| beneath | In or to a place that is lower. <i>A house built on stilts to allow air to circulate beneath.</i> |
| condescend | Treat condescendingly. <i>He condescended to see me at my hotel.</i> |
| declension | The inflection of nouns and pronouns and adjectives in Indo-European languages. <i>The declension of the new generation.</i> |
| declivity | A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded declivity.</i> |
| decrease | Decrease in size extent or range. <i>He decreased his staff.</i> |
| demoralize | Cause (someone) to lose confidence or hope. <i>The General Strike had demoralized the trade unions.</i> |
| descend | Move or fall downwards. <i>An air of gloom descended on Labour Party headquarters.</i> |
| descending | (of sound) becoming lower in pitch. <i>A passage of descending chords.</i> |
| descent | An act of moving downwards, dropping, or falling. <i>A descent on the Channel ports.</i> |
| diminish | Make or become less. <i>The new law is expected to diminish the government's chances.</i> |
| disparagement | A communication that belittles somebody or something. |
| downgrade | Reduce to a lower grade, rank, or level of importance. <i>A steep downgrade for which he had to put the car in second.</i> |

| downturn | A decline in economic, business, or other activity. <i>The market took a downturn.</i> |
| downward | Moving or leading towards a lower place or level. <i>He lay face downward.</i> |
| drop | The act of dropping something. <i>He had a drop too much to drink.</i> |
| fall | A waterfall or cascade. <i>Fall into a strange way of thinking.</i> |
| falling | Coming down freely under the influence of gravity. <i>A falling market.</i> |
| flop | With a flopping sound. <i>The show flopped in London.</i> |
| low | Of a river or lake below the usual water level. <i>The reservoir is low.</i> |
| lower | Move something or somebody to a lower position. <i>Land of a lower quality.</i> |
| reduce | Reduce in scope while retaining essential elements. <i>Increase the heat and reduce the liquid.</i> |
| reduction | An arrangement of an orchestral score for piano or for a smaller group of performers. <i>The process of vowel reduction.</i> |
| rundown | An analysis or summary of something by a knowledgeable person. <i>He gave his teammates a rundown on the opposition.</i> |
| settle | Dispose of or make a financial settlement. <i>This land was settled by Germans.</i> |
| sink | Cause to sink. <i>He saw the coffin sink below the surface of the waves.</i> |
| sit | Be or remain in a particular position or state. <i>The White House sits on Pennsylvania Avenue.</i> |
| submergence | The action of completely covering or obscuring something. <i>Total submergence of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i> |
| substrate | An indigenous language that contributes features to the language of an invading people who impose their language on the indigenous population. <i>The Celtic languages of Britain are a substrate for English.</i> |
| under | Under water. <i>Weaving the body through the crossbars over and under over and under.</i> |
