- *Being talented through inherited qualities.*
- *Having a specific nationality.*



### Synonyms of "Born" as an adjective (3 Words)

- innate** Inborn; natural.  
*Her **innate** capacity for organization.*
- natural** Existing in or in conformity with nature or the observable world neither supernatural nor magical.  
*A **natural** leader.*
- untaught** Lacking in schooling.  
*By **untaught** instinct they know that scent means food.*



## Usage Examples of "Born" as an adjective

- *He's a born engineer.*
- *He was a child born of adultery.*
- *A born musician.*
- *A German-born philosopher.*



## Associations of "Born" (30 Words)

<b>abort</b>	Cease development die and be aborted. <i><b>Abort</b> the process running on my computer.</i>
<b>adoptee</b>	Someone (such as a child) who has been adopted.
<b>antenatal</b>	Before birth; during or relating to pregnancy. <i><b>Antenatal</b> care.</i>
<b>baby</b>	Treat someone as a baby pamper or be overprotective towards. <i><b>Baby</b> carrots.</i>
<b><u>congenital</u></b>	Present at birth but not necessarily hereditary; acquired during fetal development. <i>A <b>congenital</b> malformation of the heart.</i>
<b>embryo</b>	The part of a seed which develops into a plant consisting in the mature embryo of a higher plant of a plumule a radicle and one or two cotyledons. <i>An <b>embryo</b> central bank.</i>

<b>gestation</b>	The state of being pregnant; the period from conception to birth when a woman carries a developing fetus in her uterus. <i>A thorough and painstaking work which was a long time in <b>gestation</b>.</i>
<b>immanent</b>	Of a mental act performed entirely within the mind. <i>The protection of liberties is <b>immanent</b> in constitutional arrangements.</i>
<b>inborn</b>	Natural to a person or animal. <i>People think doctors have <b>inborn</b> compassion.</i>
<a href="#"><u>infant</u></a>	A very young child (birth to 1 year) who has not yet begun to walk or talk. <i>Healthy <b>infants</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>inherent</u></a>	Existing in something as a permanent, essential, or characteristic attribute. <i>Shortcomings <b>inherent</b> in our approach.</i>
<b>innate</b>	Being talented through inherited qualities. <i>Her <b>innate</b> capacity for organization.</i>
<a href="#"><u>instinct</u></a>	Inborn pattern of behavior often responsive to specific stimuli. <i>His <b>instinct</b> for making the most of his chances.</i>
<a href="#"><u>intrinsic</u></a>	Belonging to a thing by its very nature. <i>Form was treated as something <b>intrinsic</b> as the very essence of the thing.</i>
<b>maternal</b>	Characteristic of a mother. <i>My <b>maternal</b> grandfather.</i>
<b>midwife</b>	A person who helps to create or develop something. <i>Gruber <b>midwifed</b> the deal.</i>
<a href="#"><u>mother</u></a>	A term of address for a mother superior. <i>A <b>mother</b> penguin.</i>
<a href="#"><u>nascent</u></a>	Being born or beginning. <i>The <b>nascent</b> chicks.</i>
<b>natal</b>	Of or relating to the buttocks. <i>He was living in the south many miles from his <b>natal</b> city.</i>
<a href="#"><u>native</u></a>	Used in names of animals or plants resembling others familiar elsewhere e g native bee. <i>Eagle owls aren t <b>native</b> to Britain.</i>
<b>obstetrician</b>	A physician specializing in obstetrics.
<a href="#"><u>parent</u></a>	Be or act as a parent to a child. <i>Some of the whetstones have been transported up to 400 km from the <b>parent</b> rock.</i>
<b>paternal</b>	Characteristic of a father. <i>He reasserted his <b>paternal</b> authority.</i>

- pollination** The transfer of pollen to a stigma, ovule, flower, or plant to allow fertilization.  
*Crop **pollination** is essential to fruit production.*
- predisposition** Susceptibility to a pathogen.  
*A child may inherit a **predisposition** to schizophrenia.*
- pregnancy** The state of being pregnant; the period from conception to birth when a woman carries a developing fetus in her uterus.  
*A straightforward **pregnancy**.*
- pregnant** (of a woman or female animal) having a child or young developing in the uterus.  
*A development **pregnant** with implications.*
- prenatal** Occurring or existing before birth.  
*The **prenatal** period.*
- scene** The pieces of scenery used in a play or opera.  
*Their parting was a sad **scene**.*
- wavelet** A small wave of water; a ripple.
