- chaperone** An older woman responsible for the decorous behaviour of a young unmarried woman at social occasions.
Chaperones sat at the edge of the dance gossiping and watching.
- companion** A friend who is frequently in the company of another.
*My **companions** in misfortune.*
- defender** A person who defends someone or something.
*Owen surged between two **defenders** then drove the ball out of the reach of the goalkeeper.*
- guard** The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team.
*The left **guard** was injured on the play.*
- guardian** A person who is legally responsible for the care of someone who is unable to manage their own affairs, especially a child whose parents have died.
*I am acting as **guardian** of my late brother s family.*
- keeper** A fish large enough to be kept when caught.
*These lakes consistently give up healthy pound size **keepers**.*
- protector** A person who cares for persons or property.
*Ear **protectors**.*

aide	Someone who acts as assistant. <i>A presidential aide.</i>
captor	A person who captures and holds people or animals. <i>He managed to escape from his captors two nights later.</i>
chaperone	Accompany as a chaperone. <i>She chaperoned the children at all times.</i>
conservancy	The official conservation of trees and soil and rivers etc. <i>From the point of view of nature conservancy I'd rather see it left unspoilt.</i>
convoy	A collection of merchant ships with an escort of warships. <i>The warships convoyed the merchant ships across the Pacific.</i>
cortege	A funeral procession.
defence	The counsel for the defendant in a lawsuit. <i>She came to the defence of the eccentric professor.</i>
<u>defend</u>	Compete to retain (a title or seat) in a contest or election. <i>He is a lawyer who specializes in defending political prisoners.</i>
defense	An unconscious process that tries to reduce the anxiety associated with instinctive desires. <i>The artillery battered down the defenses.</i>
defensible	Justifiable by argument. <i>A fort with a defensible yard at its feet.</i>
<u>entourage</u>	The group following and attending to some important person. <i>An entourage of loyal courtiers.</i>
fender	An inclined metal frame at the front of a locomotive to clear the track. <i>In Britain they call a fender a wing.</i>
guard	The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team. <i>Soldiers on guard duty.</i>
ironclad	Sheathed in iron plates for protection. <i>An ironclad guarantee.</i>
protect	Restrict access to or use of (data or a memory location). <i>Free speech is protected under Article 33 of the Constitution.</i>
protecting	Shielding (or designed to shield) against harm or discomfort. <i>A protecting alibi.</i>

<u>protector</u>	A person who cares for persons or property. <i>A man who became her protector adviser and friend.</i>
<u>ranger</u>	A keeper of a park, forest, or area of countryside. <i>Park rangers.</i>
retinue	The group following and attending to some important person. <i>The rock star s retinue of security guards and personal cooks.</i>
safeguard	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>An insurance policy is a good safeguard.</i>
<u>secretive</u>	(of a state or activity) characterized by the concealment of intentions and information. <i>She was very secretive about her past.</i>
<u>security</u>	Procedures followed or measures taken to ensure the security of a state or organization. <i>The watch dog gave her a feeling of security.</i>
sentry	A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>Two men stood sentry on the door every evening.</i>
<u>shelter</u>	Provide shelter for. <i>An air raid shelter.</i>
tenable	(of an office, position, scholarship, etc.) able to be held or used. <i>Such a simplistic approach is no longer tenable.</i>
<u>ward</u>	The grooves in the bit of a key that correspond to the wards in a lock. <i>The second most marginal ward in Westminster.</i>
watchman	A guard who keeps watch. <i>A night watchman.</i>
waterproofing	A coating capable of making a surface waterproof.
