- *A long pin that is driven into a rock face so that a rope can be attached to it.*
- *A screw that screws into a nut to form a fastener.*
- *A sliding bar in a breech-loading firearm that ejects an empty cartridge and replaces it and closes the breech.*

- *The sliding piece of the breech mechanism of a rifle.*
- *The part of a lock that is engaged or withdrawn with a key.*
- *A sudden abandonment (as from a political party).*
- *A bar that slides into a socket to fasten a door or window.*
- *The act of moving with great haste.*
- *A long pin with a head that screws into a nut, used to fasten things together.*
- *A roll of cloth or wallpaper of a definite length.*
- *A jagged white flash of lightning.*
- *A discharge of lightning accompanied by thunder.*

bolt of lightning	The part of a lock that is engaged or withdrawn with a key.
burst	The act of exploding or bursting. <i>The burst of an atom bomb creates enormous radiation aloft.</i>
catch	An act of catching something typically a ball. <i>I mistakenly thought he would be a good catch.</i>
<u>dart</u>	A small pointed missile with a feather or plastic flight used in the game of darts. <i>Jack s first dart pierced the treble twenty.</i>
dash	Impetuous or flamboyant vigour and confidence; panache. <i>A casual atmosphere with a dash of sophistication.</i>
deadbolt	The part of a lock that is engaged or withdrawn with a key.
discharge	A substance that has been discharged. <i>Those germs might lead to vaginal discharge.</i>
fastener	Restraint that attaches to something or holds something in place. <i>He found the door fastened and wondered who the fastener was.</i>
<u>flare</u>	A sudden burst of intense emotion. <i>Infection can cause a lupus flare.</i>
flash	A newsflash. <i>A flash of emotion swept over him.</i>
fulmination	The act of exploding with noise and violence. <i>A second of silence not long enough for the echo of the previous fulminations to fade away.</i>
hasp	A slotted hinged metal plate forming part of a fastening for a door or lid, fitted over a loop and secured by a pin or padlock. <i>The hut was always locked by a large padlock securing a hasp.</i>
latch	Spring-loaded doorlock that can only be opened from the outside with a key. <i>Lifting the latch she pushed the gate open.</i>
<u>lock</u>	A number of interlocked or jammed items. <i>There was a lock every quarter of a mile.</i>
missile	A rocket carrying a warhead of conventional or nuclear explosives; may be ballistic or directed by remote control. <i>The USAF approach uses small missiles fired from conventional fighter aircraft.</i>
peg	A place marked by a peg and allotted to a competitor to fish or shoot from. <i>She put her mac on a peg in the hall.</i>

pin	A piece of jewelry that is pinned onto the wearer s garment. <i>A three pin plug.</i>
projectile	A missile designed to be fired from a gun. <i>They tried to shield Johnson from the projectiles that were being thrown.</i>
<u>quarrel</u>	A heated argument or disagreement, typically about a trivial issue and between people who are usually on good terms. <i>They had a quarrel.</i>
rivet	A device similar to a rivet for holding seams of clothing together. <i>A rectangular plate containing an iron rivet.</i>
shaft	A column of light (as from a beacon). <i>The shaft of a feather.</i>
<u>streak</u>	A continuous period of specified success or luck. <i>A streak of wildness.</i>
thunderbolt	A discharge of lightning accompanied by thunder. <i>The full force of what she had been told hit her like a thunderbolt.</i>

- *Fasten (something) to something else with a long pin that screws into a nut.*
- *Leave suddenly and as if in a hurry.*
- *Run away; usually includes taking something or somebody along.*
- *Fasten (a door or window) with a bar that slides into a socket.*

