enthusiastic	Having or showing intense and eager enjoyment, interest, or approval. <i>Was enthusiastic about taking ballet lessons.</i>
<u>flexible</u>	Capable of being changed. <i>Flexible rubber seals.</i>
frisky	Playful like a lively kitten. <i>He bounds about like a frisky pup.</i>
<u>jarring</u>	Causing a physical shock, jolt, or vibration. <i>The telephone struck a jarring note in those Renaissance surroundings.</i>
jaunty	Marked by up-to-dateness in dress and manners. <i>Walked with a jaunty step.</i>
jerky	Marked by abrupt transitions. <i>He makes mischief with his jerky pals.</i>
jolting	Causing or characterized by jolts and irregular movements.
jolty	Causing or characterized by jolts and irregular movements.
jumpy	Characterized by abrupt stops and starts or an irregular course. <i>He was tired and jumpy.</i>
live	Abounding with life and energy. <i>Burned alive.</i>

<u>sparkling</u>	Used of wines and waters; charged naturally or artificially with carbon dioxide. <i>Sparkling eyes.</i>
<u>spirited</u>	Made lively or spirited. <i>A spirited dance.</i>
springy	(of movements) light and confidently active. <i>He left the room with a springy step.</i>
<u>sunny</u>	(of a place) receiving much sunlight. <i>A sunny smile.</i>
<u>turbulent</u>	Agitated vigorously; in a state of turbulence. <i>A turbulent and unruly childhood.</i>
<u>uncomfortable</u>	Causing or feeling slight pain or physical discomfort. <i>He began to feel uncomfortable at the man s hard stare.</i>
<u>upbeat</u>	Pleasantly (even unrealistically) optimistic. <i>He was upbeat about the company s future.</i>
<u>vibrant</u>	(of sound) strong or resonating. <i>His vibrant voice.</i>
<u>vigorous</u>	Characterized by or involving physical strength, effort, or energy. <i>Vigorous opposition to the war.</i>
<u>vital</u>	Indispensable to the continuance of life. <i>A vital living organism.</i>
<u>vivacious</u>	Attractively lively and animated (typically used of a woman). <i>A vivacious folk dance.</i>
zestful	Characterized by great enthusiasm and energy. <i>A zestful and exuberant player.</i>
zippy	Marked by lively action. <i>The car is zippy around town.</i>

<u>adaptable</u>	Capable of adapting (of becoming or being made suitable) to a particular situation or use. <i>The frame was adaptable to cloth bolts of different widths.</i>
alive	Alert and active; animated. <i>Doctors are working hard to keep him alive.</i>
animated	(of a film or image) made using animation techniques. <i>Animated puppets.</i>
<u>backlash</u>	Degree of play between parts of a mechanism. <i>The political movie backlashed on the Democrats.</i>
ball	In cricket a delivery of the ball by the bowler to the batsman. <i>The mayor threw out the first ball.</i>
bouncing	(of a baby) vigorous and healthy. <i>A bouncing baby.</i>
bumper	Exceptionally large, fine, or successful. <i>A bumper crop.</i>
distensible	Capable of being distended; able to stretch and expand. <i>The stomach is a distensible organ.</i>
ductility	The malleability of something that can be drawn into threads or wires or hammered into thin sheets.

exuberant	Full of energy, excitement, and cheerfulness. <i>Exuberant foliage.</i>
<u>feisty</u>	(of a person, typically one who is relatively small) lively, determined, and courageous. <i>He got a bit feisty and tried to hit me.</i>
<u>flexible</u>	Capable of bending easily without breaking. <i>Small businesses which are dependent on flexible working hours.</i>
lively	Filled with events or activity. <i>A lively discussion.</i>
malleability	The property of being physically malleable; the property of something that can be worked or hammered or shaped without breaking.

momentum	The impetus gained by a moving object. <i>The investigation gathered momentum in the spring.</i>
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>No need to be pert miss.</i>
plasticity	The quality of being easily shaped or moulded. <i>Fine clay at the right degree of plasticity is more useful.</i>
<u>pliable</u>	Able to adjust readily to different conditions. <i>Quality leather is pliable and will not crack.</i>
plucky	Marked by courage and determination in the face of difficulties or danger; robust and uninhibited. <i>The plucky youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
<u>resilient</u>	Elastic; rebounds readily. <i>A shoe with resilient cushioning.</i>
<u>spirited</u>	Made lively or spirited. <i>A warm hearted generous spirited man.</i>
sporting	Exhibiting or calling for sportsmanship or fair play. <i>Sporting blood.</i>
sprightly	(especially of an old person) lively; full of energy. <i>She was quite sprightly for her age.</i>
<u>vibrant</u>	Vigorous and animated. <i>The men s vibrant voices.</i>
<u>vivacious</u>	Attractively lively and animated (typically used of a woman). <i>A vivacious folk dance.</i>
zesty	Marked by spirited enjoyment.
