## Blushing as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Blushing" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “blushing” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Pink or pale red.*
- *Red in the face from shyness, embarrassment, or shame.*
- *Having a red face from embarrassment or shame or agitation or emotional upset.*



## Synonyms of "Blushing" as an adjective (29 Words)

<b><a href="#">ashamed</a></b>	Embarrassed or guilty because of one's actions, characteristics, or associations. <i>You should be <b>ashamed</b> of yourself.</i>
<b>blushful</b>	Of blush color. <i><b>Blushful</b> mists.</i>
<b>chagrined</b>	Feeling or caused to feel ill at ease or self-conscious or ashamed. <i><b>Chagrined</b> at the poor sales of his book.</i>
<b>confounded</b>	Used for emphasis, especially to express anger or annoyance. <i>A cloudy and <b>confounded</b> philosopher.</i>
<b>confused</b>	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>Reports about the incident were rather <b>confused</b>.</i>
<b>crestfallen</b>	Sad and disappointed. <i>He came back empty handed and <b>crestfallen</b>.</i>
<b>discomfited</b>	Disappointingly unsuccessful.

<b>discomposed</b>	Disturbed or agitated. <i>She looked a little <b>discomposed</b> as she spoke.</i>
<b>disconcerted</b>	Having self-possession upset; thrown into confusion- G.B.Shaw. <i>Looked at each other dumbly quite <b>disconcerted</b>.</i>
<b>dismayed</b>	Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.
<b>distressed</b>	Suffering from extreme anxiety, sorrow, or pain. <i><b>Distressed</b> about her son s leaving home.</i>
<b>dumbfounded</b>	As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise. <i>Jay explained to a <b>dumbfounded</b> Nick.</i>
<b>embarrassed</b>	Feeling or caused to feel ill at ease or self-conscious or ashamed. <i>I felt quite <b>embarrassed</b> whenever I talked to her.</i>
<b>humbled</b>	Low or inferior in station or quality.
<b>humiliated</b>	Made to feel uncomfortable because of shame or wounded pride. <i><b>Humiliated</b> that his wife had to go out to work.</i>
<b>mortified</b>	Suffering from tissue death. <i>Felt <b>mortified</b> by the comparison with her sister.</i>
<b>nonplussed</b>	So surprised and confused that one is unsure how to react. <i>Henry looked completely <b>nonplussed</b>.</i>
<b>perturbed</b>	Feeling anxiety or concern; unsettled. <i>She didn t seem <b>perturbed</b> about the noises around her.</i>
<b>pink</b>	(of wine) rosé. <i>Bright <b>pink</b> lipstick.</i>
<b>pinkish</b>	Of a light shade of red.
<b>red</b>	Especially of the face reddened or suffused with or as if with blood from emotion or exertion. <i>Her <b>red</b> lips.</i>
<b>red-faced</b>	Reddened or suffused with or as if with blood from emotion or exertion.
<b>reddish</b>	Having a red tinge; slightly red. <i><b>Reddish</b> sandstone.</i>
<b>remorseful</b>	Filled with remorse; sorry. <i>The defendant was <b>remorseful</b> for what he had done.</i>
<b>rose pink</b>	Of something having a dusty purplish pink color.
<b>rose red</b>	Of something having a dusty purplish pink color.
<b>roseate</b>	Used in names of birds with partly pink plumage e g roseate tern. <i>His letters home give a very good although somewhat too <b>roseate</b> idea of how he lived.</i>

- shamefaced** Showing a sense of guilt.  
*The hangdog and **shamefaced** air of the retreating enemy.*
- sheepish** Like or suggestive of a sheep in docility or stupidity or meekness or timidity.  
*A **sheepish** grin.*



### Usage Examples of "Blushing" as an adjective

- *The blushing boy was brought before the Principal.*
- *The trees are loaded with blushing blossoms.*
- *I'm no blushing adolescent giggling at the mere mention of a four-letter word.*





