| mild | Humble in spirit or manner suggesting retiring mildness or even cowed submissiveness. <i>Mild flulike symptoms.</i> |
| openhanded | Given or giving freely. <i>Her fond and openhanded grandfather.</i> |
| tender | (of food) easy to cut or chew; not tough. <i>Tender loving care.</i> |
| warm | Having or displaying warmth or affection. <i>A warm personality.</i> |

| forbearing | Showing patient and unruffled self-control and restraint under adversity; slow to retaliate or express resentment. <i>Seemly and forbearing yet strong enough to resist aggression.</i> |
| <u>friendliness</u> | The quality of being friendly; affability. <i>I was overwhelmed by the friendliness of the people here.</i> |
| <u>generosity</u> | Acting generously. <i>Diners certainly cannot complain about the generosity of portions.</i> |
| generous | Showing a readiness to give more of something, especially money, than is strictly necessary or expected. <i>A generous donation.</i> |
| goodness | Moral excellence or admirableness. <i>A belief in the basic goodness of mankind.</i> |
| goodwill | An intangible asset valued according to the advantage or reputation a business has acquired (over and above its tangible assets). <i>The scheme is dependent on goodwill between the two sides.</i> |
| kind | A group of people or things having similar characteristics. <i>A kind master.</i> |

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| kindness | The quality of being friendly, generous, and considerate. <i>He thanked them for their kindness and support.</i> |
| largess | Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. |
| largesse | Generosity in bestowing money or gifts upon others. <i>Presumably public money is not dispensed with such largesse to anyone else.</i> |
| leniency | Mercifulness as a consequence of being lenient or tolerant. <i>The court could show leniency.</i> |
| liberality | The quality of being open to new ideas and free from prejudice. <i>Liberality towards bisexuality.</i> |
| magnanimity | Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. <i>Both sides will have to show magnanimity.</i> |
| mercy | Compassion or forgiveness shown towards someone whom it is within one's power to punish or harm. <i>Distributing food and clothing to the flood victims was an act of mercy.</i> |
| mildness | Relative warmth of weather. <i>The tomatoes were sweet compensating for the mildness of the cheese.</i> |
| munificence | Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. <i>We must be thankful for his munificence.</i> |
| nice | Socially or conventionally correct; refined or virtuous. <i>A nice face.</i> |
| politely | In a respectful and considerate manner. <i>The policeman answered politely Now look here lady.</i> |
| selflessness | Acting with less concern for yourself than for the success of the joint activity. <i>The selflessness and courage of officers killed in the line of duty.</i> |
| thanks | An acknowledgment of appreciation. <i>Thanks to hard work it was a great success.</i> |
| unstinting | Given or giving without restraint; unsparing. <i>Called for unstinting aid to Britain.</i> |
