- ale** A general name for beer made with a top fermenting yeast in some of the United States an ale is by law a brew of more than 4 alcohol by volume.  
*Traditional cask conditioned ales.*
- amalgam** An alloy of mercury with another metal usually silver used by dentists to fill cavities in teeth except for iron and platinum all metals dissolve in mercury and chemists refer to the resulting mercury mixtures as amalgams.

**compound** (chemistry) a substance formed by chemical union of two or more elements or ingredients in definite proportion by weight.  
*A **compound** of hydrogen and oxygen.*

**concoction** The invention of a scheme or story to suit some purpose.  
*His testimony was a **concoction**.*

**drink** Any liquid suitable for drinking.  
*He heaved the outboard motor into the **drink**.*

**melange** A motley assortment of things.  
*A **melange** of tender vegetables and herbs.*

**mix** A version of a recording in which the component tracks are mixed in a different way from the original.  
*A dance **mix** version of *This Charming Man*.*

**mixture** An event that combines things in a mixture.  
*Form the **mixture** into a manageable dough.*

**pot-pourri** A collection containing a variety of sorts of things.

<b>gather force</b>	Assemble or get together. (of an event regarded as threatening or significant) be about to happen.
<b>impend</b>	<i>It seemed certain that some great trial of strength <b>impended</b> between the opponents.</i>
<b>infuse</b>	Instil (a quality) in someone or something. <i>He did his best to <b>infuse</b> good humour into his voice.</i>
<b>loom</b>	Weave on a loom. <i>Another air plane <b>loomed</b> into the sky.</i>
<b>make</b>	Make or cause to be or to become. <i><b>Make</b> him an offer he can't refuse.</i>
<b>prepare</b>	To prepare verbally either for written or spoken delivery. <i>She took time off to <b>prepare</b> for her exams.</i>

<b>gulp</b>	An act of gulping food or drink. <i>The chairman gave an audible <b>gulp</b>.</i>

<b>rice</b>	Sieve so that it becomes the consistency of rice. <b>Riced</b> boiled potatoes.

<b>swill</b>	Kitchen refuse and scraps of waste food mixed with water for feeding to pigs. <i>A feast <b>swilled</b> down with pints of cider.</i>
<b>tea</b>	A hot drink made by infusing the dried crushed leaves of the tea plant in boiling water. <i>An Englishman would interrupt a war to have his afternoon <b>tea</b>.</i>
<b>vino</b>	Fermented juice (of grapes especially).
<b>wine</b>	Drink wine. <i>The regional foods and <b>wines</b> of France.</i>
