audacious	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. <i>An audacious interpretation of two Jacobean dramas.</i>
bald-faced	Having white markings on the face.
barefaced	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i>His years of working barefaced breathing down dust.</i>

<u>bodacious</u>	Incorrigible. Bodacious babes.
bold	Clear and distinct. <i>No journalist was bold enough to take on the Prime Minister.</i>
brash	Self-assertive in a rude, noisy, or overbearing way. <i>A brash newcomer disputed the age old rules for admission to the club.</i>
brassy	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i>Audience members are tapping their feet to the brassy music of the band.</i>
brazen-faced	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times.
<u>forward</u>	Moving forward. <i>The forward cargo doors.</i>
immodest	Lacking humility or decency. <i>His immodest personality.</i>
<u>insolent</u>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. <i>She hated the insolent tone of his voice.</i>
metallic	Having the lustre of metal; iridescent. Metallic luster.
<u>presumptuous</u>	(of a person or their behaviour) failing to observe the limits of what is permitted or appropriate. <i>I hope I won't be considered presumptuous if I offer some advice.</i>
shameless	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. <i>A shameless imposter.</i>
<u>unabashed</u>	Not embarrassed, disconcerted, or ashamed. <i>A tinselled charm and unabashed sentimentality.</i>
<u>unashamed</u>	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. <i>An unashamed emotionalism.</i>
unblushing	Feeling no shame. <i>A comedy of manners encased in the most unblushing melodrama.</i>
unembarrassed	Not feeling or showing embarrassment. <i>An unembarrassed greeting as if nothing untoward had happened.</i>

audacious	Showing a willingness to take surprisingly bold risks. <i>Audacious visions of the total conquest of space.</i>
barefaced	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i>His years of working barefaced breathing down dust.</i>
<u>blatant</u>	(of bad behaviour) done openly and unashamedly. <i>Despite their blatant attraction to each other they try to stay just friends.</i>
bold	A bold typeface or letter. <i>A bold speech.</i>
<u>chutzpah</u>	Unbelievable gall; insolence; audacity. <i>Love him or hate him you have to admire Cohen s chutzpah.</i>
effrontery	Insolent or impertinent behaviour. <i>One juror had the effrontery to challenge the coroner s decision.</i>
<u>flaunt</u>	Display proudly; act ostentatiously or pretentiously. <i>His behavior was an outrageous flaunt.</i>
<u>gall</u>	The contents of the gall bladder bile proverbial for its bitterness. <i>It galls me that we lost the suit.</i>
<u>glaring</u>	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. <i>A glaring error.</i>
ignorant	Discourteous or rude. <i>An ignorant man.</i>
impenitent	Impervious to moral persuasion. <i>Impenitent elitists.</i>
impertinence	Lack of respect; rudeness. <i>They gasped at the impertinence of the suggestion.</i>
<u>impertinent</u>	Not pertinent to the matter under consideration. <i>Talk of rhetoric and strategy is impertinent to this process.</i>
impudence	An impudent statement. <i>His arrogance and impudence had offended many.</i>

impudent	Not showing due respect for another person; impertinent. <i>The student was kept in for impudent behavior.</i>
indomitable	Impossible to subdue or defeat. <i>A woman of indomitable spirit.</i>
insolence	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. <i>She was sacked for insolence.</i>
<u>insolent</u>	Marked by casual disrespect. <i>She hated the insolent tone of his voice.</i>
<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship s manifest. <i>Manifest disapproval.</i>
obvious	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>Obvious errors.</i>
<u>overt</u>	Open and observable; not secret or hidden. <i>An overt lie.</i>
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>A pert slightly plump girl called Rose.</i>
<u>presumptuous</u>	Excessively forward. <i>The duchess would not put up with presumptuous servants.</i>
proudly	With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. <i>Ray watched proudly from the sidelines as his son won the singles title.</i>
shameless	Feeling no shame. <i>A shameless imposter.</i>
<u>unashamed</u>	Used of persons or their behavior; feeling no shame. <i>An unashamed emotionalism.</i>
uncivil	Lacking civility or good manners. <i>Want nothing from you but to get away from your uncivil tongue.</i>
unrepentant	Not penitent or remorseful. <i>He was unrepentant and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>
upstart	A person who has risen suddenly in rank or importance, especially one who behaves arrogantly. <i>The upstarts who dare to challenge the legitimacy of his rule.</i>
