- *The quantity broken.*



Synonyms of "Breakage" as a noun (14 Words)

break	Dance music featuring breakbeats. <i>The break in the dam threatened the valley.</i>
breaking	The act of breaking something.
bursting	The act of exploding or bursting.
cleavage	Cell division, especially of a fertilized egg cell. <i>True slates split easily along a plane of cleavage.</i>
cracking	The act of cracking something. <i>He heard the cracking of the ice.</i>
disintegration	The spontaneous disintegration of a radioactive substance along with the emission of ionizing radiation. <i>The disintegration of infected cells.</i>

fragmentation	The condition of a file that is broken up and stored in many different locations on a magnetic disk. <i>Fragmentation slows system performance because it takes extra time to locate and assemble the parts of the fragmented file.</i>
rupture	An abdominal hernia. <i>The rupture with his father would never be healed.</i>
separation	The distance between things. <i>The separation of church and state.</i>
shattering	The act of breaking something into small pieces.
splintering	A small thin sharp bit of wood or glass or metal.
split	A split level house. <i>The split between the rich and the poor.</i>
splitting	The action of dividing and sharing something. <i>Atomic bombs get their power from the splitting of the atom.</i>



Usage Examples of "Breakage" as a noun

- *The breakage was unavoidable.*
- *Some breakage of bone has occurred.*
- *The total breakage was huge.*
- *There had been three breakages in the overhead wires.*



Associations of "Breakage" (30 Words)

avoid

Repudiate, nullify, or render void (a decree or contract).
*Her former friends now **avoid** her.*

bootless

(of a task or undertaking) ineffectual; useless.
*Remonstrating with him seems ever to have been a **bootless** task.*

deflect

Turn aside and away from an initial or intended course.
*He attempted to **deflect** attention away from his private life.*

destroy

Destroy completely damage irreparably.
*The room had been **destroyed** by fire.*

execrable	Of very poor quality or condition. <i>Execrable crimes.</i>
futile	Producing no result or effect. <i>A futile attempt to keep fans from mounting the stage.</i>
futilely	In a futile and unproductive manner.
garbage	Worthless or meaningless material or ideas; rubbish. <i>She tossed the moldy bread into the garbage.</i>
gratuitous	Given or done free of charge. <i>Gratuitous violence.</i>
ineffective	Not producing any significant or desired effect. <i>A weak and ineffective president.</i>
ineffectual	(of a person) lacking the ability or qualities to fulfil a role or handle a situation. <i>The therapy was ineffectual.</i>
invalid	Injure permanently. <i>Invalid reasoning.</i>
misfire	A failure to hit (or meet or find etc). <i>The guns misfired.</i>
nugatory	Useless or futile. <i>A nugatory law.</i>
object	Express or raise an objection or protest or criticism or express dissent. <i>Bryant objects this very circumstance to the authenticity of the Iliad.</i>
obviate	Avoid or prevent (something undesirable). <i>The presence of roller blinds obviated the need for curtains.</i>
off	Located on the side of a vehicle that is normally furthest from the kerb offside. <i>He is off on sick leave.</i>
removal	The act of removing. <i>Opposition parties demanded his immediate removal from office.</i>
repair	The action of repairing something. <i>The abandoned house they bought needs repairs.</i>
scission	A division or split between people or parties; a schism. <i>This bacteriophage catalyses scission of DNA strands.</i>
trivia	Details, considerations, or pieces of information of little importance or value. <i>We fill our days with meaningless trivia.</i>

<u>trivial</u>	Concerned with trivialities. <i>Huge fines were imposed for trivial offences.</i>
unavailing	Achieving little or nothing; ineffective. <i>An unavailing attempt.</i>
<u>unproductive</u>	Not producing desired results. <i>Elimination of high cost or unproductive industries.</i>
<u>useless</u>	Having no beneficial use or incapable of functioning usefully. <i>A kitchen full of useless gadgets.</i>
vain	Unproductive of success. <i>Their flattery made him vain.</i>
valueless	Of no value. <i>Cherished but valueless heirlooms.</i>
waste	Run off as waste. <i>He wasted his inheritance on his insincere friends.</i>
<u>wasted</u>	(of an action) not producing the desired result. <i>Advice is wasted words.</i>
worthless	Morally reprehensible. <i>A worthless idler.</i>
