attache	A shallow and rectangular briefcase.
<u>bag</u>	Put into a bag. <i>I had bags of energy.</i>

corpus	A collection of written or spoken material in machine-readable form, assembled for the purpose of linguistic research. <i>He edited the Hemingway corpus.</i>
datum	A piece of information. <i>This is not a permanent and unchangeable datum.</i>
<u>directory</u>	The revolutionary government in France 1795-9, comprising two councils and a five-member executive. It maintained an aggressive foreign policy, but could not control events at home and was overthrown by Napoleon Bonaparte.
disk	Computer science a memory device consisting of a flat disk covered with a magnetic coating on which information is stored. <i>The moon s disk hung in a cloudless sky.</i>
<u>document</u>	Support or accompany with documentation. <i>The photographer spent years documenting the lives of miners.</i>
<u>file</u>	File a formal charge against. <i>He still had the moment filed away in his memory.</i>
folder	Covering that is folded over to protect the contents.
leaflet	Distribute leaflets to people or an area. <i>They were leafleting in Victoria Square.</i>
lexicographer	A compiler or writer of a dictionary; a student of the lexical component of language.
pamphlet	Distribute pamphlets to. <i>He published a spate of pamphlets on the subjects about which he felt strongly.</i>
panoply	An extensive or impressive collection. <i>I leaned forward to take in the full panoply of tourist London.</i>
paperback	A book with paper covers. <i>The paperback edition of her biography.</i>
paperwork	Routine work involving written documents such as reports or letters. <i>I need to catch up on some paperwork.</i>
<u>portfolio</u>	A range of investments held by a person or organization. <i>He remembered her because she was carrying a large portfolio.</i>
record	Anything such as a document or a phonograph record or a photograph providing permanent evidence of or information about past events. <i>He held the world record for over a decade.</i>

stenographer	A person whose job is to transcribe speech in shorthand. <i>A court stenographer.</i>
suitcase	A portable rectangular container for carrying clothes. <i>Three huge suitcases and a plethora of hand baggage.</i>
text	Send someone a text message. <i>His economics textbook is in its tenth edition.</i>
transcribe	Arrange (a piece of music) for a different instrument, voice, or group of these. <i>His largest early work was transcribed for organ.</i>
transcript	Something that has been transcribed; a written record (usually typewritten) of dictated or recorded speech. <i>You can obtain a transcript of this radio program by sending a self addressed envelope to the station.</i>
transcription	A written or printed version of something; a transcript. <i>The funding covers transcription of nearly illegible photocopies.</i>
transliterate	Write or print (a letter or word) using the closest corresponding letters of a different alphabet or script. <i>Names from one language are often transliterated into another.</i>
wrapper	A tobacco leaf of superior quality enclosing a cigar. <i>A sweet wrapper.</i>
written	Written as for a film or play or broadcast. <i>Written evidence.</i>
