<u><b>heroic</b></u>	Very imposing or impressive; surpassing the ordinary (especially in size or scale). <i><b>Heroic</b> explorers.</i>
<u><b>intrepid</b></u>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i><b>Intrepid</b> pioneers.</i>
<b>lionhearted</b>	Extraordinarily courageous. <i>A brilliant <b>lionhearted</b> second half comeback.</i>
<b>macho</b>	Used of men; markedly masculine in appearance or manner. <i>The big <b>macho</b> tough guy.</i>
<b>manful</b>	Characteristic of a man. <i>A <b>manful</b> attempt to smile.</i>
<b>plucky</b>	Having or showing determined courage in the face of difficulties. <i>The <b>plucky</b> youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>

Showing great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle.

*Valorous deeds on the field of honour.*

<b>courage</b>	The ability to do something that frightens one; bravery. <i>He fought his illness with great <b>courage</b>.</i>
<b>courageous</b>	Not deterred by danger or pain; brave. <i>Her <b>courageous</b> human rights work.</i>
<b>daredevil</b>	A reckless impetuous irresponsible person. <i>A <b>daredevil</b> skydiver.</i>
<b>daring</b>	(of a person or action) adventurous or audaciously bold. <i>The most <b>daring</b> of contemporary fiction writers.</i>
<b>daringly</b>	In an original manner.
<b>gall</b>	A digestive juice secreted by the liver and stored in the gallbladder aids in the digestion of fats. <i>The bank had the <b>gall</b> to demand a fee.</i>
<b>gallant</b>	A man who is charmingly attentive to women. <i>Mowbray was <b>gallanting</b> the Polish lady.</i>

<b>robust</b>	(of a system, organization, etc.) able to withstand or overcome adverse conditions. <i>A <b>robust</b> perennial.</i>
<b>shameless</b>	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. <i>A <b>shameless</b> imposter.</i>
<b><u>stalwart</u></b>	Used especially of persons. <i>The <b>stalwarts</b> of the Labour Party.</i>
<b>stouthearted</b>	Used especially of persons. <i>A <b>stouthearted</b> fellow who had an active career in the army.</i>
<b><u>valiant</u></b>	Having or showing valor. <i>A <b>valiant</b> attempt to prevent the hijack.</i>
<b><u>valor</u></b>	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>He received a medal for <b>valor</b>.</i>
<b>valorous</b>	Showing great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle. <i><b>Valorous</b> deeds on the field of honour.</i>
<b>venturous</b>	Willing to take risks or embark on difficult or unusual courses of action. <i>Five <b>venturous</b> young men.</i>
