## Associations of "Bounce back" (30 Words)

<b><a href="#">anachronism</a></b>	A thing belonging or appropriate to a period other than that in which it exists, especially a thing that is conspicuously old-fashioned. <i>The town is a throwback to medieval times an <b>anachronism</b> that has survived the passing years.</i>
<b>backslide</b>	Relapse into bad ways or error. <i>There are many things that can cause slimmers to <b>backslide</b>.</i>
<b>backward</b>	(used of temperament or behavior) marked by a retiring nature. <i>A <b>backward</b> agricultural country.</i>
<b>backwards</b>	At or to or toward the back or rear. <i>He took a step <b>backwards</b>.</i>
<b>behind</b>	A kick that sends the ball over a behind line or a touch that sends it between the inner posts scoring one point. <i>Campbell grabbed him from <b>behind</b>.</i>
<b>degeneracy</b>	The state of being degenerate in mental or moral qualities. <i>Moral <b>degeneracy</b> followed intellectual degeneration.</i>
<b>degeneration</b>	The state or process of being or becoming degenerate; decline or deterioration. <i><b>Degeneration</b> of the muscle fibres.</i>
<b>discontinuity</b>	The state of having intervals or gaps; lack of continuity. <i>There is no significant <b>discontinuity</b> between modern and primitive societies.</i>
<b>inverse</b>	A reciprocal quantity, mathematical expression, geometric figure, etc. which is the result of inversion. <i>Numerous studies have shown an <b>inverse</b> relationship between exercise and the risk of heart disease.</i>
<b>later</b>	At or toward an end or late period or stage of development. <i>A <b>later</b> symptom of the disease.</i>

<b>past</b>	A past tense or form of a verb. <i>The war damaged church is preserved as a reminder of the <b>past</b>.</i>
<b>posterior</b>	Relating to or denoting presentation of a fetus in which the rear or caudal end is nearest the cervix and emerges first at birth. <i>A <b>posterior</b> labour.</i>
<b>posthumous</b>	Occurring or coming into existence after a person's death. <i>He was awarded a <b>posthumous</b> Military Cross.</i>
<u><b>regress</b></u>	Calculate the coefficient or coefficients of regression of a variable against or on another variable. <i>A <b>regress</b> to the nursery.</i>
<u><b>regression</b></u>	A return to an earlier stage of life or a supposed previous life, especially through hypnosis. <i><b>Regression</b> therapy.</i>
<b>regressive</b>	Proceeding from effect to cause or from particular to universal. <i>Indirect taxes are as a group <b>regressive</b>.</i>
<u><b>relapse</b></u>	A failure to maintain a higher state. <i>He <b>relapsed</b> into silence.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The <b>restoration</b> of Andrew's sight.</i>
<b>retrace</b>	Discover and follow (a route taken by someone else). <i>We <b>retraced</b> the route we took last summer.</i>
<b>retreat</b>	Make a retreat from an earlier commitment or activity. <i>The bugle sounded a <b>retreat</b>.</i>
<b>retrieval</b>	The process of getting something back from somewhere. <i>Storage and <b>retrieval</b> systems.</i>
<u><b>retroactive</b></u>	Affecting things past. <i>A big <b>retroactive</b> tax increase.</i>
<b>retrograde</b>	Show retrograde motion. <i>The outer satellites move in <b>retrograde</b> orbits.</i>
<b>retrogression</b>	Passing from a more complex to a simpler biological form. <i>A <b>retrogression</b> to 19th century attitudes.</i>
<u><b>retrospect</b></u>	Contemplation of things past. <i>A full <b>retrospect</b> of the battle.</i>
<b>retrospective</b>	Concerned with or related to the past. <i>A Georgia O'Keefe <b>retrospective</b>.</i>

**return**

A good rate of return.

*McAllister went out in 43 and **returned** in 32.*

**reversion**

A property to which someone has the right of reversion.

*He was given a promise of the **reversion** of Boraston s job.*

**revert**

Turn (one's eyes or steps) back.

*In the event of the building ceasing to become a school ownership would*

***revert** to the Church.*

**throwback**

An organism that has the characteristics of a more primitive type of that organism.

*The eyes could be an ancestral **throwback**.*
