- companion** A friend who is frequently in the company of another.  
*My **companions** in misfortune.*
- defender** A person who defends someone or something.  
*Owen surged between two **defenders** then drove the ball out of the reach of the goalkeeper.*
- guard** The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team.  
*The left **guard** was injured on the play.*
- guardian** A person who is legally responsible for the care of someone who is unable to manage their own affairs, especially a child whose parents have died.  
*I am acting as **guardian** of my late brother s family.*
- keeper** A fish large enough to be kept when caught.  
*These lakes consistently give up healthy pound size **keepers**.*
- protector** A person who cares for persons or property.  
*Ear **protectors**.*

<b>aide</b>	Someone who acts as assistant. <i>A presidential <b>aide</b>.</i>
<b>captor</b>	A person who captures and holds people or animals. <i>He managed to escape from his <b>captors</b> two nights later.</i>
<b>chaperone</b>	Accompany as a chaperone. <i>She <b>chaperoned</b> the children at all times.</i>
<b>conservancy</b>	The official conservation of trees and soil and rivers etc. <i>From the point of view of nature <b>conservancy</b> I'd rather see it left unspoilt.</i>
<b>convoy</b>	A collection of merchant ships with an escort of warships. <i>The warships <b>convoyed</b> the merchant ships across the Pacific.</i>
<b>cortege</b>	A funeral procession.
<b>defence</b>	The counsel for the defendant in a lawsuit. <i>She came to the <b>defence</b> of the eccentric professor.</i>
<b><u>defend</u></b>	Compete to retain (a title or seat) in a contest or election. <i>He is a lawyer who specializes in <b>defending</b> political prisoners.</i>
<b>defense</b>	An unconscious process that tries to reduce the anxiety associated with instinctive desires. <i>The artillery battered down the <b>defenses</b>.</i>
<b>defensible</b>	Justifiable by argument. <i>A fort with a <b>defensible</b> yard at its feet.</i>
<b><u>entourage</u></b>	The group following and attending to some important person. <i>An <b>entourage</b> of loyal courtiers.</i>
<b>fender</b>	An inclined metal frame at the front of a locomotive to clear the track. <i>In Britain they call a <b>fender</b> a wing.</i>
<b>guard</b>	The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team. <i>Soldiers on <b>guard</b> duty.</i>
<b>ironclad</b>	Sheathed in iron plates for protection. <i>An <b>ironclad</b> guarantee.</i>
<b>protect</b>	Restrict access to or use of (data or a memory location). <i>Free speech is <b>protected</b> under Article 33 of the Constitution.</i>
<b>protecting</b>	Shielding (or designed to shield) against harm or discomfort. <i>A <b>protecting</b> alibi.</i>

<b><u>protector</u></b>	A person who cares for persons or property. <i>A man who became her <b>protector</b> adviser and friend.</i>
<b><u>ranger</u></b>	A keeper of a park, forest, or area of countryside. <i>Park <b>rangers</b>.</i>
<b>retinue</b>	The group following and attending to some important person. <i>The rock star s <b>retinue</b> of security guards and personal cooks.</i>
<b>safeguard</b>	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>An insurance policy is a good <b>safeguard</b>.</i>
<b><u>secretive</u></b>	(of a state or activity) characterized by the concealment of intentions and information. <i>She was very <b>secretive</b> about her past.</i>
<b><u>security</u></b>	Procedures followed or measures taken to ensure the security of a state or organization. <i>The watch dog gave her a feeling of <b>security</b>.</i>
<b>sentry</b>	A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>Two men stood <b>sentry</b> on the door every evening.</i>
<b><u>shelter</u></b>	Provide shelter for. <i>An air raid <b>shelter</b>.</i>
<b>tenable</b>	(of an office, position, scholarship, etc.) able to be held or used. <i>Such a simplistic approach is no longer <b>tenable</b>.</i>
<b><u>ward</u></b>	The grooves in the bit of a key that correspond to the wards in a lock. <i>The second most marginal <b>ward</b> in Westminster.</i>
<b>watchman</b>	A guard who keeps watch. <i>A night <b>watchman</b>.</i>
<b>waterproofing</b>	A coating capable of making a surface waterproof.
