### Definitions of "Bombard" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "bombard" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Attack (a place or person) continuously with bombs, shells, or other missiles.*
- *Direct a stream of high-speed particles at (a substance).*
- *Subject (someone) to a continuous flow of questions, criticisms, or information.*
- *Cast, hurl, or throw repeatedly with some missile.*
- *Direct high energy particles or radiation against.*
- *Address with continuously or persistently, as if with a barrage.*
- *Throw bombs at or attack with bombs.*

- barrage** Address with continuously or persistently as if with a barrage.  
*The speaker was **barraged** by an angry audience.*
- blitz** Attack or seriously damage a place in a blitz.  
*She **blitzed** her own world record in the 400m freestyle.*
- bomb** Attack a place or object with a bomb or bombs.  
*They **bombed** the city at dawn.*
- deluge** Fill quickly beyond capacity; as with a liquid.  
*Caravans were **deluged** by the heavy rains.*
- fire at** Cause to go off.
- fire on** Bake in a kiln so as to harden.
- flood** Cover or submerge an area with water in a flood.  
*The swollen river **flooded** the village.*

<b>inundate</b>	Overwhelm (someone) with things or people to be dealt with. <i>We ve been <b>inundated</b> with complaints from listeners.</i>
<b>pelt</b>	Cast, hurl, or throw repeatedly with some missile. <i>Two boys <b>pelted</b> him with rotten apples.</i>
<b>pepper</b>	Add pepper to. <i>His car was <b>peppered</b> with bullets.</i>
<b>pound</b>	Place or shut up in a pound. <i><b>Pound</b> the cows so they don t stray.</i>
<b>shell</b>	Look for and collect shells by the seashore. <i>He <b>shelled</b> the pitcher for eight runs in the first inning.</i>
<b>snow under</b>	Conceal one's true motives from especially by elaborately feigning good intentions so as to gain an end.
<b>strafe</b>	Attack repeatedly with bombs or machine-gun fire from low-flying aircraft. <i>Military aircraft <b>strafed</b> the village.</i>
<b>swamp</b>	Overwhelm with an excessive amount of something; inundate. <i>A huge wave <b>swamped</b> the canoes.</i>
<b>torpedo</b>	Attack or sink a ship with a torpedo or torpedoes. <i>Fighting between the militias <b>torpedoed</b> peace talks.</i>





## Usage Examples of "Bombard" as a verb

- *They will be bombarded with complaints.*
- *The city was bombarded by federal forces.*
- *The governor was bombarded with requests to grant a pardon to the convicted killer.*

- arm** The part of an armchair or sofa that supports the elbow and forearm of a seated person.

<b>bomber</b>	A bomber jacket. <i>Manny hand rolled a couple of <b>bombers</b>.</i>
<b>burst</b>	Burst outward usually with noise. <i>The mortar <b>bursts</b> were further away than before.</i>
<b>cannon</b>	Make a cannon shot. <i>The gunships blasted arms depots with 105 mm <b>cannon</b> fire and rockets.</i>
<b>detonate</b>	Explode or cause to explode. <i>Two other bombs failed to <b>detonate</b>.</i>
<b>detonation</b>	The action of causing a bomb or explosive device to explode. <i>She was in a control building at the time of <b>detonation</b>.</i>
<b><u>explode</u></b>	Drive from the stage by noisy disapproval. <i>The enemy <b>exploded</b> the bridge.</i>
<b><u>explosion</u></b>	The noise caused by an explosion. <i>An <b>explosion</b> of rage.</i>
<b>explosive</b>	(of a vocal sound) produced with a sharp release of air. <i>An <b>explosive</b> issue.</i>
<b>fighter</b>	A person who does not easily admit defeat in spite of difficulties or opposition. <i>There ll be months of physiotherapy but medical staff say she s a <b>fighter</b>.</i>
<b>firing</b>	The act of firing weapons or artillery at an enemy. <i>The colours had suffered in the <b>firing</b> and were dull from overheating.</i>
<b>flak</b>	Strong criticism. <i>He has been getting <b>flak</b> from certain quarters lately for pointing this out.</i>
<b><u>gun</u></b>	A person who shoots a gun as regards their ability. <i>The boom of the one o clock <b>gun</b> echoed across the river.</i>
<b>gunner</b>	(in the British army) an artillery soldier (used especially as an official term for a private).
<b>implode</b>	Collapse or cause to collapse violently inwards. <i>The bottle <b>imploded</b>.</i>
<b>missile</b>	An object which is forcibly propelled at a target, either by hand or from a mechanical weapon. <i>One of the players was hit on the head by a <b>missile</b> thrown by a spectator.</i>
<b>musket</b>	A muzzle-loading shoulder gun with a long barrel; formerly used by infantrymen. <i>A volley of <b>musket</b> fire.</i>



<b>nuclear</b>	Denoting relating to or powered by the energy released in nuclear fission or fusion. <i><b>Nuclear</b> weapons.</i>
<b>ordnance</b>	A branch of government service dealing especially with military stores and materials. <i>The <b>ordnance</b> corps.</i>
<b>rifle</b>	Troops armed with rifles. <i>There are four basic ways to <b>rifle</b> a gun barrel.</i>
<b>salvo</b>	A sudden, vigorous, or aggressive act or series of acts. <i>There was a <b>salvo</b> of approval.</i>
<b>shot</b>	Sports equipment consisting of a heavy metal ball used in the shot put. <i>Paul tried one last <b>shot</b> You realize what you want will cost more money.</i>
<u><b>tank</b></u>	Treat in a tank. <i>The trucks all had a full <b>tank</b> of gasoline.</i>
<u><b>war</b></u>	A legal state created by a declaration of war and ended by official declaration during which the international rules of war apply. <i>Small states <b>warred</b> against each another.</i>
<u><b>weapon</b></u>	Any instrument or instrumentality used in fighting or hunting. <i>He used all his conversational <b>weapons</b>.</i>
