- Wave or flourish (something, especially a weapon) as a threat or in anger or excitement.
- Exhibit aggressively.
- Move or swing back and forth.

flourish	Grow vigorously. Happy New Year he yelled <b>flourish</b> ing a bottle of whisky.
hold alof	t Protect against a challenge or attack.
raise	Multiply a number by itself a specified number of times 8 is 2 raised to the power 3. <i>I ll <b>raise</b> you another hundred dollars.</i>
shake	Shake a body part to communicate a greeting feeling or cognitive state. I couldn t <b>shake</b> the feeling that everyone was laughing at me.
wave	Set waves in. She asked the hairdresser to <b>wave</b> her hair.
wield	Have and be able to use (power or influence. A masked raider <b>wield</b> ing a handgun.

#### Usage Examples of "Brandish" as a verb

- Brandish a sword.
- A man leaped out brandishing a knife.

## Associations of "Brandish" (30 Words)

armor	A military unit consisting of armored fighting vehicles.
<u>assailant</u>	Someone who attacks. The police have no firm leads about the identity of his <b>assailant</b> .
<u>blade</u>	A cutting or thrusting weapon that has a long metal blade and a hilt with a hand guard. The Paralympics brought prosthetics such as running <b>blade</b> s into the limelight.
bludgeon	Beat someone repeatedly with a bludgeon or other heavy object. Maces and spiked <b>bludgeon</b> s.
<u>bow</u>	A single passage of a bow over the strings of an instrument. She <b>bow</b> ed before the Queen.



cudgel	Strike with a cudgel. They would lie in wait and <b>cudgel</b> her to death.
<u>dagger</u>	A moth with a dark dagger shaped marking on the forewing. <i>He drew his <b>dagger</b> and stabbed the leader.</i>
fisherman	Someone whose occupation is catching fish.
fishing	The activity of catching fish, either for food or as a sport. <i>Fishing boats</i> .
gig	A light, fast, narrow boat adapted for rowing or sailing. They played a <b>gig</b> in New Jersey.
harpoon	Spear with a harpoon. Gilbert s father <b>harpoon</b> ed a five metre basking shark.
impale	(of a coat of arms) adjoin (another coat of arms) on the same shield. <i>His head was</i> <b>impale</b> <i>d on a pike and exhibited for all to see.</i>
javelin	An athletic competition in which a javelin is thrown as far as possible. <i>His nearest rival in the javelin</i> .
jig	Dance a jig. We were <b>jig</b> ging about in our seats.
joust	Joust against somebody in a tournament by fighting on horseback. To <b>joust</b> a man must have an opponent to ride against.
<u>knife</u>	Use a knife on. A shard of steel <b>knife</b> d through the mainsail.
lance	Pierce with a lance as in a knights fight. The teenager had been <b>lance</b> d by a wooden splinter.
lancet	Shaped like a lancet arch. A <b>lancet</b> clock.
mace	An official who carries a mace of office.
microtome	An instrument for cutting extremely thin sections of material for examination under a microscope. $% \left( {{{\mathbf{x}}_{i}}} \right)$
<u>plunge</u>	Begin with vigor. A car swerved to avoid a bus and <b>plunge</b> d into a ravine.
pummel	Strike repeatedly with the fists. <i>He felt like a boxer who had been</i> <b>pummel</b> <i>led mercilessly against the ropes.</i>
reel	A piece of music for a reel typically in simple or duple time. We put on the record player and danced <b>reel</b> s.
scabbard	A sheath for a gun or other weapon or tool. A ceremonial sword hung at his side in a gilded <b>scabbard</b> .



sheathe	Encase (something) in a close-fitting or protective covering. <i>Sheathe a sword</i> .
<u>shield</u>	A stylized representation of a shield used for displaying a coat of arms. <i>The horseshoe crab s armour forms a huge domed shield</i> .
<u>spear</u>	A spearman. Smoked salmon wrapped around asparagus <b>spear</b> s.
<u>stab</u>	A wound made by stabbing. Multiple <b>stab</b> wounds.
<u>sword</u>	One of the suits in a tarot pack. Not many perished by the <b>sword</b> .
wave	A shape regarded as resembling a breaking wave. A <b>wave</b> of treetops stretched to the horizon.
