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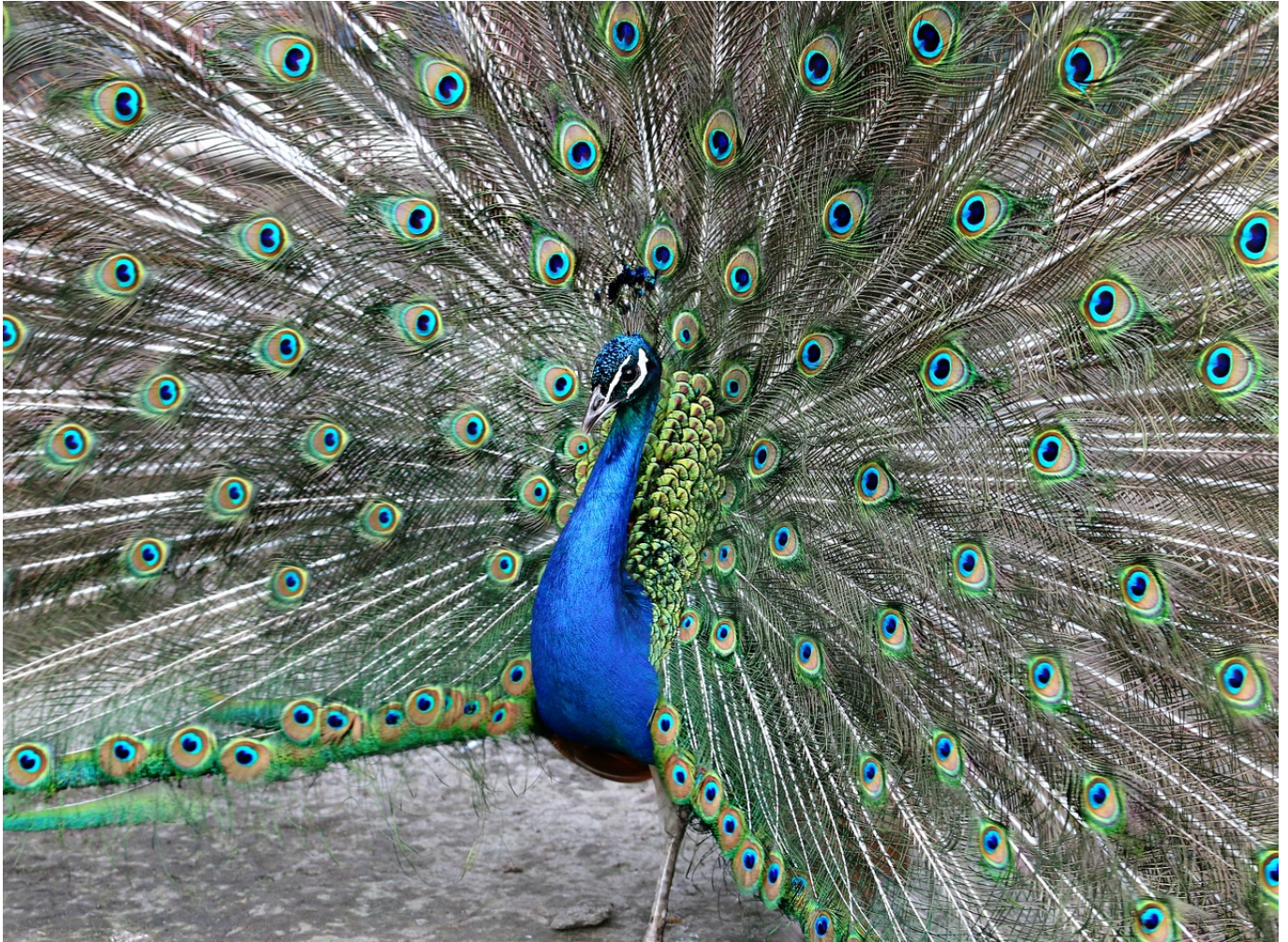

- crowing** Black birds having a raucous call.
- gasconade** An instance of boastful talk.  
*Whenever he won we were exposed to his **gasconade**.*
- line-shooting** An instance of boastful talk.
- vaporing** An instance of boastful talk.

- *Show off.*
- *Say something in a boastful manner.*

## Synonyms of "Brag" as a verb (20 Words)

<b>blow</b>	Free of obstruction by blowing air through. <i>If the voltage is too high you may <b>blow</b> the fuse in the appliance.</i>
<b>blow one's own trumpet</b>	Make a sound as if blown.
<b>bluster</b>	Talk in a loud, aggressive, or indignant way with little effect. <i>You threaten and <b>bluster</b> but won't carry it through.</i>
<b>boast</b>	(of a person, place, or thing) possess (a feature that is a source of pride). <i>The hotel <b>boasts</b> high standards of comfort.</i>
<b>congratulate oneself</b>	Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement.
<b>gas</b>	Kill or harm by exposure to gas. <i>After <b>gassing</b> up the car he went into the restaurant.</i>
<b>gasconade</b>	Show off.
<b>give oneself airs</b>	Bestow.
<b>gloat</b>	Dwell on one's own success or another's misfortune with smugness or malignant pleasure. <i>His enemies <b>gloated</b> over his death.</i>
<b>pat oneself on the back</b>	Hit lightly.
<b>preen oneself</b>	Pride or congratulate (oneself) for an achievement.
<b>shoot a line</b>	Measure the altitude of by using a sextant.
<b>show off</b>	Give expression to.
<b>sing one's own praises</b>	Make a whining, ringing, or whistling sound.
<b>swagger</b>	Discourage or frighten with threats or a domineering manner; intimidate. <i>He <b>swaggered</b> along the corridor.</i>
<b>swank</b>	Display one's wealth, knowledge, or achievements in a way that is intended to impress others. <i>He was <b>swanking</b> about playing the dashing young master spy.</i>
<b>swash</b>	Show off. <i>The water <b>swashed</b> and rippled around the car wheels.</i>
<b>tout</b>	Attempt to sell (something), typically by a direct or persistent approach. <i>Shop managers would stand in the street <b>touting</b> for business.</i>

