### **able**

Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence.  
*An **able** seaman.*

### **cased**

Enclosed in a protective container.  
*Products **encased** in leatherette.*

### **chance**

Be the case by chance.  
*They **chanced** a late holiday.*

### **entrap**

Trick (someone) into committing a crime in order to secure their prosecution.  
*He argued that his client had been **entrapped** by an undercover police officer.*

### **lariat**

A long noosed rope used to catch animals.

### **lasso**

Catch an animal with a lasso.  
*At last his father **lassoed** the horse.*

<b><u>likelihood</u></b>	The state or fact of something's being likely; probability. <i>Situations where there is a <b>likelihood</b> of violence.</i>
<b>likely</b>	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>Sales are <b>likely</b> to drop further.</i>
<b>odds</b>	The chances or likelihood of something happening or being the case. <i>He offered <b>odds</b> of two to one.</i>
<b>opportunity</b>	A possibility due to a favorable combination of circumstances. <i>The night drive gave us the <b>opportunity</b> of spotting rhinos.</i>
<b>percent</b>	A proportion in relation to a whole (which is usually the amount per hundred).
<b>percentage</b>	A rate, number, or amount in each hundred. <i>Only a tiny <b>percentage</b> of the day trippers are aware of the village's gastronomic distinction.</i>
<b>plausible</b>	(of a person) skilled at producing persuasive arguments, especially ones intended to deceive. <i>A <b>plausible</b> explanation.</i>
<b>possibility</b>	A possible alternative. <i>Relegation remains a distinct <b>possibility</b>.</i>
<b><u>possible</u></b>	The highest possible score especially in a shooting competition. <i>The team have taken just three points from a <b>possible</b> twelve.</i>
<b>potential</b>	The possibility of something happening or of someone doing something in the future. <i>A young broadcaster with great <b>potential</b>.</i>
<b>potentiality</b>	The possibility of something happening or of someone doing something in the future. <i>The technology is still relatively not well known in spite of its great <b>potentiality</b>.</i>
<b>presumable</b>	Capable of being inferred on slight grounds.
<b>presumptive</b>	Of the nature of a presumption; presumed in the absence of further information. <i>A strong <b>presumptive</b> case is made out.</i>
<b><u>probability</u></b>	A probable or the most probable event. <i>Going by past experience there was a high <b>probability</b> that the visitors were lost.</i>
<b><u>probable</u></b>	An applicant likely to be chosen. <i>He foresaw a <b>probable</b> loss.</i>
<b><u>probably</u></b>	Easy to believe on the basis of available evidence. <i>She would <b>probably</b> never see him again.</i>



<b>prospect</b>	Search for; seek. <i>Norwich s unbeaten heavyweight <b>prospect</b>.</i>
<b>prospective</b>	Of or concerned with or related to the future. <i>The statute is solely <b>prospective</b> in operation.</i>
<b>rope</b>	Of a party of climbers connect each other together with a rope. <i>I want you to show her the <b>ropes</b>.</i>
<b>snare</b>	A drum fitted with snares a side drum. <i>The foxes were humanely <b>snares</b>.</i>
<b>strung</b>	That is on a string.
<b>throttle</b>	A pedal that controls the throttle valve. <i>The pitch of the engine fell as the driver <b>throttled</b> back.</i>
<b>tied</b>	(of aid or an international loan) given subject to the condition that it should be spent on goods or services from the donor or lender. <i>A <b>tied</b> vote.</i>
<b>trammel</b>	Catch in or as if in a trap. <i>We have no wish to be <b>trammelled</b> by convention.</i>
