buoyant	Able or tending to keep afloat or rise to the top of a liquid or gas. Buoyant balloons.
burgeoning	Beginning to grow or increase rapidly; flourishing. <i>Manufacturers are keen to cash in on the burgeoning demand.</i>
flourishing	Very lively and profitable. <i>A flourishing career.</i>
palmy	Very lively and profitable. <i>A conference centre set among palmy trails.</i>
prospering	Very lively and profitable.
prosperous	Bringing wealth and success. <i>We wish you a Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year.</i>
resonant	(of sound) deep, clear, and continuing to sound or reverberate. <i>Alpine valleys resonant with the sound of church bells.</i>

resounding	Unmistakable; emphatic. <i>A resounding smack across the face.</i>
reverberant	Characterized by reverberation. <i>A reverberant room.</i>
reverberating	Characterized by resonance.
reverberative	Characterized by resonance.
<u>ringing</u>	Having or emitting a clear resonant sound. <i>A ringing voice.</i>
roaring	Making or uttering a roar. <i>A roaring boy.</i>
rumbling	Continuous full and low-pitched throbbing sound. <i>A rumbling dispute about changes to working conditions.</i>
sonorous	Full and loud and deep. <i>He read aloud with a sonorous and musical voice.</i>
stentorian	Used of the voice. <i>A stentorian roar.</i>
strong	Relating to or denoting the strongest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts between nucleons and other hadrons when closer than about 10 cm so binding protons in a nucleus despite the repulsion due to their charge and which conserves strangeness parity and isospin. <i>There is a strong argument for decentralization.</i>
successful	Having succeeded or being marked by a favorable outcome. <i>A successful business venture.</i>
thriving	Prosperous and growing; flourishing. <i>The thriving business George has built up.</i>
<u>thundering</u>	Extremely great, severe, or impressive. <i>A thundering bore.</i>
thunderous	Extremely ominous. <i>No goalkeeper cares to face his thunderous shots.</i>
<u>vigorous</u>	Characterized by or involving physical strength, effort, or energy. <i>A vigorous denial.</i>

<u>boom</u>	The characteristic resonant cry of the bittern. <i>Business is booming.</i>
flourish	(of a living organism) grow or develop in a healthy or vigorous way, especially as the result of a particularly congenial environment. <i>He entered to a flourish of trumpets.</i>
flourishing	Very lively and profitable. <i>Flourishing businesses.</i>

luxury	Luxurious or of the nature of a luxury. <i>A luxury yacht.</i>
metropolis	A large and densely populated urban area; may include several independent administrative districts. <i>He preferred the peaceful life of the countryside to the bustle of the metropolis.</i>
opulence	Wealth as evidenced by sumptuous living. <i>Rooms of spectacular opulence.</i>
opulent	Wealthy. <i>His more opulent tenants.</i>
palmy	(especially of a previous period) flourishing or successful. <i>The palmy days of the 1970s.</i>
plenitude	An abundance. <i>The plenitude of the Pope's powers.</i>
plenteous	Affording an abundant supply. <i>A plenteous grape harvest.</i>
plentitude	A full supply.
profusion	An abundance or large quantity of something. <i>The profusion of detail.</i>
prosper	Make steady progress; be at the high point in one's career or reach a high point in historical significance or importance. <i>God has wonderfully prospered this nation.</i>
prosperity	An economic state of growth with rising profits and full employment. <i>A long period of peace and prosperity.</i>
prosperous	Marked by peace and prosperity. <i>We wish you a Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year.</i>
rich	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>These comments are a bit rich coming from a woman with no money worries.</i>
richness	A strong deep vividness of hue. <i>All are amazed at the richness of the colours.</i>
successful	Having succeeded or being marked by a favorable outcome. <i>A successful actor.</i>

teem	Be teeming be abuzz. <i>Every garden is teeming with wildlife.</i>
thrive	Grow vigorously. <i>The new baby thrived.</i>
thriving	Prosperous and growing; flourishing. <i>The thriving business George has built up.</i>
upscale	Increase the size or improve the quality of. <i>He needs to extra funds to upscale the business.</i>
wealthy	Having a great deal of money, resources, or assets; rich. <i>Wealthy corporations.</i>
