Associations of "Breaching" (30 Words)

actionable	Able to be done or acted on; having practical value. <i>Slander is an actionable offense.</i>
contravene	Deny the truth of. <i>He contravened the Official Secrets Act.</i>
<u>encroach</u>	Impinge or infringe upon. <i>The sea has encroached all round the coast.</i>
encroachment	Entry to another’s property without right or permission. <i>Minor encroachments on our individual liberties.</i>
impinge	Impinge or infringe upon. <i>Several factors impinge on market efficiency.</i>
<u>infraction</u>	A crime less serious than a felony.
<u>infringe</u>	Actively break the terms of (a law, agreement, etc). <i>Such widespread surveillance could infringe personal liberties.</i>
infringement	A crime less serious than a felony. <i>The infringement of the right to privacy.</i>
<u>intrude</u>	Force or thrust (igneous rock) into an existing formation. <i>The noise began to intrude into her thoughts.</i>
<u>intrusion</u>	A thing that intrudes. <i>Unacceptable intrusions of privacy.</i>
invasion	The act of invading; the act of an army that invades for conquest or plunder. <i>The tumor s invasion of surrounding structures.</i>
lawsuit	A claim or dispute brought to a law court for adjudication. <i>His lawyer filed a lawsuit against Los Angeles city.</i>
leaky	Used informally; unable to retain urine. <i>Leaky sources at the company.</i>

litigate	Resort to legal action to settle a matter; be involved in a lawsuit. <i>The plaintiff is prepared to litigate.</i>
misdemeanor	A crime less serious than a felony.
overstep	Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). <i>He has overstepped the bounds of acceptable discipline.</i>
permeable	(of a material or membrane) allowing liquids or gases to pass through it. <i>Permeable membranes.</i>
piracy	A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Air piracy.</i>
plagiarism	The practice of taking someone else's work or ideas and passing them off as one's own. <i>It claims there are similar plagiarisms in the software produced at the university.</i>
plaintiff	A person who brings a case against another in a court of law. <i>The plaintiff commenced an action for damages.</i>
porous	Not retentive or secure. <i>Our unfenced and largely unpoliced border inevitably has been very porous.</i>
rupture	Separate or cause to separate abruptly. <i>The impact ruptured both fuel tanks.</i>
tort	(law) any wrongdoing for which an action for damages may be brought. <i>The law of tort.</i>
tortious	Constituting a tort; wrongful. <i>This does not make the act tortious.</i>
transcend	Be or go beyond the range or limits of (a field of activity or conceptual sphere). <i>He doubts that he will ever transcend Shakespeare.</i>
transgress	Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). <i>Each continent has been transgressed by continental seas.</i>
trespass	Break the law. <i>There is no excuse for trespassing on railway property.</i>
usurpation	Wrongfully seizing and holding (an office or powers) by force (especially the seizure of a throne or supreme authority). <i>A succession of generals who ruled by usurpation.</i>
violate	Violate the sacred character of a place or language. <i>Violate the basic laws or human civilization.</i>
