</b>	Uncertain or unable to decide about what course to follow. <i>Some loved her some hated her few were <b>ambivalent</b> about her.</i>
<b>blurred</b>	Unable to see or be seen clearly. <i>A landscape of <b>blurred</b> outlines.</i>
<b>blurry</b>	Unable to perceive clear or sharp images. <i>Video projectors provided extremely <b>blurry</b> images.</i>
<b>cloud</b>	Darken the sky with cloud. <i>The stroke <b>clouded</b> memories of her youth.</i>
<b>cloudy</b>	(of a person's eyes) misted with tears. <i>A very grey <b>cloudy</b> day.</i>
<b>dim</b>	Become dim or lusterless. <i>The <b>dim</b> glow of the fire.</i>



<b><u>faint</u></b>	Pass out from weakness, physical or emotional distress due to a loss of blood supply to the brain. <i>She sent him a <b>faint</b> answering smile.</i>
<b><u>foggy</u></b>	Indistinctly expressed or remembered; obscure. <i>A dark and <b>foggy</b> night.</i>
<b><u>hazy</u></b>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>School leavers were often <b>hazy</b> about employment.</i>
<b>illegibility</b>	The quality of writing (print or handwriting) that cannot be deciphered.
<b>imprecision</b>	Lack of exactness or accuracy. <i>All scientific measurements come with some degree of <b>imprecision</b>.</i>
<b><u>inconspicuous</u></b>	Not clearly visible or attracting attention. <i>He pushed the string through an <b>inconspicuous</b> hole.</i>
<b>indefinite</b>	Not clearly expressed or defined; vague. <i>Were <b>indefinite</b> about their plans.</i>
<b>indistinct</b>	Not clearly defined or easy to perceive or understand. <i>Only <b>indistinct</b> notions of what to do.</i>
<b>lightproof</b>	Not penetrable by light. <i>A <b>lightproof</b> envelope.</i>
<b><u>loom</u></b>	Weave on a loom. <i>Large shadows <b>loomed</b> on the canyon wall.</i>
<b>misty</b>	Filled or abounding with fog or mist. <i>The <b>misty</b> evening.</i>
<b>nebulous</b>	Lacking definite form or limits- H.T.Moore. <i><b>Nebulous</b> distinction between pride and conceit.</i>
<b><u>obscure</u></b>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>An impulse to go off and fight certain <b>obscure</b> battles of his own spirit.</i>
<b><u>opaque</u></b>	An opaque thing. <i>Technical jargon that was <b>opaque</b> to her.</i>
<b><u>slur</u></b>	Mark notes with a slur. <i>I can play it if I don't <b>slur</b> the notes.</i>
<b>smudge</b>	Make a smudge on soil by smudging. <i>Mascaras that <b>smudge</b> or flake around the eyes.</i>
<b><u>subtlety</u></b>	A subtle difference in meaning or opinion or attitude. <i>The textural <b>subtlety</b> of Degas.</i>
<b><u>unclear</u></b>	Not obvious or definite; ambiguous. <i>Users are still <b>unclear</b> about what middleware does.</i>

Not different or differentiated.

**undifferentiated** *By six weeks the sexual glands are as yet **undifferentiated** between male and female.*

**unnoticeable**

Not obtrusive or undesirably noticeable.

*Her clothes were simple and **unnoticeable**.*

**vague**

Lacking clarity or distinctness.

*Their descriptions of human behavior become **vague** dull and unclear.*

**vaguely**

In a vague way.

*He **vaguely** remembered talking to her once.*

**wispy**

Thin and weak.

*A **wispy** little fellow with small hands and feet.*
