# Associations of "Bribery" (30 Words)

<u>abet</u>	Encourage or assist someone to commit (a crime. We are aiding and <b>abet</b> ting this illegal traffic.
adulation	Servile flattery; exaggerated and hypocritical praise. <i>He found it difficult to cope with the <b>adulation</b> of the fans.</i>
allegation	A claim or assertion that someone has done something illegal or wrong, typically one made without proof. <i>An allegation</i> of malpractice.
allegedly	Used to convey that something is claimed to be the case or have taken place, although there is no proof. <i>He was <b>allegedly</b> a leading participant in the coup attempt.</i>
<u>cabal</u>	A secret intrigue. A <b>cabal</b> of dissidents.



<u>conspiracy</u>	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. They were cleared of <b>conspiracy</b> to pervert the course of justice.
corruption	Decay of matter (as by rot or oxidation. The journalist who wants to expose <b>corruption</b> in high places.
cronyism	Favoritism shown to friends and associates (as by appointing them to positions without regard for their qualifications. <i>It looked like an end to the cronyism with which many of the government s appointments had been tainted.</i>
<u>degradation</u>	A low or downcast state- H.L.Menchken. A trail of human misery and <b>degradation</b> .
disgrace	Damage the reputation of. <i>He left the army in <b>disgrace</b></i> .
dishonor	Bring shame or dishonor upon. <b>Dishonor</b> checks and drafts.
embezzlement	Theft or misappropriation of funds placed in one's trust or belonging to one's employer. <i>Charges of fraud and embezzlement</i> .
embroil	Bring into a state of confusion or disorder. What merit do you claim for having <b>embroil</b> ed everything in which you are concerned.
<u>flattery</u>	Excessive or insincere praise. She allowed no hint of <b>flattery</b> to enter her voice.
fraud	Wrongful or criminal deception intended to result in financial or personal gain. Prosecutions for social security <b>fraud</b> s.
impeach	Call into question the integrity or validity of (a practice. <i>The President was impeached.</i>
infamy	The state of being well known for some bad quality or deed. A day that will live in <b>infamy</b> .
insider	An officer of a corporation or others who have access to private information about the corporation's operations. <i>Political insiders.</i>
<u>insincere</u>	Not expressing genuine feelings. A charming but thoroughly <b>insincere</b> woman.
<u>involvement</u>	A sense of concern with and curiosity about someone or something. There was additional <b>involvement</b> of the liver and spleen.
junto	A clique (often secret) that seeks power usually through intrigue.



<u>liaison</u>	A sexual relationship, especially one that is secret or illicit. <i>He provided a <b>liaison</b> with the guerrillas.</i>
<u>manipulation</u>	Exerting shrewd or devious influence especially for one's own advantage. <i>The format allows fast picture manipulation</i> .
nepotism	The practice among those with power or influence of favouring relatives or friends, especially by giving them jobs. <i>His years in office were marked by corruption and <b>nepotism</b>.</i>
opprobrium	A state of extreme dishonor. The critical <b>opprobrium</b> generated by his films.
patsy	A person who is easily taken advantage of, especially by being cheated or blamed for something. There is a mischievous sparkle in his eyes that suggests he is no <b>patsy</b> .
peculation	The fraudulent appropriation of funds or property entrusted to your care but actually owned by someone else.
quisling	A traitor who collaborates with an enemy force occupying their country. <i>He had the <b>Quisling</b> owner of the factory arrested.</i>
scandal	The outrage or anger caused by a scandalous action or event. I know that you would want no <b>scandal</b> attached to her name.
<u>shame</u>	Make someone feel ashamed. She was hot with <b>shame</b> .
