## Synonyms of "Bonfire" as a noun (9 Words)

**balefire** A large outdoor fire that is lighted as a signal or in celebration.

An oscillating shaft which transmits the vertical piston movement of a beam

**beam** engine to the crank or pump.

The wide **beam**s sprouted ten main tines.

danger signal A cause of pain or injury or loss.

signal

An apparatus on a railway, typically a coloured light or a semaphore, giving

indications to train drivers of whether or not the line is clear.

The policeman raised his hand as a **signal** to stop.

**signal fire** Any nonverbal action or gesture that encodes a message.

signal light

An electric quantity (voltage or current or field strength) whose modulation

represents coded information about the source from which it comes.

**smoke signal** Tobacco leaves that have been made into a cylinder.

**warning fire** A message informing of danger.



warning light Cautionary advice about something imminent (especially imminent danger or other unpleasantness.

hazardous Involving risk or danger.

It is **hazardous** to personal safety.

(of rock) having solidified from lava or magma.

**igneous** (Of Fock) having s **Igneous** activity.

Start or maintain a fire in.

He lit a cigarette which **ignite**d the petrol fumes.

incinerate Cause to undergo combustion.

The paper **incinerate**d quickly.

incinerator An apparatus for burning waste material, especially industrial waste, at high

temperatures until it is reduced to ash.

A heap of combustible material, especially one for burning a corpse as part

of a funeral ceremony.

A plant disease that produces a browning or scorched appearance of plant

**scorch** tissues.

The meat had **scorch**ed.

**scorching** Hot and dry enough to burn or parch a surface.

She set a **scorching** pace.

A fire that burns with thick smoke but no flame.

A **smolder**ing fire.



smoulder Smoke coming from a smouldering fire.

The **smoulder** suddenly became a blaze.

Treat an object by heating it in a stove in order to apply a desired surface

**stove** coating.

Sit or lie in the sun.
