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

Definitions of "Bouts" as a noun

- *(sports) a division during which one team is on the offensive.*
- *A division during which one team is on the offensive.*
- *A period of illness.*
- *A contest or fight (especially between boxers or wrestlers).*



Synonyms of "Bouts" as a noun (5 Words)

binge A period of excessive indulgence in an activity, especially eating, drinking, or taking drugs.

*A drinking **binge**.*

bust A complete failure.

*A 36 inch **bust**.*

round An outburst of applause.

*The doctor goes on his **rounds** first thing every morning.*

tear The act of tearing.

*He took the manuscript in both hands and gave it a mighty **tear**.*

turn The act of turning away or in the opposite direction.

*He was asked to do a **turn** at a children s party.*

Associations of "Bouts" (30 Words)

- binge** An occasion for excessive eating or drinking.
*I **binged** on all six episodes in two days.*
- bust** Break open or apart suddenly and forcefully.
*He **busted** my radio.*
- colonnade** Structure consisting of a row of evenly spaced columns.
- conglomerate** Form a conglomerate by merging diverse firms.
*Atoms which **conglomerate** at the centre.*
- diatomic** Consisting of two atoms.
*Only **diatomic** molecules are easy to study in this way as larger molecules invariably fragment.*
- double** To double the degree.
*She **doubles** as his wife and secretary.*

doubled	Twice as great or many. <i>The dose is doubled.</i>
doubly	To twice the normal extent or degree; especially. <i>We re going to have to work doubly hard.</i>
dual	In an aircraft using dual controls. <i>A double or dual role for an actor.</i>
game	The game equipment needed in order to play a particular game. <i>It was very easy for a few big companies to game the system.</i>
homer	A home run. <i>He homered for the sixth time in seven games.</i>
multiple	Numerous and often varied. <i>The major food multiples.</i>
multiplication	An arithmetic operation that is the inverse of division; the product of two numbers is computed. <i>These formulae involve a number of multiplications.</i>
once	At a previous time. <i>She was a dancer once.</i>
one	Being a single entity made by combining separate components. <i>They had lunch at one.</i>
only	Being the only one single and isolated from others. <i>She turned into the car park only to find her way blocked.</i>
pike	Used in names of predatory fish with large teeth other than the true pike e g garpike.
plural	A plural word or form. <i>A plural society.</i>
redouble	Double a bid already doubled by an opponent. <i>The screaming redoubled.</i>
single	Characteristic of or meant for a single person or thing. <i>A first class single ticket.</i>
subjugation	The action of bringing someone or something under domination or control. <i>The fear of human subjugation by technology.</i>
talking	The action of talking speech or discussion. <i>He did have talking eyes.</i>
ternary	The cardinal number that is the sum of one and one and one. <i>A ternary operation.</i>
three	One of four playing cards in a deck having three pips.

- trinity** The union of the Father and Son and Holy Ghost in one Godhead.
*The wine was the first of a **trinity** of three excellent vintages.*
- triple** Hit a triple.
*Two whiskies **triples** please.*
- twice** Double in degree or quantity.
*I m **twice** your age.*
- twofold** So as to double; to twice the number or amount.
*The **twofold** demands of the business and motherhood.*
- walkway** A passage or path for walking along, especially a raised passageway connecting different sections of a building or a wide path in a park or garden.
