
## Brazen as a Verb

bald-faced	Having white markings on the face.

bodacious	Incorrigible. <b>Bodacious</b> babes.
bold	Clear and distinct. No journalist was <b>bold</b> enough to take on the Prime Minister.
brash	Self-assertive in a rude, noisy, or overbearing way. A <b>brash</b> newcomer disputed the age old rules for admission to the club.
brassy	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. Audience members are tapping their feet to the <b>brassy</b> music of the band.
brazen-faced	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times.
<u>forward</u>	Moving forward. The <b>forward</b> cargo doors.
immodest	Lacking humility or decency. <i>His <b>immodest</b> personality.</i>
<u>insolent</u>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. She hated the <b>insolent</b> tone of his voice.
metallic	Having the lustre of metal; iridescent. <i>Metallic luster.</i>
<u>presumptuous</u>	(of a person or their behaviour) failing to observe the limits of what is permitted or appropriate. I hope I won t be considered <b>presumptuous</b> if I offer some advice.
shameless	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. A <b>shameless</b> imposter.
<u>unabashed</u>	Not embarrassed, disconcerted, or ashamed. A tinseled charm and <b>unabashed</b> sentimentality.
<u>unashamed</u>	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. An <b>unashamed</b> emotionalism.
unblushing	Feeling no shame. A comedy of manners encased in the most <b>unblushing</b> melodrama.
unembarrassed	Not feeling or showing embarrassment. An <b>unembarrassed</b> greeting as if nothing untoward had happened.

# Associations of "Brazen" (30 Words)

<u>arrogant</u>	Having or revealing an exaggerated sense of one's own importance or abilities. <i>He s arrogant</i> and opinionated.
audacious	Showing a willingness to take surprisingly bold risks. <b>Audacious</b> visions of the total conquest of space.
barefaced	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. His years of working <b>barefaced</b> breathing down dust.
<u>blatant</u>	(of bad behaviour) done openly and unashamedly. Despite their <b>blatant</b> attraction to each other they try to stay just friends
bold	A bold typeface or letter. A <b>bold</b> speech.
<u>chutzpah</u>	Unbelievable gall; insolence; audacity. Love him or hate him you have to admire Cohen s <b>chutzpah</b> .
effrontery	Insolent or impertinent behaviour. One juror had the <b>effrontery</b> to challenge the coroner s decision.
<u>flaunt</u>	Display proudly; act ostentatiously or pretentiously. <i>His behavior was an outrageous <b>flaunt</b>.</i>
<u>gall</u>	The contents of the gall bladder bile proverbial for its bitterness. It <b>gall</b> s me that we lost the suit.
<u>glaring</u>	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. A <b>glaring</b> error.
ignorant	Discourteous or rude. An <b>ignorant</b> man.
impenitent	Impervious to moral persuasion. <i>Impenitent elitists.</i>
impertinence	Lack of respect; rudeness. They gasped at the <b>impertinence</b> of the suggestion.
<u>impertinent</u>	Not pertinent to the matter under consideration. Talk of rhetoric and strategy is <b>impertinent</b> to this process.
impudence	An impudent statement. His arrogance and <b>impudence</b> had offended many.



impudent	Not showing due respect for another person; impertinent. The student was kept in for <b>impudent</b> behavior.
indomitable	Impossible to subdue or defeat. A woman of <b>indomitable</b> spirit.
insolence	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. She was sacked for <b>insolence</b> .
<u>insolent</u>	Marked by casual disrespect. She hated the <b>insolent</b> tone of his voice.
<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship s manifest. <i>Manifest</i> disapproval.
obvious	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>Obvious</i> errors.
<u>overt</u>	Open and observable; not secret or hidden. An <b>overt</b> lie.
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. A <b>pert</b> slightly plump girl called Rose.
<u>presumptuous</u>	Excessively forward. The duchess would not put up with <b>presumptuous</b> servants.
proudly	With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. <i>Ray watched</i> <b>proudly</b> from the sidelines as his son won the singles title.
shameless	Feeling no shame. A <b>shameless</b> imposter.
<u>unashamed</u>	Used of persons or their behavior; feeling no shame. An <b>unashamed</b> emotionalism.
uncivil	Lacking civility or good manners. Want nothing from you but to get away from your <b>uncivil</b> tongue.
unrepentant	Not penitent or remorseful. <i>He was unrepentant and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>
upstart	A person who has risen suddenly in rank or importance, especially one who behaves arrogantly. The <b>upstart</b> s who dare to challenge the legitimacy of his rule.
