<b>break</b>	Dance music featuring breakbeats. <i>The <b>break</b> in the dam threatened the valley.</i>
<b>breaking</b>	The act of breaking something.
<b>bursting</b>	The act of exploding or bursting.
<b>cleavage</b>	Cell division, especially of a fertilized egg cell. <i>True slates split easily along a plane of <b>cleavage</b>.</i>
<b>cracking</b>	The act of cracking something. <i>He heard the <b>cracking</b> of the ice.</i>
<b>disintegration</b>	The spontaneous disintegration of a radioactive substance along with the emission of ionizing radiation. <i>The <b>disintegration</b> of infected cells.</i>



<b>fragmentation</b>	The condition of a file that is broken up and stored in many different locations on a magnetic disk. <i><b>Fragmentation</b> slows system performance because it takes extra time to locate and assemble the parts of the fragmented file.</i>
<b>rupture</b>	An abdominal hernia. <i>The <b>rupture</b> with his father would never be healed.</i>
<b>separation</b>	The distance between things. <i>The <b>separation</b> of church and state.</i>
<b>shattering</b>	The act of breaking something into small pieces.
<b>splintering</b>	A small thin sharp bit of wood or glass or metal.
<b>split</b>	A split level house. <i>The <b>split</b> between the rich and the poor.</i>
<b>splitting</b>	The action of dividing and sharing something. <i>Atomic bombs get their power from the <b>splitting</b> of the atom.</i>





## Usage Examples of "Breakage" as a noun

- *The breakage was unavoidable.*
- *Some breakage of bone has occurred.*
- *The total breakage was huge.*
- *There had been three breakages in the overhead wires.*



## Associations of "Breakage" (30 Words)

### **avoid**

Repudiate, nullify, or render void (a decree or contract).  
*Her former friends now **avoid** her.*

### **bootless**

(of a task or undertaking) ineffectual; useless.  
*Remonstrating with him seems ever to have been a **bootless** task.*

### **deflect**

Turn aside and away from an initial or intended course.  
*He attempted to **deflect** attention away from his private life.*

### **destroy**

Destroy completely damage irreparably.  
*The room had been **destroyed** by fire.*

<b>execrable</b>	Of very poor quality or condition. <i><b>Execrable</b> crimes.</i>
<b>futile</b>	Producing no result or effect. <i>A <b>futile</b> attempt to keep fans from mounting the stage.</i>
<b>futilely</b>	In a futile and unproductive manner.
<b>garbage</b>	Worthless or meaningless material or ideas; rubbish. <i>She tossed the moldy bread into the <b>garbage</b>.</i>
<b>gratuitous</b>	Given or done free of charge. <i><b>Gratuitous</b> violence.</i>
<b>ineffective</b>	Not producing any significant or desired effect. <i>A weak and <b>ineffective</b> president.</i>
<b>ineffectual</b>	(of a person) lacking the ability or qualities to fulfil a role or handle a situation. <i>The therapy was <b>ineffectual</b>.</i>
<b>invalid</b>	Injure permanently. <i><b>Invalid</b> reasoning.</i>
<b>misfire</b>	A failure to hit (or meet or find etc). <i>The guns <b>misfired</b>.</i>
<b>nugatory</b>	Useless or futile. <i>A <b>nugatory</b> law.</i>
<b>object</b>	Express or raise an objection or protest or criticism or express dissent. <i>Bryant <b>objects</b> this very circumstance to the authenticity of the Iliad.</i>
<b>obviate</b>	Avoid or prevent (something undesirable). <i>The presence of roller blinds <b>obviated</b> the need for curtains.</i>
<b>off</b>	Located on the side of a vehicle that is normally furthest from the kerb offside. <i>He is <b>off</b> on sick leave.</i>
<b>removal</b>	The act of removing. <i>Opposition parties demanded his immediate <b>removal</b> from office.</i>
<b>repair</b>	The action of repairing something. <i>The abandoned house they bought needs <b>repairs</b>.</i>
<b>scission</b>	A division or split between people or parties; a schism. <i>This bacteriophage catalyses <b>scission</b> of DNA strands.</i>
<b>trivia</b>	Details, considerations, or pieces of information of little importance or value. <i>We fill our days with meaningless <b>trivia</b>.</i>

<b><u>trivial</u></b>	Concerned with trivialities. <i>Huge fines were imposed for <b>trivial</b> offences.</i>
<b>unavailing</b>	Achieving little or nothing; ineffective. <i>An <b>unavailing</b> attempt.</i>
<b><u>unproductive</u></b>	Not producing desired results. <i>Elimination of high cost or <b>unproductive</b> industries.</i>
<b><u>useless</u></b>	Having no beneficial use or incapable of functioning usefully. <i>A kitchen full of <b>useless</b> gadgets.</i>
<b>vain</b>	Unproductive of success. <i>Their flattery made him <b>vain</b>.</i>
<b>valueless</b>	Of no value. <i>Cherished but <b>valueless</b> heirlooms.</i>
<b>waste</b>	Run off as waste. <i>He <b>wasted</b> his inheritance on his insincere friends.</i>
<b><u>wasted</u></b>	(of an action) not producing the desired result. <i>Advice is <b>wasted</b> words.</i>
<b>worthless</b>	Morally reprehensible. <i>A <b>worthless</b> idler.</i>
