<b>divide</b>	A difference or disagreement between two groups, typically producing tension. <i>There was still a profound cultural <b>divide</b> between the parties.</i>
<b>dividing line</b>	A ridge of land that separates two adjacent river systems.
<b>division</b>	Biology a group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>The villagers lived in a communal building and there were no solid <b>divisions</b> between neighbours.</i>
<b>edge</b>	The sharpened side of the blade of a cutting implement or weapon. <i>He had an <b>edge</b> on the competition.</i>
<b>edges</b>	The attribute of urgency in tone of voice. <i>He rounded the <b>edges</b> of the box.</i>
<b>extremities</b>	The greatest or utmost degree. <i>The extremity of despair.</i>
<b>fringes</b>	A social group holding marginal or extreme views. <i>Members of the fringe believe we should be armed with guns at all times.</i>
<b>frontier</b>	An undeveloped field of study; a topic inviting research and development. <i>International crime knows no <b>frontiers</b>.</i>
<b>limit</b>	Final or latest limiting point. <i>The failure showed the <b>limits</b> of British power.</i>
<b>limits</b>	The greatest amount of something that is possible or allowed. <i>There are <b>limits</b> on the amount you can bet.</i>
<b>line of demarcation</b>	A length (straight or curved) without breadth or thickness; the trace of a moving point.
<b>margins</b>	The blank space that surrounds the text on a page. <i>He jotted a note in the margin.</i>
<b>parameters</b>	A quantity (such as the mean or variance) that characterizes a statistical population and that can be estimated by calculations from sample data.
<b>partition</b>	The act of dividing or partitioning separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i>The cafe was divided up by glass <b>partitions</b>.</i>

The starting point for a new state or experience.  
*A **threshold** level.*

**thresholds**

The sill of a door; a horizontal piece of wood or stone that forms the bottom of a doorway and offers support when passing through a doorway.  
*On the **threshold** of manhood.*

<b><u>frontier</u></b>	A line or border separating two countries. <i>International crime knows no <b>frontiers</b>.</i>
<b>geographic</b>	Determined by geography. <i>The north and south <b>geographic</b> poles.</i>
<b>geographical</b>	Determined by geography. <i><b>Geographical</b> research.</i>
<b>insofar</b>	To the degree or extent that. <i><b>Insofar</b> as it can be ascertained the horse lung is comparable to that of man.</i>
<b>limit</b>	Set or serve as a limit to. <i>The risk of drinkers inadvertently going over the <b>limit</b>.</i>
<b>localized</b>	Restricted to a particular place or part of the body. <i>A decentralized and <b>localized</b> political authority.</i>
<b>margin</b>	A profit margin. <i>New contracts are <b>margin</b>ed with the winnings of previously held contracts.</i>
<b><u>marginal</u></b>	(of taxation) relating to increases in income. <i>The issue is to estimate the <b>marginal</b> benefit from the increased frequency of screening examinations against the <b>marginal</b> increased cost.</i>
<b>marginally</b>	In a marginal manner. <i>He s <b>marginally</b> worse than he was.</i>
<b><u>minimum</u></b>	The least possible. <i>This can be done with the <b>minimum</b> amount of effort.</i>
<b>outer</b>	An outer garment or part of one. <i><b>Outer</b> reality.</i>
<b>outermost</b>	Situated at the farthest possible point from a center. <i>The <b>outermost</b> layer of the earth.</i>
<b><u>outwardly</u></b>	On the surface. <i><b>Outwardly</b> it s not a bad looking car.</i>
<b>peripheral</b>	A peripheral device. <i>Russia s <b>peripheral</b> provinces.</i>

- periphery** A marginal or secondary position in, or aspect of, a group, subject, or sphere of activity.  
*New buildings on the **periphery** of the hospital site.*
- precinct** The police station situated in a precinct.  
*With 35 per cent of the **precincts** declaring he had 51 per cent of the vote.*
- region** The approximate amount of something usually used prepositionally as in in the region of.  
*Here we enter the **region** of opinion.*
- rim** Roll around the rim of.  
*He looked over the **rim** of his glasses.*
- thereabout** Near that place.  
*He stayed in London or **thereabouts** for several weeks.*
- ward** Admit to or care for in a hospital ward.  
*It was his duty to **ward** the king.*
