<b>original</b>	Being or productive of something fresh and unusual; or being as first made or thought of. <i>A subtle and <b>original</b> thinker.</i>
<b>unconventional</b>	Not based on or conforming to what is generally done or believed. <i>An <b>unconventional</b> marriage.</i>
<b>unorthodox</b>	Independent in behavior or thought. <i>He frequently upset other scholars with his <b>unorthodox</b> views.</i>

<b>dignity</b>	The state or quality of being worthy of honour or respect. <i>It was beneath his <b>dignity</b> to shout.</i>
<b>elitism</b>	The superior attitude or behaviour associated with an elite. <i>I've been accused of <b>elitism</b> and snobbery because of my views on grammar and spelling.</i>
<b>elitist</b>	Relating to or supporting the view that a society or system should be led by an elite. <i>The image of polo as an <b>elitist</b> sport.</i>
<b>esquire</b>	(Middle Ages) an attendant and shield bearer to a knight; a candidate for knighthood. <i>The lord of the manor, Richard Bethell <b>Esquire</b>.</i>
<b>gentleman</b>	A man of refinement. <i>Opposite her an old <b>gentleman</b> sat reading.</i>
<b>gentry</b>	People of good social position, specifically the class of people next below the nobility in position and birth. <i>A member of the landed <b>gentry</b>.</i>
<b>intelligentsia</b>	Intellectuals or highly educated people as a group, especially when regarded as possessing culture and political influence. <i>The belief that the liberal <b>intelligentsia</b> is ruining the country.</i>
<b>lifestyle</b>	Denoting advertising or products designed to appeal to a consumer by association with a desirable lifestyle. <i>The latest <b>lifestyle</b> trends in the retail industries.</i>
<b>manner</b>	A way in which a thing is done or happens. <i>Trevor apologized for his son's bad <b>manners</b>.</i>

<b><u>nobility</u></b>	The group of people belonging to the highest social class in a country; the aristocracy. <i>A member of the English <b>nobility</b>.</i>
<b>nobleman</b>	A man who belongs by rank, title, or birth to the aristocracy; a peer.
<b>patrician</b>	An aristocrat or nobleman. <i>A <b>patrician</b> nose.</i>
<b>peerage</b>	The peers of a kingdom considered as a group. <i>He was elevated to the <b>peerage</b> two years ago.</i>
<b>plutocracy</b>	Government by the wealthy. <i>Officials were drawn from the new <b>plutocracy</b>.</i>
<b><u>politics</u></b>	The opinion you hold with respect to political questions. <i>Thereafter he dropped out of active <b>politics</b>.</i>
<b>regal</b>	Of, resembling, or fit for a monarch, especially in being magnificent or dignified. <i>Her <b>regal</b> bearing.</i>
<b><u>royal</u></b>	Invested with royal power as symbolized by a crown. <i>She received a <b>royal</b> welcome.</i>
