arrogant	Having or revealing an exaggerated sense of one’s own importance or abilities. <i>A typically arrogant assumption.</i>
audacious	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i>A series of audacious takeovers.</i>
barefaced	Shameless and undisguised. <i>His years of working barefaced breathing down dust.</i>
blatant	Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry. <i>Blatant radios.</i>
bold	A bold typeface or letter. <i>Shadow cabinet members listed in bold.</i>
chutzpah	Extreme self-confidence or audacity. <i>Love him or hate him you have to admire Cohen s chutzpah.</i>
effrontery	Insolent or impertinent behaviour. <i>One juror had the effrontery to challenge the coroner s decision.</i>
flaunt	Dress or behave in a sexually provocative way. <i>Newly rich consumers eager to flaunt their prosperity.</i>
gall	A digestive juice secreted by the liver and stored in the gallbladder aids in the digestion of fats. <i>The bank had the gall to demand a fee.</i>
glaring	Staring fiercely or fixedly. <i>There is a glaring omission in the data.</i>
ignorant	Unaware because of a lack of relevant information or knowledge. <i>I had to walk out before I got ignorant.</i>
impenitent	Not penitent or remorseful. <i>Impenitent elitists.</i>

impertinence	Inappropriate playfulness. <i>They gasped at the impertinence of the suggestion.</i>
<u>impertinent</u>	Not pertinent to a particular matter; irrelevant. <i>An impertinent question.</i>
impudence	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. <i>His arrogance and impudence had offended many.</i>
impudent	Not showing due respect for another person; impertinent. <i>The student was kept in for impudent behavior.</i>
indomitable	Impossible to subdue or defeat. <i>A woman of indomitable spirit.</i>
insolence	An offensive disrespectful impudent act. <i>She was sacked for insolence.</i>
<u>insolent</u>	Showing a rude and arrogant lack of respect. <i>The modern world with its quick material successes and insolent belief in the boundless possibilities of progress.</i>
<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship's manifest. <i>Each passenger must be manifested.</i>
obvious	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>It was an obvious remark to make.</i>
<u>overt</u>	Open and observable; not secret or hidden. <i>Overt hostility.</i>
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>No need to be pert miss.</i>
<u>presumptuous</u>	Excessively forward. <i>The duchess would not put up with presumptuous servants.</i>
proudly	With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. <i>Ray watched proudly from the sidelines as his son won the singles title.</i>
shameless	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. <i>A shameless imposter.</i>
<u>unashamed</u>	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. <i>An unashamed emotionalism.</i>
uncivil	Lacking civility or good manners- Willa Cather. <i>He'd been short and uncivil with her.</i>

Not penitent or remorseful.

unrepentant *He was **unrepentant** and said that his comments were completely accurate.*

upstart Characteristic of someone who has risen economically or socially but lacks the social skills appropriate for this new position.

*The **upstarts** who dare to challenge the legitimacy of his rule.*
