

bald-faced	Having white markings on the face.

bodacious	Incorrigible. Bodacious babes.
bold	Clear and distinct. No journalist was bold enough to take on the Prime Minister.
brash	Self-assertive in a rude, noisy, or overbearing way. A brash newcomer disputed the age old rules for admission to the club.
brassy	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. Audience members are tapping their feet to the brassy music of the band.
brazen-faced	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times.
<u>forward</u>	Moving forward. The forward cargo doors.
immodest	Lacking humility or decency. <i>His immodest personality.</i>
<u>insolent</u>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. She hated the insolent tone of his voice.
metallic	Having the lustre of metal; iridescent. <i>Metallic luster.</i>
<u>presumptuous</u>	(of a person or their behaviour) failing to observe the limits of what is permitted or appropriate. I hope I won t be considered presumptuous if I offer some advice.
shameless	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. A shameless imposter.
<u>unabashed</u>	Not embarrassed, disconcerted, or ashamed. A tinseled charm and unabashed sentimentality.
<u>unashamed</u>	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. An unashamed emotionalism.
unblushing	Feeling no shame. A comedy of manners encased in the most unblushing melodrama.
unembarrassed	Not feeling or showing embarrassment. An unembarrassed greeting as if nothing untoward had happened.

<u>arrogant</u>	Having or revealing an exaggerated sense of one's own importance or abilities. <i>He s arrogant</i> and opinionated.
audacious	Showing a willingness to take surprisingly bold risks. Audacious visions of the total conquest of space.
barefaced	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. His years of working barefaced breathing down dust.
<u>blatant</u>	(of bad behaviour) done openly and unashamedly. Despite their blatant attraction to each other they try to stay just friends
bold	A bold typeface or letter. A bold speech.
<u>chutzpah</u>	Unbelievable gall; insolence; audacity. Love him or hate him you have to admire Cohen s chutzpah .
effrontery	Insolent or impertinent behaviour. One juror had the effrontery to challenge the coroner s decision.
<u>flaunt</u>	Display proudly; act ostentatiously or pretentiously. <i>His behavior was an outrageous flaunt.</i>
<u>gall</u>	The contents of the gall bladder bile proverbial for its bitterness. It gall s me that we lost the suit.
<u>glaring</u>	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. A glaring error.
ignorant	Discourteous or rude. An ignorant man.
impenitent	Impervious to moral persuasion. <i>Impenitent elitists.</i>
impertinence	Lack of respect; rudeness. They gasped at the impertinence of the suggestion.
<u>impertinent</u>	Not pertinent to the matter under consideration. Talk of rhetoric and strategy is impertinent to this process.
impudence	An impudent statement. His arrogance and impudence had offended many.



impudent	Not showing due respect for another person; impertinent. The student was kept in for impudent behavior.
indomitable	Impossible to subdue or defeat. A woman of indomitable spirit.
insolence	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. She was sacked for insolence .
<u>insolent</u>	Marked by casual disrespect. She hated the insolent tone of his voice.
<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship s manifest. <i>Manifest</i> disapproval.
obvious	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>Obvious</i> errors.
<u>overt</u>	Open and observable; not secret or hidden. An overt lie.
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. A pert slightly plump girl called Rose.
<u>presumptuous</u>	Excessively forward. The duchess would not put up with presumptuous servants.
proudly	With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. <i>Ray watched</i> proudly from the sidelines as his son won the singles title.
shameless	Feeling no shame. A shameless imposter.
<u>unashamed</u>	Used of persons or their behavior; feeling no shame. An unashamed emotionalism.
uncivil	Lacking civility or good manners. Want nothing from you but to get away from your uncivil tongue.
unrepentant	Not penitent or remorseful. <i>He was unrepentant and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>
upstart	A person who has risen suddenly in rank or importance, especially one who behaves arrogantly. The upstart s who dare to challenge the legitimacy of his rule.