**vaunt** Show off.  
*An autobiographer is simultaneously **vaunted** and castigated for revealing more than is deemed proper.*

## Usage Examples of "Brag" as a verb

- *He bragged that he was sure of victory.*
- *They were bragging about how easy it had been.*

## Brag as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Brag" as an adjective

- *Exceptionally good.*
- *Excellent; first-rate.*

### Synonyms of "Brag" as an adjective (1 Word)

**boss** Exceptionally good.  
*That was a real **boss** move on his part.*

### Usage Examples of "Brag" as an adjective

- *His brag cornfield.*
- *That was my brag heifer.*

**arrogance** Overbearing pride evidenced by a superior manner toward inferiors.  
*The **arrogance** of this man is astounding.*

**blazon** Report (news), especially in a sensational manner.  
*His knowledge of medieval **blazon** was unrivalled.*

<b>blowhard</b>	A very boastful and talkative person. <i><b>Blowhard</b> politicians.</i>
<b>bluster</b>	A swaggering show of courage. <i>He was awakened by the <b>bluster</b> of their preparations.</i>
<b>boast</b>	(of a person, place, or thing) possess (a feature that is a source of pride). <i>She <b>boasted</b> about her many conquests.</i>
<b>boastful</b>	Exhibiting self-importance. <i>A <b>boastful</b> letter.</i>
<b>bombast</b>	High-sounding language with little meaning, used to impress people. <i>The <b>bombast</b> of gung ho militarism.</i>
<b>braggadocio</b>	Boastful or arrogant behaviour.
<b>braggart</b>	Exhibiting self-importance. <i><b>Braggart</b> men.</i>
<b>bragging</b>	An instance of boastful talk. <i>We became involved in a lively <b>bragging</b> session.</i>
<b>bravado</b>	A swaggering show of courage. <i>He possesses none of the classic wheeler dealer s casual <b>bravado</b>.</i>
<b>condescending</b>	(used of behavior or attitude) characteristic of those who treat others with condescension. <i>She thought the teachers were arrogant and <b>condescending</b>.</i>
<b>crow</b>	A member of the Siouan people formerly living in eastern Montana. <i>She <b>crowed</b> with joy.</i>
<b>display</b>	Attract attention by displaying some body part or posing of animals. <i>The museum houses an informative <b>display</b> of rocks.</i>
<b>enviable</b>	Arousing or likely to arouse envy. <i>The firm is in the <b>enviable</b> position of having a full order book.</i>
<b>exaggeration</b>	Extravagant exaggeration. <i>The dance involved a deliberate <b>exaggeration</b> of his awkwardness.</i>
<b>flippancy</b>	Lack of respect or seriousness; frivolousness. <i>She was infuriated by his careless <b>flippancy</b>.</i>
<b>fustian</b>	A strong cotton and linen fabric with a slight nap. <i>A smokescreen of <b>fustian</b> and fantasy.</i>
<b>gasconade</b>	Extravagant boasting. <i>Whenever he won we were exposed to his <b>gasconade</b>.</i>
<b>grandiloquent</b>	Puffed up with vanity- Newsweek. <i>A <b>grandiloquent</b> celebration of Spanish glory.</i>

<b>liar</b>	A person who has lied or who lies repeatedly. <i>The man was a notorious <b>liar</b>.</i>
<b>pompous</b>	Puffed up with vanity. <i>A <b>pompous</b> man who pretends he knows everything.</i>
<b>pretentious</b>	Attempting to impress by affecting greater importance or merit than is actually possessed. <i>A <b>pretentious</b> fraud.</i>
<b>pride</b>	A public event, typically involving a parade, held to celebrate LGBT identities, culture, and experience. <i>He takes great <b>pride</b> in his appearance.</i>
<b>proud</b>	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i><b>Proud</b> parents.</i>
<b>proudly</b>	With pride; in a proud manner. <i>Pristine new office buildings stood <b>proudly</b> beside a large car park.</i>
<b>rookery</b>	A breeding ground for gregarious birds (such as rooks). <i>They congregate cheek by jowl in unwholesome rookeries chosen for cheapness and convenience.</i>
<b>strut</b>	Brace something with a strut or struts. <i>A spindly framework of long slender <b>struts</b> girders and bracing wire.</i>
<b>swagger</b>	Discourage or frighten with threats or a domineering manner; intimidate. <i>He <b>swaggered</b> along the corridor.</i>
<b>vaunt</b>	Boast about or praise (something), especially excessively. <i>An autobiographer is simultaneously <b>vaunted</b> and castigated for revealing more than is deemed proper.</i>
