## **Boil as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Boil" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “boil” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The temperature at which a liquid bubbles and turns to vapour.*
- *The process of heating a liquid to the temperature at which it bubbles and turns to vapour.*
- *A state of great activity or excitement.*
- *A painful sore with a hard core filled with pus.*
- *The temperature at which a liquid boils at sea level.*
- *A casual outdoor meal at which shellfish is prepared by boiling.*
- *A dish of shellfish boiled in a large pot with sweetcorn, potatoes, and other ingredients.*
- *A sudden rise of a fish at a fly.*



### Synonyms of "Boil" as a noun (4 Words)

- 100 degrees celsius** A position on a scale of intensity or amount or quality.
- 100 degrees centigrade** The seriousness of something (e.g., a burn or crime).
- boiling point** The application of heat to change something from a liquid to a gas.
- furuncle** A painful sore with a hard core filled with pus.

## Boil as a Verb

### Definitions of "Boil" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "boil" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *(of a person or strong emotion) be stirred up.*
- *(with reference to a kettle, pan, or other container) heat or be heated until the liquid inside starts to boil.*
- *(of the sea or clouds) be turbulent and stormy.*
- *Be agitated.*
- *(with reference to a liquid) reach or cause to reach the temperature at which it bubbles and turns to vapour.*
- *Come to the boiling point and change from a liquid to vapor.*
- *Immerse or be immersed in a boiling liquid, often for cooking purposes.*

- *Be in an agitated emotional state.*
- *Wash or sterilize in very hot water.*
- *Execute (someone) by subjecting them to the heat of boiling liquid.*
- *(with reference to food) cook or be cooked by immersing in boiling water or stock.*
- *Bring to, or maintain at, the boiling point.*

<b>be angry</b>	Form or compose.
<b>be furious</b>	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
<b>be indignant</b>	Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.
<b>be turbulent</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>bring to the boil</b>	Cause to happen or to occur as a consequence.
<b><u>bubble</u></b>	Of a liquid form rising bubbles of gas or air. <i>Close by a stream <b>bubbled</b> along through reeds and rushes.</i>

<b>churn</b>	Produce butter by churning milk or cream. <i>The seas <b>churned</b>.</i>
<b>cook</b>	Tamper, with the purpose of deception. <i>While the rice is <b>cooking</b> add the saffron to the stock.</i>
<b>effervesce</b>	(of a liquid) give off bubbles. <i>The waves seemed to <b>effervesce</b> as they swept by.</i>
<b>fizz</b>	Become bubbly or frothy or foaming. <i>Anticipation began to <b>fizz</b> through his veins.</i>
<b>foam</b>	Become bubbly or frothy or foaming. <i>The river was <b>foaming</b>.</i>
<b>froth</b>	Become bubbly or frothy or foaming. <i>The cinema lobby <b>frothed</b> with indignation.</i>
<b>fume</b>	Treat with fumes expose to fumes especially with the aim of disinfecting or eradicating pests. <i>We simply cannot have this she <b>fumed</b>.</i>
<b>heat</b>	Gain heat or get hot. <i>The sun <b>heats</b> the oceans.</i>
<b>moil</b>	Be agitated. <i>Men who <b>moiled</b> for gold.</i>
<b>rage</b>	Be violent; as of fires and storms. <i>That s unfair Maggie <b>raged</b>.</i>
<b>roil</b>	Make (someone) annoyed or irritated. <i>The sea <b>roiled</b> below her.</i>
<b>seethe</b>	Be noisy with activity. <i>We cascaded down the stairs and <b>seethed</b> across the station.</i>
<b>simmer</b>	Exist in a suppressed state. <i><b>Simmer</b> the sauce.</i>
<b>smoulder</b>	Show or feel barely suppressed anger, hatred, or another powerful emotion. <i>Anna <b>smouldered</b> with indignation.</i>
<b>stew</b>	(of tea) become strong and bitter with prolonged brewing. <i>Beef <b>stewed</b> in wine.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Boil" as a verb

