Brigand as a Noun

Definitions of "Brigand" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “brigand” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A member of a gang that ambushes and robs people in forests and mountains.*
- *An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band.*

Synonyms of "Brigand" as a noun (4 Words)

- [bandit](#)** An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band.
*The **bandit** produced a weapon and demanded money.*
- [mugger](#)** A person who attacks and robs another in a public place.
*The **mugger** snatched my purse and ran away.*
- [raider](#)** A person who attacks an enemy in their territory; a marauder.
*Masked **raiders** burst into the 100 seater restaurant.*
- [robber](#)** A person who commits robbery.

Associations of "Brigand" (30 Words)

- [bandit](#)** A robber or outlaw belonging to a gang and typically operating in an isolated or lawless area.
*The **bandit** produced a weapon and demanded money.*

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| burglar | A person who commits burglary. |
| burglary | Entering a building unlawfully with intent to commit a felony or to steal valuable property. <i>A two year sentence for burglary.</i> |
| burgle | Enter (a building) illegally with intent to commit a crime, especially theft. <i>Our house in London has been burgled.</i> |
| cattle | Animals of a group related to domestic cattle including yak bison and buffaloes. <i>So many head of cattle.</i> |
| criminal | A person who has committed a crime. <i>They are charged with conspiracy to commit criminal damage.</i> |
| despoil | Steal or violently remove valuable possessions from; plunder. <i>The church was despoiled of its marble wall covering.</i> |
| illegalize | Declare illegal; outlaw. |
| interloper | A person who becomes involved in a place or situation where they are not wanted or are considered not to belong. <i>To her I was always an outsider an interloper.</i> |
| larceny | Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968. |
| malefactor | Someone who has committed a crime or has been legally convicted of a crime. |
| outlaw | Declare illegal outlaw. <i>The outlaw Ned Kelly.</i> |
| pillage | The act of stealing valuable things from a place. <i>Artworks pillaged from churches and museums.</i> |
| piracy | A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Air piracy.</i> |
| rapine | The act of despoiling a country in warfare. <i>The fruits of violence and rapine.</i> |
| recidivist | Relating to recidivists. <i>Research reveals that murderers are less likely to be recidivist than other criminals.</i> |
| rob | Deprive someone of (something needed or deserved). <i>Someone had robbed my jacket.</i> |
| robber | A person who commits robbery. |
| robbery | Plundering during riots or in wartime. <i>He was involved in drugs extortion and robbery.</i> |

| rustler | Someone who steals livestock (especially cattle). <i>Police have so far arrested 649 rustlers countrywide.</i> |
| shoplifting | The act of stealing goods that are on display in a store. <i>Shrinkage is the retail trade's euphemism for shoplifting.</i> |
| steal | Steal a base. <i>He finished with eight points four steals and seven assists.</i> |
| theft | The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>The latest theft happened at a garage.</i> |
| thief | A person who steals another person's property, especially by stealth and without using force or threat of violence. <i>The thief stole the drugs from a doctor's surgery.</i> |
| thieve | Be a thief; steal something. <i>They began thieving again.</i> |
| thievery | The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>Petty thievery.</i> |
| transgression | The spreading of the sea over land as evidenced by the deposition of marine strata over terrestrial strata. <i>Her transgression of genteel etiquette.</i> |
| unlawful | Not conforming to legality, moral law, or social convention. <i>Unlawful hunters.</i> |
| vagrancy | The state of living as a vagrant; homelessness. <i>A descent into vagrancy and drug abuse.</i> |
| waylay | Stop or interrupt (someone) and detain them in conversation or trouble them in some other way. <i>He waylaid me on the stairs.</i> |
