## Associations of "Breaching" (30 Words)

<b>actionable</b>	Able to be done or acted on; having practical value. <i>Slander is an <b>actionable</b> offense.</i>
<b>contravene</b>	Deny the truth of. <i>He <b>contravened</b> the Official Secrets Act.</i>
<b><u>encroach</u></b>	Impinge or infringe upon. <i>The sea has <b>encroached</b> all round the coast.</i>
<b>encroachment</b>	Entry to another’s property without right or permission. <i>Minor <b>encroachments</b> on our individual liberties.</i>
<b>impinge</b>	Impinge or infringe upon. <i>Several factors <b>impinge</b> on market efficiency.</i>
<b><u>infraction</u></b>	A crime less serious than a felony.
<b><u>infringe</u></b>	Actively break the terms of (a law, agreement, etc). <i>Such widespread surveillance could <b>infringe</b> personal liberties.</i>
<b>infringement</b>	A crime less serious than a felony. <i>The <b>infringement</b> of the right to privacy.</i>
<b><u>intrude</u></b>	Force or thrust (igneous rock) into an existing formation. <i>The noise began to <b>intrude</b> into her thoughts.</i>
<b><u>intrusion</u></b>	A thing that intrudes. <i>Unacceptable <b>intrusions</b> of privacy.</i>
<b>invasion</b>	The act of invading; the act of an army that invades for conquest or plunder. <i>The tumor s <b>invasion</b> of surrounding structures.</i>
<b>lawsuit</b>	A claim or dispute brought to a law court for adjudication. <i>His lawyer filed a <b>lawsuit</b> against Los Angeles city.</i>
<b>leaky</b>	Used informally; unable to retain urine. <i><b>Leaky</b> sources at the company.</i>

<b>litigate</b>	Resort to legal action to settle a matter; be involved in a lawsuit. <i>The plaintiff is prepared to <b>litigate</b>.</i>
<b>misdemeanor</b>	A crime less serious than a felony.
<b>overstep</b>	Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). <i>He has <b>overstepped</b> the bounds of acceptable discipline.</i>
<b>permeable</b>	(of a material or membrane) allowing liquids or gases to pass through it. <i><b>Permeable</b> membranes.</i>
<b>piracy</b>	A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Air <b>piracy</b>.</i>
<b>plagiarism</b>	The practice of taking someone else's work or ideas and passing them off as one's own. <i>It claims there are similar <b>plagiarisms</b> in the software produced at the university.</i>
<b>plaintiff</b>	A person who brings a case against another in a court of law. <i>The <b>plaintiff</b> commenced an action for damages.</i>
<b>porous</b>	Not retentive or secure. <i>Our unfenced and largely unpoliced border inevitably has been very <b>porous</b>.</i>
<b>rupture</b>	Separate or cause to separate abruptly. <i>The impact <b>ruptured</b> both fuel tanks.</i>
<b>tort</b>	(law) any wrongdoing for which an action for damages may be brought. <i>The law of <b>tort</b>.</i>
<b>tortious</b>	Constituting a tort; wrongful. <i>This does not make the act <b>tortious</b>.</i>
<b>transcend</b>	Be or go beyond the range or limits of (a field of activity or conceptual sphere). <i>He doubts that he will ever <b>transcend</b> Shakespeare.</i>
<b>transgress</b>	Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). <i>Each continent has been <b>transgressed</b> by continental seas.</i>
<b>trespass</b>	Break the law. <i>There is no excuse for <b>trespassing</b> on railway property.</i>
<b>usurpation</b>	Wrongfully seizing and holding (an office or powers) by force (especially the seizure of a throne or supreme authority). <i>A succession of generals who ruled by <b>usurpation</b>.</i>
<b>violate</b>	Violate the sacred character of a place or language. <i><b>Violate</b> the basic laws or human civilization.</i>