abscond	(of a person on bail) fail to surrender oneself for custody at the appointed time. <i>The barman absconded with a week s takings.</i>
absquatulate	Run away; usually includes taking something or somebody along. <i>Some overthrown dictator who had absquatulated to the USA.</i>
<u>bar</u>	Mark something with bars or stripes. <i>The job she loved had been barred to her.</i>
batten	Secure with battens. <i>Batten down a ship s hatches.</i>
beetle off	Kill intentionally and with premeditation.
bolt out	Eat hastily without proper chewing.
<u>clamp</u>	Fasten something in place with a clamp. <i>The sander is clamped on to the edge of a workbench.</i>
decamp	Leave suddenly. <i>Now he has decamped to Hollywood.</i>
fasten	Become fixed or fastened. <i>They fastened various nicknames to each other.</i>
go off	Follow a procedure or take a course.
gobble	(of a large organization) incorporate or take over (a smaller one). <i>This small department was gobbled up by the Ministry of Transport.</i>
latch	Fasten with a latch. <i>She latched the door carefully.</i>
<u>lock</u>	Go through a lock on a canal. <i>The therapist noticed that the patient s knees tended to lock in this exercise.</i>
make off	Proceed along a path.
peg	Hang washing on a line with clothes pegs. <i>We ve been pegged next to the winning team.</i>
pin	Attach or fasten with a pin or pins. <i>The black rook on e4 is pinned.</i>
pinion	Cut off the pinion of a wing or bird to prevent flight. <i>He was pinioned to the ground.</i>
rivet	Fasten with a rivet or rivets. <i>The riveted plates of the floor.</i>
run off	Compete in a race.

run out Keep company.


seal Affix a seal to.

secure Fill or close tightly with or as if with a plug.
*The government is concerned to **secure** the economy against too much foreign ownership.*

- slap** Exactly; right.
*Storming out of her room she went **slap** into Luke.*
- slapdash** In a careless or reckless manner.
*The shelves were put up **slapdash**.*
- smack** Exactly; precisely.
*Our mother's house was **smack** in the middle of the city.*
- stiffly** In a severe or strong manner.
*She gently turned the key in the lock where it **stiffly** slid into place.*

bang	Leap jerk bang. <i>The track bangs and is perfect for any house party.</i>
breech	Dress a boy in breeches after he had been in petticoats since birth. <i>Breech presentation occurs in up to 3 per cent of pregnancies at term.</i>
buckle	Fasten with a buckle or buckles. <i>The bridge started shaking and then it began to buckle.</i>
cork	Draw with burnt cork. <i>The balls are doctored and the bats are corked.</i>
crackle	Having the surface decorated with a network of fine cracks as in crackleware. <i>My Rice Krispies crackled in the bowl.</i>
crossbar	Game equipment consisting of a horizontal bar to be jumped or vaulted over.

door	A room that is entered via a door. <i>The office next door.</i>
drill	Make a hole in or through something by using a drill. <i>Drill for oil.</i>
fasten	Become fixed or fastened. <i>A blue nightie that fastens down the back.</i>
grip	A hairgrip. <i>He had to take a grip on his nerves.</i>
hammer	A heavy metal sphere attached to a flexible wire used in the hammer throw. <i>He got hammered for an honest mistake.</i>
helical	In the shape of a coil. <i>Helical molecules.</i>
horizontal	Something that is oriented horizontally. <i>A horizontal surface.</i>
knife	Use a knife on. <i>The victim was knifed to death.</i>
latch	Fasten with a latch. <i>Lifting the latch she pushed the gate open.</i>
lightning	A flash or discharge of lightning. <i>The sky was a mass of black cloud out of which lightnings flashed.</i>
lotus	The flower of the sacred lotus as a symbol in Asian art and religion. <i>A myth of creation states that Buddha was born of a thousand petalled gold lotus.</i>
rivet	Fasten with a rivet or rivets. <i>He was riveted by the newsreels shown on television.</i>
spiral	Form a spiral. <i>He expects the figures to spiral down further.</i>
spiraling	In the shape of a coil.
storm	Attack by storm attack suddenly. <i>The storms that had characterized their relationship had died away.</i>
strike	Undertake strike action against an employer. <i>We must strike the enemy's oil fields.</i>
thunder	Be the case that thunder is being heard. <i>The train thundered through the night.</i>
thunderbolt	A supposed bolt or shaft believed to be the destructive agent in a lightning flash, especially as an attribute of a god such as Jupiter or Thor. <i>The full force of what she had been told hit her like a thunderbolt.</i>

tighten	Become tight or tighter. <i>He tightened up the clips.</i>
truss	Support a roof bridge or other structure with a truss or trusses. <i>When they trussed the roof many things were overlooked.</i>
unlocked	(of a mobile phone) capable of operating on the network of any chosen carrier. <i>With an unlocked phone you can use SIM cards from any service provider.</i>
vise	A holding device attached to a workbench; has two jaws to hold workpiece firmly in place.
whizz	Someone who is dazzlingly skilled in any field. <i>Whizz the mixture to a smooth paste.</i>
