Synonyms of "Boredom" as a noun (13 Words)

accidie	Spiritual or mental sloth; apathy.
<u>apathy</u>	Lack of interest, enthusiasm, or concern. <i>Widespread apathy among students.</i>
ennui	The feeling of being bored by something tedious. <i>He succumbed to ennui and despair.</i>
lack of concern	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
lack of enthusiasm	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
lack of interest	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
languor	A feeling of lack of interest or energy. <i>Summer shows all the languor of a hot breezeless day as the dancer lazily brushes her hand over her brow.</i>

malaise	A general feeling of discomfort, illness, or unease whose exact cause is difficult to identify. <i>A society afflicted by a deep cultural malaise.</i>
sluggishness	Inactivity; showing an unusual lack of energy. <i>The general appearance of sluggishness alarmed his friends.</i>
tedium	The feeling of being bored by something tedious. <i>The tedium of car journeys.</i>
unconcern	The trait of remaining calm and seeming not to care; a casual lack of concern. <i>He is famed for his laid back attitude his apparent unconcern about his actions.</i>
weariness	Reluctance to see or experience any more of something. <i>Growing war weariness.</i>
world-weariness	Sadness on thinking about the evils of the world.



Usage Examples of "Boredom" as a noun

- *I'll die of boredom if I live that long.*



Associations of "Boredom" (30 Words)

banal

So lacking in originality as to be obvious and boring.

*Songs with **banal** repeated words.*

benighted

Overtaken by night or darkness.

*They saw themselves as bringers of culture to poor **benighted** peoples.*

bored

Feeling weary and impatient because one is unoccupied or lacks interest in one's current activity.

*She s **bored** out of her mind.*

boring

So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness.

*A **boring** evening with uninteresting people.*

dull

Make or become dull or less intense.

*His face glowed in the **dull** lamplight.*

ennui	A feeling of listlessness and dissatisfaction arising from a lack of occupation or excitement. <i>He succumbed to ennui and despair.</i>
fatigue	Lose interest or become bored with something or somebody. <i>Votes were showing signs of election fatigue.</i>
folly	Lack of good sense; foolishness. <i>An act of sheer folly.</i>
humdrum	Lacking excitement or variety; boringly monotonous. <i>A humdrum existence all work and no play.</i>
insensate	Without compunction or human feeling. <i>A patient who was permanently unconscious and insensate.</i>
irksome	Irritating; annoying. <i>An irksome journey.</i>
isolation	Denoting a hospital or ward for patients with infectious diseases. <i>Isolation from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</i>
lackluster	Lacking luster or shine. <i>Staring with lackluster eyes.</i>
loneliness	Sadness resulting from being forsaken or abandoned. <i>Feelings of depression and loneliness.</i>
monotonous	Tediously repetitious or lacking in variety. <i>The owl's faint monotonous hooting.</i>
monotony	Lack of variety and interest; tedious repetition and routine. <i>He had never grown accustomed to the monotony of his work.</i>
numb	Make numb or insensitive. <i>Too numb with fear to move.</i>
prosaic	Having or using the style or diction of prose as opposed to poetry; lacking imaginativeness or originality. <i>A prosaic and unimaginative essay.</i>
solitude	A lonely or uninhabited place. <i>The battle to preserve beloved solitudes flared up all over the country.</i>
tedious	Too long, slow, or dull; tiresome or monotonous. <i>Tedious days on the train.</i>
tedium	The state or quality of being tedious. <i>The tedium of car journeys.</i>
tired	(especially of a statement or idea) boring or uninteresting because overfamiliar. <i>She was tired out now that the strain was over.</i>

- tiresome** So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness.
*Weeding is a **tiresome** but essential job.*
- tiring** Causing one to need rest or sleep; fatiguing.
*It had been a **tiring** day.*
- uninteresting** Arousing no interest or attention or curiosity or excitement.
*The scenery is dull and **uninteresting**.*
- unvaried** Lacking variety.
*A plain **unvaried** diet.*
- wearing** The mechanical process of wearing or grinding something down as by particles washing over it.
*It would be a lot less **wearing** if we could work together amicably.*
- wearisome** So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness.
*They have schedules and inventories that tell them in **wearisome** detail what they should look for.*