## Associations of "Blushing" (30 Words)

### abashed

Feeling or caused to feel uneasy and self-conscious.  
*Harriet looked slightly **abashed**.*

### **annoyed**

Slightly angry; irritated.  
*Kelly was **annoyed** with him.*

### ashamed

Reluctant to do something through fear of embarrassment or humiliation.  
*Felt **ashamed** of my torn coat.*

### **awkward**

Socially uncomfortable; unsure and constrained in manner.  
*You have put me in a very **awkward** position.*

### bemused

Puzzled, confused, or bewildered.  
*As distant and **bemused** as a professor listening to the prattling of his freshman class.*

<b>bewildered</b>	Perplexed by many conflicting situations or statements; filled with bewilderment. <i>He saw the <b>bewildered</b> look on my face.</i>
<b><u>confession</u></b>	The religious body or Church sharing a confession of faith. <i>A Protestant <b>confession</b> of faith.</i>
<b>confuse</b>	Cause to feel embarrassment. <i>The constant attention of the young man <b>confused</b> her.</i>
<b>criminal</b>	Bringing or deserving severe rebuke or censure. <i>These men are dangerous <b>criminals</b>.</i>
<b><u>delinquent</u></b>	A delinquent person. <i><b>Delinquent</b> accounts.</i>
<b>discomfit</b>	Make (someone) feel uneasy or embarrassed. <i>He was not noticeably <b>discomfited</b> by her tone.</i>
<b>disconcert</b>	Cause to lose one's composure. <i>The abrupt change of subject <b>disconcerted</b> her.</i>
<b>disgraced</b>	Having fallen from favour or a position of power or honour; discredited. <i>The <b>disgraced</b> city financier.</i>
<b><u>embarrassed</u></b>	Having or showing financial difficulties. <i>I felt quite <b>embarrassed</b> whenever I talked to her.</i>
<b>embarrassing</b>	Causing embarrassment. <i>Awkward or <b>embarrassing</b> or difficult moments in the discussion.</i>
<b>embarrassment</b>	A person or thing causing feelings of embarrassment. <i>The outcome of the vote was an <b>embarrassment</b> for the liberals.</i>
<b>exculpate</b>	Show or declare that (someone) is not guilty of wrongdoing. <i>The article <b>exculpated</b> the mayor.</i>
<b><u>flush</u></b>	The device used for flushing a toilet. <i>A speculator <b>flush</b> with cash.</i>
<b>fluster</b>	Be flustered behave in a confused manner. <i>The false start <b>flustered</b> me a bit.</i>
<b>guilty</b>	Responsible for or chargeable with a reprehensible act. <i>A <b>guilty</b> secret.</i>
<b>hangdog</b>	Frightened into submission or compliance. <i>The <b>hangdog</b> and shamefaced air of the retreating enemy.</i>
<b><u>humiliating</u></b>	Causing awareness of your shortcomings. <i>A <b>humiliating</b> defeat.</i>
<b>perplex</b>	Complicate or confuse (a matter). <i>She was <b>perplexed</b> by her husband s moodiness.</i>

<b><u>perplexed</u></b>	Completely baffled; very puzzled. <i><b>Perplexed</b> language.</i>
<b><u>shame</u></b>	Make someone feel ashamed. <i>The entire debacle has <b>shamed</b> Scotland.</i>
<b>shoplift</b>	Steal in a store. <i>She was caught <b>shoplifting</b> a pair of shoes.</i>
<b><u>sin</u></b>	Commit a sin violate a law of God or a moral law. <i>A <b>sin</b> in the eyes of God.</i>
<b><u>stymie</u></b>	A thwarting and distressing situation. <i>The changes must not be allowed to <b>stymie</b> new medical treatments.</i>
<b>thrill</b>	Cause to be thrilled by some perceptual input. <i>I m <b>thrilled</b> to bits.</i>
<b><u>troubled</u></b>	Characterized by or indicative of distress or affliction or danger or need. <i>These <b>troubled</b> areas.</i>