- *She boiled the kettle and took down a couple of mugs.*
- *Water boils at 100 degrees Celsius.*
- *Boil this liquid until it evaporates.*
- *The kettle boiled and he filled the teapot.*
- *Boil the potatoes until well done.*
- *One valet was ordered to be boiled alive.*
- *Boil bedclothes and towels.*
- *Boil wool.*
- *We asked people to boil their drinking water.*
- *She stood gazing out of the lighthouse window as the sea boiled beneath her.*
- *He waited for the water to boil.*
- *Boil potatoes.*
- *He was boiling with rage.*
- *You can put the salad together while the pasta is boiling.*



## Associations of "Boil" (30 Words)

- bacon** English statesman and philosopher; precursor of British empiricism; advocated inductive reasoning (1561-1626).  
*A **bacon** sandwich.*
- bake** A social gathering at which baked food of a specified kind is eaten.  
*They **bake** their own bread and cakes.*
- baked** Cooked by dry heat (as in an oven).  
*Sun**baked** salt flats.*
- broil** Cook under a broiler.  
*The countryside lay **broiling** in the sun.*
- broth** Liquid in which meat and vegetables are simmered; used as a basis for e.g. soups or sauces.  
*The pig made five pots of **broth**.*



<b>cake</b>	Baked goods made from or based on a mixture of flour, sugar, eggs, and fat. <i>A <b>cake</b> of soap.</i>
<b>churn</b>	Produce butter by churning milk or cream. <i>The seas <b>churned</b>.</i>
<b>cooking</b>	Suitable for or used in cooking. <i><b>Cooking</b> chocolate.</i>
<b>crisp</b>	A wafer thin slice of potato fried or baked until crisp and eaten as a snack. <i>Her answer was <b>crisp</b>.</i>
<b>curry</b>	A pungent dish of vegetables or meats flavored with curry powder and usually eaten with rice. <i>I ve been eating a lot of <b>curry</b>.</i>
<b>fried</b>	Exhausted or worn out. <i>A breakfast of <b>fried</b> eggs and bacon.</i>
<b>fritter</b>	Spend frivolously and unwisely. <i>I wish we hadn t <b>frittered</b> the money away so easily.</i>
<b>fry</b>	Execute or be executed by electrocution. <i>Drugs <b>fry</b> the brain.</i>
<b>grill</b>	Cook food using a grill. <i>A <b>grill</b> pan.</i>
<b>kettle</b>	The quantity a kettle will hold. <i>Activists in the <b>kettle</b> were protesting at being held and resisting arrest.</i>
<b>mutton</b>	Meat from a mature domestic sheep. <i>A leg of <b>mutton</b>.</i>
<b>oven</b>	An enclosed compartment, usually part of a cooker, for cooking and heating food. <i>The sun was beating down on to my little tent and it was like an <b>oven</b> in there.</i>
<b>pan</b>	Wash gravel in a pan to separate out gold. <i>Prospectors <b>panned</b> for gold in the Yukon.</i>
<b>pie</b>	A prehistoric unrecorded language that was the ancestor of all Indo-European languages. <i>A good meal of hot <b>pie</b> and peas.</i>
<b>recipe</b>	Directions for making something. <i>A traditional Yorkshire <b>recipe</b>.</i>
<b>roast</b>	An outdoor party at which meat of a particular type is roasted. <i>This is the <b>roast</b> most likely to be used in espresso.</i>
<b>sauce</b>	Provide a sauce for something season with a sauce. <i>A boy had <b>sauced</b> a monitor who wanted his shoes shined.</i>

- scald** Any of a number of plant diseases which produce an effect similar to that of scalding especially a disease of fruit marked by browning and caused by excessive sunlight bad storage conditions or atmospheric pollution.  
*Scald the milk.*
- seethe** (of a person) be filled with intense but unexpressed anger.  
*The grey ocean **seethed**.*
- simmer** Exist in a suppressed state.  
*She gave him time to **simmer** down after their argument.*
- soup** A substance or mixture regarded as resembling soup in appearance or consistency.  
*A bowl of tomato **soup**.*
- spatter** The noise of something spattering or sputtering explosively.  
*The baby **spattered** the bib with food.*
- stew** Food prepared by stewing especially meat or fish with vegetables.  
*Sweaty clothes left to **stew** in a plastic bag.*
- vaporize** Turn into gas.  
*All my stock assets have **vaporized**.*
