- *Having a natural ability to do a particular job.*
- *Being talented through inherited qualities.*
- *Having a specific nationality.*



Synonyms of "Born" as an adjective (3 Words)

- innate** Inborn; natural.
*Her **innate** capacity for organization.*
- natural** Existing in or in conformity with nature or the observable world neither supernatural nor magical.
*A **natural** leader.*
- untaught** Lacking in schooling.
*By **untaught** instinct they know that scent means food.*



Usage Examples of "Born" as an adjective

- *He's a born engineer.*
- *He was a child born of adultery.*
- *A born musician.*
- *A German-born philosopher.*



Associations of "Born" (30 Words)

abort	Cease development die and be aborted. <i>Abort the process running on my computer.</i>
adoptee	Someone (such as a child) who has been adopted.
antenatal	Before birth; during or relating to pregnancy. <i>Antenatal care.</i>
baby	Treat someone as a baby pamper or be overprotective towards. <i>Baby carrots.</i>
<u>congenital</u>	Present at birth but not necessarily hereditary; acquired during fetal development. <i>A congenital malformation of the heart.</i>
embryo	The part of a seed which develops into a plant consisting in the mature embryo of a higher plant of a plumule a radicle and one or two cotyledons. <i>An embryo central bank.</i>

gestation	The state of being pregnant; the period from conception to birth when a woman carries a developing fetus in her uterus. <i>A thorough and painstaking work which was a long time in gestation.</i>
immanent	Of a mental act performed entirely within the mind. <i>The protection of liberties is immanent in constitutional arrangements.</i>
inborn	Natural to a person or animal. <i>People think doctors have inborn compassion.</i>
<u>infant</u>	A very young child (birth to 1 year) who has not yet begun to walk or talk. <i>Healthy infants.</i>
<u>inherent</u>	Existing in something as a permanent, essential, or characteristic attribute. <i>Shortcomings inherent in our approach.</i>
innate	Being talented through inherited qualities. <i>Her innate capacity for organization.</i>
<u>instinct</u>	Inborn pattern of behavior often responsive to specific stimuli. <i>His instinct for making the most of his chances.</i>
<u>intrinsic</u>	Belonging to a thing by its very nature. <i>Form was treated as something intrinsic as the very essence of the thing.</i>
maternal	Characteristic of a mother. <i>My maternal grandfather.</i>
midwife	A person who helps to create or develop something. <i>Gruber midwifed the deal.</i>
<u>mother</u>	A term of address for a mother superior. <i>A mother penguin.</i>
<u>nascent</u>	Being born or beginning. <i>The nascent chicks.</i>
natal	Of or relating to the buttocks. <i>He was living in the south many miles from his natal city.</i>
<u>native</u>	Used in names of animals or plants resembling others familiar elsewhere e g native bee. <i>Eagle owls aren t native to Britain.</i>
obstetrician	A physician specializing in obstetrics.
<u>parent</u>	Be or act as a parent to a child. <i>Some of the whetstones have been transported up to 400 km from the parent rock.</i>
paternal	Characteristic of a father. <i>He reasserted his paternal authority.</i>

- pollination** The transfer of pollen to a stigma, ovule, flower, or plant to allow fertilization.
*Crop **pollination** is essential to fruit production.*
- predisposition** Susceptibility to a pathogen.
*A child may inherit a **predisposition** to schizophrenia.*
- pregnancy** The state of being pregnant; the period from conception to birth when a woman carries a developing fetus in her uterus.
*A straightforward **pregnancy**.*
- pregnant** (of a woman or female animal) having a child or young developing in the uterus.
*A development **pregnant** with implications.*
- prenatal** Occurring or existing before birth.
*The **prenatal** period.*
- scene** The pieces of scenery used in a play or opera.
*Their parting was a sad **scene**.*
- wavelet** A small wave of water; a ripple.
