<b>accompany</b>	Play a musical accompaniment for. <i>The two sisters were to <b>accompany</b> us to London.</i>
<b>acquaintance</b>	Acquaintances considered collectively. <i>I have trouble remembering the names of all my <b>acquaintances</b>.</i>
<b>beau</b>	A rich, fashionable young man; a dandy. A male person who is a fellow member (of a fraternity or religion or other group).
<b>brother</b>	<i>The time is coming <b>brothers</b> for us to act.</i>
<b>buddy</b>	A working companion with whom close cooperation is required. <i>I m working on it <b>buddy</b>.</i>
<b>camaraderie</b>	Mutual trust and friendship among people who spend a lot of time together. <i>The enforced <b>camaraderie</b> of office life.</i>
<b>colleague</b>	A person with whom one works in a profession or business. <i>The surgeon consulted his <b>colleagues</b>.</i>
<b>companionship</b>	A feeling of fellowship or friendship. <i>The love and <b>companionship</b> of marriage.</i>
<b>compatriot</b>	A person from your own country. <i>Stich defeated his <b>compatriot</b> Boris Becker in the quarter finals.</i>
<b>comrade</b>	A friend who is frequently in the company of another. <i>You re right <b>comrade</b>.</i>
<b>comradeship</b>	The company and friendship of others with common aims. <i>His greatest joy came from <b>comradeship</b> with others in the team.</i>
<b>consort</b>	Keep company. <i>It did not <b>consort</b> with his idea of scientific government.</i>
<b>countryman</b>	A man living or born in a rural area. <i>They trust a fellow <b>countryman</b>.</i>

<b><u>crony</u></b>	A close friend or companion. <i>He went gambling with his cronies.</i>
<b>dandy</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a dandy. <i>The Winchester Model 37 shotgun is a <b>dandy</b> at a low price.</i>
<b><u>dear</u></b>	A sweet or endearing person. <i>Martin my <b>dear</b> fellow.</i>
<b>ex</b>	Out of fashion. <i>All his <b>exes</b> live in <b>Texas</b>.</i>
<b><u>fellow</u></b>	Sharing a particular activity, quality, or condition with someone or something. <i>They urged the troops not to fire on their <b>fellow</b> citizens.</i>
<b>folk</b>	Relating to folk music. <i>A revival of interest in <b>folk</b> customs.</i>
<b>friend</b>	Add someone to a list of friends or contacts on a social networking website. <i>We are <b>friends</b> of the family.</i>
<b><u>friendship</u></b>	The state of being friends (or friendly). <i>Old ties of love and <b>friendship</b>.</i>
<b>lad</b>	A male child (a familiar term of address to a boy). <i>Tony was a bit of a <b>lad</b> always had an eye for the women.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>A male is <b>mated</b> to several females.</i>
<b>neighbour</b>	A person living next door to or very near to the speaker or person referred to. <i>Matching our investment levels with those of our European <b>neighbours</b>.</i>
<b><u>pal</u></b>	Spend time with a friend. <i>We got acquainted but we never really <b>palled</b> around.</i>
<b><u>partner</u></b>	Act as a partner. <i>She and her dance <b>partner</b> were on the show for seven weeks.</i>
<b><u>peer</u></b>	A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage. <i>The towers <b>peer</b> over the roofs.</i>
<b><u>spouse</u></b>	A person's partner in marriage.
<b>traveling</b>	The act of going from one place to another.
<b>workmate</b>	A person with whom one works.
