## Brigand as a Noun

### Definitions of "Brigand" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “brigand” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A member of a gang that ambushes and robs people in forests and mountains.*
- *An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band.*

### Synonyms of "Brigand" as a noun (4 Words)

- [bandit](#)** An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band.  
*The **bandit** produced a weapon and demanded money.*
- [mugger](#)** A person who attacks and robs another in a public place.  
*The **mugger** snatched my purse and ran away.*
- [raider](#)** A person who attacks an enemy in their territory; a marauder.  
*Masked **raiders** burst into the 100 seater restaurant.*
- [robber](#)** A person who commits robbery.

### Associations of "Brigand" (30 Words)

- [bandit](#)** A robber or outlaw belonging to a gang and typically operating in an isolated or lawless area.  
*The **bandit** produced a weapon and demanded money.*

<b>burglar</b>	A person who commits burglary.
<b>burglary</b>	Entering a building unlawfully with intent to commit a felony or to steal valuable property. <i>A two year sentence for <b>burglary</b>.</i>
<b>burgle</b>	Enter (a building) illegally with intent to commit a crime, especially theft. <i>Our house in London has been <b>burgled</b>.</i>
<b>cattle</b>	Animals of a group related to domestic cattle including yak bison and buffaloes. <i>So many head of <b>cattle</b>.</i>
<b>criminal</b>	A person who has committed a crime. <i>They are charged with conspiracy to commit <b>criminal</b> damage.</i>
<b>despoil</b>	Steal or violently remove valuable possessions from; plunder. <i>The church was <b>despoiled</b> of its marble wall covering.</i>
<b>illegalize</b>	Declare illegal; outlaw.
<b>interloper</b>	A person who becomes involved in a place or situation where they are not wanted or are considered not to belong. <i>To her I was always an outsider an <b>interloper</b>.</i>
<b>larceny</b>	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
<b>malefactor</b>	Someone who has committed a crime or has been legally convicted of a crime.
<b>outlaw</b>	Declare illegal outlaw. <i>The <b>outlaw</b> Ned Kelly.</i>
<b>pillage</b>	The act of stealing valuable things from a place. <i>Artworks <b>pillaged</b> from churches and museums.</i>
<b>piracy</b>	A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Air <b>piracy</b>.</i>
<b>rapine</b>	The act of despoiling a country in warfare. <i>The fruits of violence and <b>rapine</b>.</i>
<b>recidivist</b>	Relating to recidivists. <i>Research reveals that murderers are less likely to be <b>recidivist</b> than other criminals.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Deprive someone of (something needed or deserved). <i>Someone had <b>robbed</b> my jacket.</i>
<b>robber</b>	A person who commits robbery.
<b>robbery</b>	Plundering during riots or in wartime. <i>He was involved in drugs extortion and <b>robbery</b>.</i>

<b>rustler</b>	Someone who steals livestock (especially cattle). <i>Police have so far arrested 649 <b>rustlers</b> countrywide.</i>
<b>shoplifting</b>	The act of stealing goods that are on display in a store. <i>Shrinkage is the retail trade's euphemism for <b>shoplifting</b>.</i>
<b>steal</b>	Steal a base. <i>He finished with eight points four <b>steals</b> and seven assists.</i>
<b>theft</b>	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>The latest <b>theft</b> happened at a garage.</i>
<b>thief</b>	A person who steals another person's property, especially by stealth and without using force or threat of violence. <i>The <b>thief</b> stole the drugs from a doctor's surgery.</i>
<b>thieve</b>	Be a thief; steal something. <i>They began <b>thieving</b> again.</i>
<b>thievery</b>	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>Petty <b>thievery</b>.</i>
<b>transgression</b>	The spreading of the sea over land as evidenced by the deposition of marine strata over terrestrial strata. <i>Her <b>transgression</b> of genteel etiquette.</i>
<b>unlawful</b>	Not conforming to legality, moral law, or social convention. <i><b>Unlawful</b> hunters.</i>
<b>vagrancy</b>	The state of living as a vagrant; homelessness. <i>A descent into <b>vagrancy</b> and drug abuse.</i>
<b>waylay</b>	Stop or interrupt (someone) and detain them in conversation or trouble them in some other way. <i>He waylaid me on the stairs.</i>
