<b>grip</b>	A hairgrip. <i>He had to take a <b>grip</b> on his nerves.</i>
<b>portmanteau</b>	Consisting of or combining two or more aspects or qualities. <i>A <b>portmanteau</b> movie composed of excerpts from his most famous films.</i>
<b>travel bag</b>	The act of going from one place to another.
<b>travelling bag</b>	Self-propelled movement.
<b>valise</b>	A small overnight bag for short trips.
<b>vanity case</b>	Feelings of excessive pride.

<b><u>affidavit</u></b>	A written statement confirmed by oath or affirmation, for use as evidence in court. <i>A former employee swore an <b>affidavit</b> relating to his claim for unfair dismissal.</i>
<b>annotation</b>	The action of annotating a text or diagram. <i>Marginal <b>annotations</b>.</i>
<b>archive</b>	Place or store something in an archive. <i>Source materials in local <b>archives</b>.</i>
<b>attache</b>	A shallow and rectangular briefcase.
<b><u>bag</u></b>	Put into a bag. <i>I had <b>bags</b> of energy.</i>

<b>case</b>	An agreed summary of the facts relating to a legal case drawn up for review or decision on a point of law by a higher court. <i>The <b>case</b> against tobacco advertising.</i>
<b>corpus</b>	A collection of written or spoken material in machine-readable form, assembled for the purpose of linguistic research. <i>He edited the Hemingway <b>corpus</b>.</i>
<b>datum</b>	A piece of information. <i>This is not a permanent and unchangeable <b>datum</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">directory</a></u>	The revolutionary government in France 1795-9, comprising two councils and a five-member executive. It maintained an aggressive foreign policy, but could not control events at home and was overthrown by Napoleon Bonaparte.
<b>disk</b>	Computer science a memory device consisting of a flat disk covered with a magnetic coating on which information is stored. <i>The moon s <b>disk</b> hung in a cloudless sky.</i>
<u><a href="#">document</a></u>	Support or accompany with documentation. <i>The photographer spent years <b>documenting</b> the lives of miners.</i>
<u><a href="#">file</a></u>	File a formal charge against. <i>He still had the moment <b>filed</b> away in his memory.</i>
<b>folder</b>	Covering that is folded over to protect the contents.
<b>leaflet</b>	Distribute leaflets to people or an area. <i>They were <b>leafleting</b> in Victoria Square.</i>
<b>lexicographer</b>	A compiler or writer of a dictionary; a student of the lexical component of language.
<b>pamphlet</b>	Distribute pamphlets to. <i>He published a spate of <b>pamphlets</b> on the subjects about which he felt strongly.</i>
<b>panoply</b>	An extensive or impressive collection. <i>I leaned forward to take in the full <b>panoply</b> of tourist London.</i>
<b>paperback</b>	A book with paper covers. <i>The <b>paperback</b> edition of her biography.</i>
<b>paperwork</b>	Routine work involving written documents such as reports or letters. <i>I need to catch up on some <b>paperwork</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">portfolio</a></u>	A range of investments held by a person or organization. <i>He remembered her because she was carrying a large <b>portfolio</b>.</i>
<b>record</b>	Anything such as a document or a phonograph record or a photograph providing permanent evidence of or information about past events. <i>He held the world <b>record</b> for over a decade.</i>

<b>stenographer</b>	A person whose job is to transcribe speech in shorthand. <i>A court <b>stenographer</b>.</i>
<b>suitcase</b>	A portable rectangular container for carrying clothes. <i>Three huge <b>suitcases</b> and a plethora of hand baggage.</i>
<b>text</b>	Send someone a text message. <i>His economics <b>text</b>book is in its tenth edition.</i>
<b>transcribe</b>	Arrange (a piece of music) for a different instrument, voice, or group of these. <i>His largest early work was <b>transcribed</b> for organ.</i>
<b>transcript</b>	Something that has been transcribed; a written record (usually typewritten) of dictated or recorded speech. <i>You can obtain a <b>transcript</b> of this radio program by sending a self addressed envelope to the station.</i>
<b>transcription</b>	A written or printed version of something; a transcript. <i>The funding covers <b>transcription</b> of nearly illegible photocopies.</i>
<b>transliterate</b>	Write or print (a letter or word) using the closest corresponding letters of a different alphabet or script. <i>Names from one language are often <b>transliterated</b> into another.</i>
<b>wrapper</b>	A tobacco leaf of superior quality enclosing a cigar. <i>A sweet <b>wrapper</b>.</i>
<b>written</b>	Written as for a film or play or broadcast. <i><b>Written</b> evidence.</i>
