- *An organization with a military or quasi-military structure.*
- *Army unit smaller than a division.*
- *A subdivision of an army, typically consisting of a small number of infantry battalions and/or other units and forming part of a division.*

band	A stripe, line, or elongated area of a different colour, texture, or composition from its surroundings. <i>The top band of pupils.</i>
battalion	An army unit usually consisting of a headquarters and three or more companies. <i>A battalion of ants.</i>
<u>body</u>	The body excluding the head and neck and limbs. <i>They found the body in the lake.</i>
company	A visiting person or group of people. <i>He started the company in his garage.</i>
<u>contingent</u>	A gathering of persons representative of some larger group. <i>A contingent of Japanese businessmen attending a conference.</i>
corps	A body of people associated together. <i>Diplomatic corps.</i>

<u>crew</u>	A group of rappers, break dancers, or graffiti artists performing or operating together. <i>A graffiti crew called the Syndicate.</i>

division	A group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>Deep cultural divisions.</i>
force	The army navy and air force of a country. <i>He might still be a force for peace and unity.</i>
garrison	The building occupied by a garrison. <i>Forces from these garrisons have been used against governments.</i>
group	A set of elements, together with an associative binary operation, which contains an inverse for each element and an identity element. <i>A methyl group.</i>
<u>legion</u>	The Foreign Legion. <i>Legions of photographers and TV cameras.</i>
<u>outfit</u>	A group of people undertaking a particular activity together, especially a group of musicians, a team, or a business concern. <i>A first aid outfit.</i>
party	A person or people forming one side in an agreement or dispute. <i>The visiting party will be asked to conform to safety procedures whilst on site.</i>
platoon	Engaged in platooning. <i>The platoon commander.</i>
regiment	An operational unit of artillery. <i>The powers of ecclesiastical regiment which none but the Church should wield.</i>
<u>section</u>	A self-contained part of a larger composition (written or musical). <i>Sections from the left ventricle showed diseased tissue.</i>
<u>squad</u>	A small squad of policemen trained to deal with a particular kind of crime. <i>The 39 year old actress and her squad snapped some pics together after the show.</i>
squadron	A principal division of an armoured or cavalry regiment, consisting of two or more troops. <i>He immediately commissioned a squadron of architects.</i>
team	A group of players forming one side in a competitive game or sport. <i>His team played well.</i>

unit

The smallest measure of investment in a unit trust.

<u>armed</u>	Characterized by having or bearing arms. <i>Heavily armed troops.</i>
<u>armored</u>	Used of animals; provided with protective covering.
<u>army</u>	The army of the United States of America the agency that organizes and trains soldiers for land warfare. <i>Army officers.</i>
artillery	A means of persuading or arguing. <i>Each corps included two regiments of field artillery.</i>
battalion	A large organized group of people pursuing a common aim. <i>A battalion of ants.</i>
brigadier	A rank of officer in the British army, above colonel and below major general.
byzantine	Of or relating to the Eastern Orthodox Church or the rites performed in it.
cantonment	A permanent military station in British India.

corps	A main subdivision of an army in the field, consisting of two or more divisions. <i>Diplomatic corps.</i>
deploy	Place troops or weapons in battle formation. <i>Forces were deployed at strategic locations.</i>
disarm	Take away the weapons from; render harmless. <i>His tact and political skills will disarm critics.</i>
disarmament	The reduction or withdrawal of military forces and weapons. <i>The disarmament of the aggressor nations must be complete.</i>
grenadier	A reddish-brown African waxbill with a red bill and a bright blue rump.
inroad	An encroachment or intrusion. <i>They made inroads in the United States market.</i>
legion	The Foreign Legion. <i>Her fans are legion.</i>
legionary	A soldier in a Roman legion. <i>The legionary fortress of Isca.</i>
martial	Relating to fighting or war. <i>Martial law.</i>
militia	(in the US) all able-bodied civilians eligible by law for military service. <i>Congress shall have power to provide for calling forth the militia.</i>
muster	Round up (livestock). <i>Reporters mustered outside her house.</i>
naval	Connected with or belonging to or used in a navy. <i>A naval officer.</i>

<u>vanguard</u>	A position at the forefront of new developments or ideas. <i>The prototype was in the vanguard of technical development.</i>
