<b>bounteousness</b>	Generosity evidenced by a willingness to give freely.
<b>bountifulness</b>	The property of copious abundance.
<b>charity</b>	The body of organizations viewed collectively as the object of fundraising or of donations. <i>Faith hope and <b>charity</b>.</i>
<b>commission</b>	A work produced in response to a commission. <i>Put the ships into <b>commission</b>.</i>
<b>consideration</b>	Careful thought, typically over a period of time. <i>You can buy the books for a small <b>consideration</b>.</i>
<b>contribution</b>	Act of giving in common with others for a common purpose especially to a charity. <i>Local historians are requesting <b>contributions</b> for a forthcoming book on the history of the community.</i>
<b>dividend</b>	An individual's share of a dividend. <i>Buying a rail pass may still pay <b>dividends</b>.</i>
<b>donation</b>	The action of donating something. <i>The <b>donation</b> of carpets chairs and cutlery.</i>
<b>endowment</b>	Natural abilities or qualities. <i>Differences in genetic <b>endowment</b>.</i>
<b>favour</b>	A small inexpensive gift given to guests at a party. <i>Training is looked upon with <b>favour</b> by many employers.</i>
<b>generosity</b>	The trait of being willing to give your money or time. <i>Diners certainly cannot complain about the <b>generosity</b> of portions.</i>
<b>grant</b>	A contract granting the right to operate a subsidiary business. <i>A <b>grant</b> of probate.</i>
<b>gratuity</b>	An award (as for meritorious service) given without claim or obligation. <i>An end of contract <b>gratuity</b> of 20 of the total pay received.</i>
<b>h.m.s. bounty</b>	Generosity evidenced by a willingness to give freely.
<b>handout</b>	A piece of printed information provided free of charge, especially to accompany a lecture or advertise something. <i>Dependence on central government <b>handouts</b>.</i>

<b>indulgence</b>	In the Roman Catholic Church a grant by the Pope of remission of the temporal punishment in purgatory still due for sins after absolution The unrestricted sale of indulgences by pardoners was a widespread abuse during the later Middle Ages. <i>The notice given granted a final <b>indulgence</b> of four weeks.</i>
<b>inheritance</b>	(genetics) attributes acquired via biological heredity from the parents. <i>The European cultural <b>inheritance</b>.</i>
<b>largesse</b>	Generosity in bestowing money or gifts upon others. <i>Presumably public money is not dispensed with such <b>largesse</b> to anyone else.</i>
<b>lavishness</b>	The quality possessed by something that is excessively expensive.
<b>legacy</b>	A gift of personal property by will. <i>Being a <b>legacy</b> increased a student s chance of being accepted to a highly selective college by up to 45 per cent.</i>
<b>liberality</b>	The quality of giving or spending freely. <i>Noblemen were expected to live with a certain <b>liberality</b> and panache.</i>
<b>magnanimity</b>	Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. <i>Both sides will have to show <b>magnanimity</b>.</i>
<b>munificence</b>	Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. <i>We must be thankful for his <b>munificence</b>.</i>
<b>offering</b>	The verbal act of offering. <i>Noteworthy new <b>offerings</b> for investors included several index funds.</i>
<b>premium</b>	A prize, bonus, or award given as an inducement to purchase products, enter competitions initiated by business interests, etc. <i>The Society of Arts awarded him a <b>premium</b>.</i>
<b>present</b>	Something presented as a gift. <i>They are happy and at peace refusing to think beyond the <b>present</b>.</i>
<b>presentation</b>	A visual representation of something. <i>A breech <b>presentation</b>.</i>
<b>prize</b>	Something given as a token of victory. <i>Her invention won first <b>prize</b> in a national contest.</i>
<b>recompense</b>	Payment or reward (as for service rendered). <i>Adequate <b>recompense</b> for workers who lose their jobs.</i>
<b>remuneration</b>	Something that remunerates. <i>Adequate <b>remuneration</b> for his work.</i>
<b>reward</b>	A fair return for good or bad behaviour. <i>He s reaping the <b>rewards</b> of his hard work and perseverance.</i>



**settlement** The process of establishing a settlement or settlements.  
*Inheritance tax could be due if you make a substantial gift or **settlement** and then die within the following seven years.*

**subsidy** A grant or contribution of money.  
*The rail service now operates without **subsidy**.*

**tip** The extreme end of something; especially something pointed.  
*They clambered to the **tip** of Monadnock.*
