Breadth, range, or magnitude.
*Waves with **amplitudes** greater than or equal to 20 mm.*

broadness

The property of being wide; having great width.

The state or condition of including all or nearly all elements or aspects of something.

comprehensiveness

*The **comprehensiveness** of care I provide to my patients is important.*

depth	The attribute or quality of being deep, strong, or intense. <i>The depth of the wardrobe.</i>
extensiveness	Large or extensive in breadth or importance or comprehensiveness. <i>The very extensiveness of his power was a temptation to abuse it.</i>
<u>extent</u>	The size or scale of something. <i>The extent of the damage.</i>
largeness	The capacity to understand a broad range of topics. <i>A man distinguished by the largeness and scope of his views.</i>
range	A line or series of mountains or hills. <i>The range of a supersonic jet.</i>
<u>scope</u>	A telescope microscope or other device having a name ending in scope. <i>We widened the scope of our investigation.</i>
thickness	Used of a line or mark. <i>The framework has to support two thicknesses of plasterboard.</i>
wideness	The property of being wide; having great width.
<u>width</u>	The sideways extent of a swimming pool as a measure of the distance swum. <i>A single width of hardboard.</i>

Usage Examples of "Breadth" as a noun

- *The boat measured 27 feet in breadth.*
- *The bank reaches a maximum breadth of about 100 km.*
- *The minister is not noted for his breadth of vision.*
- *She has the advantage of breadth of experience.*
- *A teacher must have a breadth of knowledge of the subject.*

<u>abyss</u>	A catastrophic situation seen as likely to occur. <i>Satan's dark abyss.</i>
ample	Enough or more than enough; plentiful. <i>Of ample proportions.</i>
big	Generous and understanding and tolerant. <i>African bands which are big in Britain.</i>

brim	Fill something so completely that it almost overflows. <i>My eyes brimmed with tears.</i>
broad	Broad in scope or content T G Winner. <i>The broad humour has been toned down.</i>
capacious	Large in capacity. <i>She carried a capacious bag.</i>
deep	Relatively deep or strong affecting one deeply. <i>A deep analysis.</i>
depth	A remote and inaccessible place. <i>Depth of a shelf.</i>
expanded	Being or having been enlarged or extended. <i>The expanded fins of the ray.</i>
<u>expanse</u>	The extent of a 2-dimensional surface enclosed within a boundary. <i>The green expanse of the forest.</i>
extensive	(of agriculture) obtaining a relatively small crop from a large area with a minimum of capital and labour. <i>An extensive garden.</i>
<u>extensively</u>	To a large or detailed degree. <i>Her husband travelled extensively in his job.</i>
<u>extent</u>	The point or degree to which something extends. <i>An enclosure ten acres in extent.</i>
gamut	The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>A face that expressed a gamut of emotions.</i>
outspread	Fully extended or expanded. <i>That eagle outspreading his wings for flight.</i>
panoramic	As from an altitude or distance. <i>On a clear day there are panoramic views.</i>
plank	Cook and serve on a plank. <i>He planked himself into the sofa.</i>
<u>prevalence</u>	(epidemiology) the ratio (for a given time period) of the number of occurrences of a disease or event to the number of units at risk in the population. <i>He was surprised by the prevalence of optimism about the future.</i>
profundity	The intellectual ability to penetrate deeply into ideas. <i>The simplicity and profundity of the message.</i>
roomy	(especially of accommodation) having plenty of room; spacious. <i>The cabin is roomy and well planned.</i>

<u>spacious</u>	(of buildings and rooms) having ample space. <i>The hotel has a spacious lounge and TV room.</i>
stretch	The capacity of a material or garment to stretch or be stretched elasticity. <i>During the Inquisition the torturers would stretch their victims on a rack.</i>
suffuse	To become overspread as with a fluid, a colour, a gleam of light. <i>The first half of the poem is suffused with idealism.</i>
<u>swath</u>	A path or strip (as cut by one course of mowing).
<u>thick</u>	With a thick consistency. <i>Thick mud.</i>
vast	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope. <i>A vast plain full of orchards.</i>
verbose	Using or expressed in more words than are needed. <i>Much academic language is obscure and verbose.</i>
<u>wide</u>	A ball that is judged to be too wide of the stumps for the batsman to play for which an extra is awarded to the batting side. <i>His eyes opened wide.</i>
<u>width</u>	The measurement or extent of something from side to side; the lesser of two or the least of three dimensions of a body. <i>A single width of hardboard.</i>
wingspan	Linear distance between the extremities of an airfoil. <i>An eagle with a wingspan of 7 ft.</i>
