### **Definitions of "Brat" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “brat” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A small pork sausage.*
- *A child, typically one that is badly behaved.*
- *A very troublesome child.*



### Synonyms of "Brat" as a noun (5 Words)

**bratwurst** A type of fine German pork sausage that is generally fried or grilled.

**holy terror** A sacred place of pilgrimage.

**little terror** A small amount or duration.

**spoilt child** Valuables taken by violence (especially in war).

**terror** Terrorism.  
*She had a **terror** of darkness.*



### **Usage Examples of "Brat" as a noun**

- *Presumably this is where people dump their brats so they can shop in relative peace.*
- *She's been acting like a spoiled brat all evening.*



## Associations of "Brat" (30 Words)

- arrogant** Having or showing feelings of unwarranted importance out of overbearing pride.  
*He s **arrogant** and opinionated.*
- contemptuous** Expressing extreme contempt.  
*She was intolerant and **contemptuous** of the majority of the human race.*
- disrespectful** Exhibiting lack of respect; rude and discourteous.  
*A deeply **disrespectful** attitude towards women.*
- dwarf** A person who is of unusually or abnormally small stature because of a congenital condition a person affected by dwarfism.  
*This year s debt **dwarfs** that of last year.*
- fairy** A Central and South American hummingbird with a green back and long tail.  
***Fairy** gold.*

<b>flippancy</b>	Inappropriate levity. <i>She was infuriated by his careless <b>flippancy</b>.</i>
<b>flippant</b>	Showing inappropriate levity. <i>A <b>flippant</b> remark.</i>
<b>frivolity</b>	The trait of being frivolous; not serious or sensible. <i>A night of fun and <b>frivolity</b>.</i>
<b>gnome</b>	A small ugly person. <i>A grizzled <b>gnome</b> of a man.</i>
<b>immodest</b>	Lacking humility or decency. <i>TV shows full of <b>immodest</b> language.</i>
<b>imp</b>	A small, mischievous devil or sprite. <i>A cheeky young <b>imp</b>.</i>
<b>impolite</b>	Not having or showing good manners; rude. <i>It would have been <b>impolite</b> to refuse.</i>
<b>impudent</b>	Marked by casual disrespect. <i>He could have strangled this <b>impudent</b> upstart.</i>
<b><u>insolent</u></b>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i>She hated the <b>insolent</b> tone of his voice.</i>
<b><u>irreverent</u></b>	Not revering god. <i>Noisy <b>irreverent</b> tourists.</i>
<b><u>mischievous</u></b>	(of an action or statement) causing or intended to cause harm or trouble. <i>A <b>mischievous</b> allegation for which there is not a shred of evidence.</i>
<b><u>presumptuous</u></b>	(of a person or their behaviour) failing to observe the limits of what is permitted or appropriate. <i>I hope I won't be considered <b>presumptuous</b> if I offer some advice.</i>
<b>pretentious</b>	Intended to attract notice and impress others. <i><b>Pretentious</b> art films.</i>
<b>pygmy</b>	Used in names of animals and plants that are much smaller than more typical kinds e.g pygmy shrew pygmy water lily. <i>Charles VIII of France was a <b>pygmy</b>.</i>
<b>rapscallion</b>	A deceitful and unreliable scoundrel. <i>They were the <b>rapscallions</b> behind this practical joke.</i>
<b>rascal</b>	One who is playfully mischievous. <i>A lovable <b>rascal</b>.</i>
<b>rude</b>	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>He is a <b>rude</b> and arrogant bully.</i>

<b>scamp</b>	Perform hastily and carelessly. <i>That man was a <b>scamp</b> a damn thief.</i>
<b>sneering</b>	Expressive of contempt. <i>It will take a concerted effort from many to lay off the <b>sneering</b> and try understanding.</i>
<b><u>snobbish</u></b>	Relating to, characteristic of, or like a snob. <i>The writer takes a rather <b>snobbish</b> tone.</i>
<b><u>troll</u></b>	A fisherman's lure that is used in trolling. <i>The child <b>trolled</b> her hoop.</i>
<b><u>unashamed</u></b>	Used of persons or their behavior; feeling no shame. <i>An <b>unashamed</b> emotionalism.</i>
<b>uncivil</b>	Lacking civility or good manners- Willa Cather. <i>Want nothing from you but to get away from your <b>uncivil</b> tongue.</i>
<b>unrepentant</b>	Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing. <i>He was <b>unrepentant</b> and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>
<b><u>urchin</u></b>	A goblin. <i>He was surrounded by a dozen street <b>urchins</b> in rags.</i>
