<b>air</b>	Referring to the use of aircraft. <i>The <b>air</b> was stale.</i>
<b>breath of wind</b>	The air that is inhaled and exhaled in respiration.
<b>child's play</b>	A theatrical performance of a drama.
<b>cinch</b>	An extremely easy task. <i>They watered the horses and loosed the <b>cinches</b>.</i>
<b>current of air</b>	A flow of electricity through a conductor.
<b>duck soup</b>	Flesh of a duck (domestic or wild).

<b>picnic</b>	Any undertaking that is easy to do. <i>We swam and went on <b>picnics</b>.</i>
<b>piece of cake</b>	A serving that has been cut from a larger portion.
<b>puff of air</b>	A soft spherical object made from fluffy fibers; for applying powder to the skin.
<b><u>pushover</u></b>	Someone who is easily taken advantage of. <i>This is going to be a <b>pushover</b>.</i>
<b>sinecure</b>	A position requiring little or no work but giving the holder status or financial benefit. <i>Political <b>sinecures</b> for the supporters of ministers.</i>
<b>snap</b>	A card game in which cards from two piles are turned over simultaneously and players call snap as quickly as possible when two similar cards are exposed. <i>Holiday <b>snaps</b>.</i>
<b>walkover</b>	Any undertaking that is easy to do. <i>A 12 2 <b>walkover</b>.</i>
<b>zephyr</b>	A very light article of clothing.

- *Travelling through London was a breeze.*



## Breeze as a Verb

### Definitions of "Breeze" as a verb

- *To proceed quickly and easily.*
- *Deal with something with apparently casual ease.*
- *Come or go in a casual or light-hearted manner.*

*A police van **cruised** past us.*
- sail** Travel in a ship or boat using sails or engine power.  
*Ali **sailed** through his exams.*
- saunter** Walk in a slow, relaxed manner.  
*Adam **sauntered** into the room.*
- stroll** Achieve a sporting victory without effort.  
*The horse **strolled** home by 12 lengths.*
- walk casually** Make walk.

<b>air</b>	Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. <i>All goods must come in by <b>air</b>.</i>
<b>blow</b>	An act of blowing one's nose. <i><b>Blow</b> one's nose.</i>
<b>calamity</b>	An event resulting in great loss and misfortune. <i>The whole city was affected by the irremediable <b>calamity</b>.</i>
<b>cataclysm</b>	A sudden violent political or social upheaval. <i>The <b>cataclysm</b> of the First World War.</i>
<b>damage</b>	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. <i>The car was badly <b>damaged</b> in the accident.</i>
<b>eddy</b>	A circular movement of water causing a small whirlpool. <i>An <b>eddy</b> of chill air swirled into the carriage.</i>



<b>fume</b>	Expose something especially wood to ammonia fumes in order to produce dark tints. <i>Clouds of exhaust <b>fumes</b> spewed by cars.</i>
<b><u>gale</u></b>	A strong wind moving 45-90 knots; force 7 to 10 on Beaufort scale. <i>I slept well despite the howling <b>gales</b> outside.</i>
<b>gust</b>	Of the wind blow in gusts. <i>The wind was <b>gusting</b> through the branches of the tree.</i>
<b><u>hurricane</u></b>	A severe tropical cyclone usually with heavy rains and winds moving at 63-136 knots (12 on the Beaufort scale). <i>A powerful <b>hurricane</b> hit the Florida coast.</i>
<b><u>odor</u></b>	Any property detected by the olfactory system.
<b>pant</b>	Run or go in a specified direction while panting. <i>Robyn was breathing rather fast in shallow <b>pants</b>.</i>
<b>pneumatic</b>	An item of pneumatic equipment. <i>A tattoo of a <b>pneumatic</b> girl.</i>
<b><u>puff</u></b>	A light inflated pastry or puff shell. <i>His breath <b>puffed</b> out like white smoke.</i>
<b>purl</b>	Knit with a purl stitch. <i>The water was <b>purling</b>.</i>
<b>rainfall</b>	The fall of rain. <i>Low <b>rainfall</b>.</i>
<b><u>scent</u></b>	Catch the scent of get wind of. <i>The dog having the help of <b>scent</b> as well as of sight.</i>
<b>smell</b>	Smell bad. <i>She loved the <b>smell</b> of roses.</i>
<b>smoke</b>	Emit smoke or visible vapour. <i>I got <b>smoked</b> in that fight.</i>
<b>sniff</b>	An act or sound of sniffing. <i>Miranda <b>sniffed</b> the heavy perfume of the lilies.</i>
<b>squall</b>	Blow in a squall. <i>Sarah was <b>squalling</b> in her crib.</i>
<b><u>storm</u></b>	Attack by storm attack suddenly. <i>He <b>stormed</b> out of the house.</i>
<b><u>thunderstorm</u></b>	A storm with thunder and lightning and typically also heavy rain or hail.

<b>tornado</b>	A mobile, destructive vortex of violently rotating winds having the appearance of a funnel-shaped cloud and advancing beneath a large storm system. <i>Teenagers caught up in a <b>tornado</b> of sexual confusion.</i>
<b>typhoon</b>	A tropical cyclone occurring in the western Pacific or Indian oceans.
<b>waft</b>	Be driven or carried along, as by the air. <i>The smell of stale fat <b>wafted</b> out from the cafe.</i>
<b>whiff</b>	Perceive by inhaling through the nose. <i><b>Whiff</b> out a prayer.</i>
<b>wind</b>	Catch the scent of get wind of. <i>An easterly <b>wind</b>.</i>
<b>windy</b>	Not practical or realizable; speculative. <i>Long winded or <b>windy</b> speakers.</i>
<b>zephyr</b>	A very light article of clothing.
